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
The fiscal information in this background briefing is based on data through December 31, 2012.

## **Judiciary Budget**

- Funds operations of the Supreme Court and the Court of Appeals, as well as the salaries of circuit, district, and probate judges
- Funds a variety of judicial agencies and programs, including State Court Administrative Office, Michigan Judicial Institute, appellate defender programs, drug treatment courts, community dispute resolution, and foster care review board programs

## **Judiciary: Gross Appropriations**


In FY 2012-13, total Judiciary funding increased by \$14.0 million gross (\$16.0 million GF/GP).



## **Judiciary Share of State GF/GP**

Judiciary makes up 1.9% of the total state GF/GP budget

FY 2012-13 GF/GP Total = \$9,022,149,700



## **Judiciary Funding Sources**

State restricted funds and state GF/GP are the largest revenue sources in the budget.

**FY 2012-13 Judiciary Budget = \$273,760,100** 



# JUDICIARY APPROPRIATONS

## **Judiciary Appropriations**


The Judiciary budget is allocated into the following major spending areas:

- Supreme Court
- Court of Appeals
- Trial Court Operations
- Justices' and Judges' Compensation
- Indigent Defense and Legal Assistance
- Other (Judicial Agencies, Branchwide Appropriations, and Grants and Reimbursements to Local Governments)

## **Judiciary Appropriations**

Justices' and Judges' Compensation is the largest spending component, followed by Trial Court Operations, and Supreme Court.

**FY 2012-13 Judiciary Budget = \$273,760,100** 



## **MAJOR BUDGET ISSUES**

## Justices' and Judges' Compensation

- Supreme Court Justices' salaries are set by the State Officers
   Compensation Commission, as required by the Michigan Constitution
- Other judicial salaries are set by the Revised Judicature Act as percentages of supreme court salaries
- Circuit/district judges' salaries are paid by the state in two stages:
  - Direct payment by the state to the judge
  - Payment of remaining portion by the court funding unit, with reimbursement by state
- Probate judges' salaries are paid by local funding units, which are then reimbursed by the state

<sup>\*</sup>State reimbursements for part-time probate judges are limited to \$25,750 each.

# Judicial Resources and Judgeship Eliminations

- The State Court Administrative Office's (SCAO) 2011 Judicial Resources Recommendations (JRR) proposed the elimination of 45 judgeships by attrition.
  - Judgeships would be eliminated as sitting judges step down or become ineligible for reelection.
  - Dates for judgeship elimination range from immediate (current vacancies) to an outside date of 2039.
- Legislation passed in FY 2011-12 eliminated a total of 36 judgeships, as well as four Court of Appeals judges (2 were previously vacant.)
  - Thus far, two judgeships have been eliminated.
  - Court of Appeals judgeships were filled before effective date, thus savings will not be realized for several years.
- Annual savings if all proposed judgeships are eliminated total approximately \$6.3 million per year.
  - Savings would not be immediate; would depend on when current judgeships are vacated.

## **Supreme Court Operations Appropriations**

- Supreme Court Administration: \$12.7 million gross
   Staff support, Finance, Clerk, Board of Law Examiners, Reporter's Office, et al.
- State Court Administrative Office: \$13.6 million gross
   Analytical and administrative functions and services, especially pertaining to local courts
- Michigan Judicial Institute: \$2.2 million gross
   Continuing education and training for state judges and court personnel
- Judicial Information Systems: \$3.5 million gross
   Automated information systems and related functions for state judicial agencies
- Trial Court Automation Support: \$7.0 million gross
   Advises and assists trial courts in various efforts, including automated case flow management

## **Other Operations Appropriations**

- Statewide court operations appropriations:
  - Court of Appeals: \$21.5 million gross
     Clerk, research, staff support for the 28-member Court of Appeals
  - Branchwide Appropriations: \$8.4 million gross
     Building occupancy charges, rent, and security costs
- Judicial agency operations:
  - Foster Care Review Boards: \$1.5 million
     Efforts to assure prompt and permanent child placement
  - Judicial Tenure Commission: \$1.1 million
     Investigation and disciplinary action regarding judicial misconduct
  - State Appellate Defender's Office: \$6.1 million
     Appellate counsel for indigent individuals
  - Michigan Appellate Assigned Counsel System: \$1.0 million
     Continuing education and maintenance of statewide roster of attorneys able to serve as criminal appellate defense counsel for indigents


#### **Grants**

- \$97.1 million—approximately 35% of the Judiciary budget—is appropriated for various grant programs
- Primary among these is the Court Equity Fund program, which supports reimbursements to local trial courts
- The Court Equity Fund assists counties with trial court operational expenses
- Funding from the Court Equity Fund is combined with GF/GP funds and distributed to counties quarterly under a statutory formula that recognizes circuit and probate caseloads and numbers of judgeships

## **Court Equity Grant Program Appropriations**

Restricted revenue has accounted for an increasing proportion of court equity funding.

#### **Restricted Revenue Sources**

- Many parts of the Judiciary budget rely on restricted revenue sources typically collected from fees from court cases, criminal penalties, and civil infractions (including traffic citation).
- However, declining caseloads have resulted in reductions in the amount of revenue collected.
- This lower revenue affects a variety of line items, including the Court Equity Fund, Drug Treatment Court Grants, the Community Dispute Resolution Fund, and other grant programs.
- Prior to FY 2012-13, Court of Appeals filing and motion revenue was used to fund court of appeals operations, but was replaced with GF/GP in FY 2012-13, with the revenue collected being moved to Swift and Sure Sanctions grants.

## Revenue for Court Equity Fund

- Justice System Fund: \$11.4 million for FY 2010-11
  - Statutory allocation of 24.33% of amount remaining after required disbursements to Secondary Road Patrol and Training Fund
- Civil Filing Fee Fund: \$3.1 million for FY 2010-11
  - Statutory allocation of 8.2% of fund to Court Equity Fund
- Court Fee Fund: \$2.2 million for FY 2010-11
  - Receives court fee revenue in excess of that required to meet actuarial needs of the judges retirement system
  - Contribution to Court Equity Fund statutorily capped at \$2.2 million
- State Court Fund: \$24.2 million for FY 2010-11
  - Receives revenue from the Justice System and Civil Filing Fee Funds
  - By statute, \$1.6 million plus 76% of the balance of the proceeds of the State Court Fund go to the Court Equity Fund
- Juror Compensation Reimbursement Fund: \$2.6 million for FY 2010-11
  - Receives court fee revenue with the primary objective of reimbursing a portion of juror compensations paid by local courts
  - A one-time transfer authorized usage of surplus funds to offset GF/GP reductions in FY 2010-11


## **Other Grant Programs**

- Community Dispute Resolution Program (CDRP): \$2.3 million restricted funds for grants to local centers and CDRP administration
- Drug Treatment Courts: \$13.4 million (\$7.4 million when excluding Swift and Sure) for program evaluation and drug court planning/implementation grants; federal, restricted, and GF/GP support
- Indigent Civil Legal Assistance: \$7.9 million for legal aid programs throughout state; funded by state court fund
- Drunk Driving and Drug Case-Flow Programs: \$3.6 million total restricted funds for distribution to trial courts
- Judicial Technology Improvement: \$4.8 million to develop an integrated statewide judicial information system and other technology innovations; funded by judicial technology improvement fund
- Juror Compensation: \$6.6 million to reimburse locals for juror compensation costs; funded by juror compensation fund

#### **Swift and Sure Sanctions Grants**


- Grants started in FY 2011-12 as a \$1.0 million IDG from Department of Corrections for a pilot program.
- Funding expanded to \$6.0 million Gross (\$4.3 million GF/GP) in FY 2012-13.
- Program provides an alternative probation program which includes increased monitoring and drug testing with small but swiftly imposed penalties for offenders.
- Grants have been awarded to four counties with the intent to expand the program in the current fiscal year.
- Program is currently lumped in the Drug Treatment Courts line item, though Swift and Sure Sanctions programs are independent of a county's drug treatment courts.

## Justice System Fund FY 2010-11 Judiciary Budget



- (1) Justice System Fund allocation of \$11.4 million is combined with revenue from Civil Filing Fee, Court Fee, State Court Funds, and General Fund resulting in total FY 2010-11 Court Equity Fund appropriation of \$57.3 million.
- (2) Justice System Fund allocation of \$5.9 million is combined with revenue from the Civil Filing Fee Fund and other sources and reduced by the amount going to the Court Equity Fund, resulting in total FY 2010-11 State Court Fund appropriation of \$32.6 million.

## Civil Filing Fee Fund FY 2010-11 Judiciary Budget



- (1) Civil Filing Fee allocation of \$3.1 million is combined with revenue from Justice System, Court Fee, and State Court Funds, resulting in total FY 2010-11 Court Equity Fund appropriation of \$57.3 million.
- (2) Civil Filing Fee allocation \$18.1 million is combined with revenue from the Justice System Fund and other sources and reduced by the amount going to the Court Equity Fund, resulting in total FY 2010-11 State Court Fund appropriation of \$32.6 million.
