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GLOSSARY

Frequently-Used State Budget Terms

Adjusted Gross

Total net amount of all line item gross appropriations less (or minus) interdepartmental grants (IDGs) and intradepartmental transfers (IDTs)

Boilerplate

Specific language sections contained in an appropriations act which direct, limit or restrict line item expenditures, and/or require reports

Budget Stabilization Fund (BSF)

The countercyclical economic and budget stabilization fund—also known as the "rainy day" fund

Federal Revenues

Federal grant or matchable revenues dedicated to specific programs

General Fund/General Purpose (GF/GP)

The state's primary operating fund; the portion of the state's General Fund that does not include restricted revenues

Gross Appropriations (Gross)

The total of all applicable line item spending authorizations

Interdepartmental Grant (IDG)

Revenue or funds received by one state department from another state department (usually for a service the receiving department provides)

Transfers or funds being provided from one appropriation unit to another in the same department

Lapses

Unspent/unobligated funds remaining in line item accounts at the end of the fiscal year

Line Items

SECTION 106: GEOLOGICAL AND LAND MANAGEMENT

The Geological and Land Management Division regulates development of Michigan's oil, gas, and mineral resources. The goal of the division's programs is to provide for the managed and orderly development of geological resources, while protecting other natural resources, the environment, and public health and safety. The division also develops and disseminates maps, publications, and data on oil, gas, mineral, and groundwater resources for industrial and public use.

The Division administers the farmland and open space preservation program; land, lake, and stream protection acts; Great Lakes shorelands and submerged lands protection acts; wetlands protection and management act; construction within regulated sand dunes; air photo land inventory; and provides hydrologic expertise, dam safety, and flood hazard management.

The division administers part 201 (Environmental Remediation) of 1994 PA 451, and assists the Federal Environmental Protection Agency with the implementation of the Superfund program in Michigan.

SECTION 108: WASTE AND HAZARDOUS MATERIALS

The Waste Management Division is responsible for implementation and administration of hazardous and non-hazardous waste regulations, management and disposal of hazardous liquid industrial and solid waste, scrap tires, wastewater discharges to the groundwater, and land application of certain solid waste beneficial to the soil. The Division administers the solid waste management program, issues permits and licenses, and registers disposal facilities and waste transporters, and regulates the design, construction, and operation of above-ground and underground storage tanks and oversees remediation activities at leaking storage tank sites. Grant funds are provided for cleanup and disposal of abandoned scrap tires.

Provides that total state spending in this public act is \$201.7 million. Local grants from state revenue sources are expected to be \$20.1 million.

Sec. 202. Appropriations Subject to the Management and Budget Act

Directs appropriations to be expended under the limitations and requirements of 1984 PA 431 (MCL 18.1101 to 18.1594).

Sec. 203. Federal Fund Acronyms

Defines abbreviations used in this act for federal fund sources.

Sec. 204. Civil Service Charges

Requires Department of Civil Service to charge state departments 1% of salary payments, pursuant to Article XI, Section 5, of the State Constitution.

Sec. 205. State Hiring Freeze

Requires report identifying and justifying exceptions to the state hiring freeze.

Sec. 207. Privatization Project Plans

Requires a project plan be provided to the appropriations committees 60 days before any effort to privatize; an evaluation of the effort is required 30 months after the project is completed.

Sec. 208. Reports on Internet

Requires reports to be put on the Internet.

Sec. 209. American Made Goods and Services

Urges Department to purchase American-made goods and services if they are of comparable quality.

Sec. 211. Report Retention

Requires copies of all reports funded through this act to be received and provided for public use, following state and federal guidelines.

Sec. 212. Restricted Fund Revenue, Expenditures, and Fund Balances

Requires fund revenue, spending, and estimated year-end balances for FY 2001-02 and FY 2002-03 by February 15, 2003, for each restricted fund appropriated in this act.

Sec. 213. Department Grant and Loan Programs

Requires a report that includes a description of available grant and loan programs, criteria used for awards, and a list of recipients.

Sec. 215. Great Lakes Water Diversion

Requires notification of the Legislature and provision of public meetings on any request received by the State of Michigan to divert water from the Great Lakes.

Sec. 216. Consolidated Report on Environmental Cleanup Projects

Requires status report on approved cleanup projects funded through environmental cleanup and redevelopment program, state cleanup, emergency actions, superfund cleanup, revitalization revolving loan program, brownfield grants and loans, leaking underground storage tank cleanup program, contaminated lake and river cleanup program, and environmental protection bond projects.

Sec. 217. Appropriations for Environmental Cleanup Projects

Makes available funds appropriated for the environmental cleanup and redevelopment program and the leaking underground storage tank program to clean up any legislatively-approved cleanup site. Unspent amounts from earlier appropriations for the cleanup and redevelopment fund, bottle deposits fund, and the Clean Michigan Initiative bond response activities fund are appropriated for expenditure for any site listed in an appropriation act.

Sec. 218. Michigan Youth Conservation Council

Includes environmental education appropriation of \$5,000 for MSU Extension Service 4-H programs for the Michigan Youth Conservation Council.

Sec. 219. Information Services User Fees

Requires Department to pay fees following service rate schedules for standard services and information system support , subject to the interdepartmental agreement.

Sec. 220. Information Technology Appropriations Work Project

Designates appropriated funds for Information Technology as a work project.

Sec. 221. Information Services Rate and User Fee Schedules

Requires Department of Information Technology to establish fee and service rate schedules for standard services and information system support provided to state departments, prior to the disbursement of any funds appropriated in this act.

Sec. 301. Instate and Outstate Travel Report

Requires a quarterly report on employee travel expenses.

Sec. 401. Air Quality Program Revenues and Expenditures

Requires report on annual expenditures and revenues by fund source and by program function.

Sec. 501. Recycling and Composting Assistance

Includes an appropriation for pollution prevention authorization for one position and \$60,000 to provide technical assistance to organizations and businesses involved in recycling and composting.

Sec. 502. Recycled Products Marketing

Requires the recycling coordinator to prepare a report on efforts to market recycled materials in Michigan.

Sec. 503. Bond Fund Report

Requires report on the amount and disposition of bond funds and descriptions of activities supported from bond revenue.

Sec. 601. Great Lakes Bottomlands Permits

Requires permit fees to be collected fairly and uniformly from users of Great Lakes bottomlands.

Sec. 602. Stream Habitat Project Fees

Allows permit fees be waived for nonprofit organizations conducting approved stream habitat improvement projects.

Sec. 701. Work Projects - Environmental Response Programs

Considers appropriations for cleanup and redevelopment program, emergency cleanup action, contaminated site investigations, cleanup and revitalization, revitalization revolving loan program, and superfund cleanup projects to be work projects (Management and Budget Act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1451a).

Sec. 702. Redevelopment and Cleanup Site List

Lists authorized cleanup and redevelopment projects.

Sec. 703. Municipal Landfill Match Grants

Provides up to \$2.0 million in the environmental cleanup and redevelopment line item for NPL municipal landfill match grants.

Sec. 704. Ruddiman Creek Contamination

Requires Department to seek federal fund support of cleanup efforts in the Ruddiman Creek watershed.

Sec. 802. Imported Solid Waste Monitoring

Directs Department to periodically inspect imported solid waste at disposal facilities to mitigate the unpermitted disposal of waste at Michigan disposal sites.

Sec. 901. Beach Signs - Water Quality Information - VETOED

Provides as much as \$20,000 to erect signs at public beaches, informing the public where the most current beach water quality information may be found.

Sec. 902. Aguifer Protection and Dispute Resolution

Provides \$100,000 to the Department of Agriculture to cover costs related to water use dispute resolution.

Sec. 903. Groundwater Use Reporting

Requires grant for developing a groundwater database needed to model the demands for domestic uses of groundwater supplies.

Sec. 904. Groundwater Inventory and Map

Provides Clean Michigan Initiative Clean Water Fund support for the inventory and map effort required in section 23802 of the Michigan Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Act of 1994, as amended.

Sec. 909. Water Quality Enforcement Report

Requires a report on enforcement and program activities related to implementation of the national Pollution Discharge Elimination System permits.

Sec. 1001. Solid Waste Disposal Facility Inspections

Requires periodic inspections of Michigan disposal sites receiving out of state solid waste.

Sec. 1002. Solid Waste Disposal Enforcement Training

Directs Department to provide local law enforcement training to support local efforts to regulate solid waste disposal activities.

Sec. 1101. Septage Waste Compliance Program Grants

Allows Department to provide county septage waste compliance services if a certified health department does not exist, or if the county health department fails to fulfill mandated responsibilities.

Sec. 1102. Scrap Tire Fire Suppression Costs

Makes available \$100,000 for grants to communities to cover scrap tire suppression costs, provided that owner liability bonds and other available funding sources have been exhausted.

Sec. 1103. Arsenic Standard Compliance Loans

Makes available loans from the drinking water revolving loan program for public water supply systems found to be out of compliance with federal arsenic standards.

Sec. 1204. Lake St. Clair Water Quality Monitoring and Canal Dredging - PARTIALLY VETOED

Provides \$1.0 million conduct a comprehensive water quality monitoring program for the St. Clair River, Lake St. Clair, and the Clinton River Watershed, and \$700,000 for a grant to the City of St Clair Shores to dredge contaminated canals. Note: The \$1.0 million monitoring grant was vetoed.

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
