The House Fiscal Agency has prepared a Line Item Summary for each of the FY 2006-07 appropriation acts. Each **Summary** contains line-by-line detail, including the amount and purpose of each appropriation line and information regarding related boilerplate sections, for a specific appropriation act. Following the line item detail, a brief explanation of each boilerplate section in the appropriation bill is provided.

In this report, line item vetoes are presented in the following manner: appropriation amounts shown in strikeout are those that appear in the enrolled bill; amounts shown directly below strikeout amounts reflect the effect of the veto.

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GLOSSARY: State Budget Terms

STATE BUDGET TERMS

Gross Appropriations (Gross): The total of all applicable appropriations (statutory spending authorizations) in a budget bill.

Adjusted Gross Appropriations (Adjusted Gross): The net amount of all gross appropriations after subtracting interdepartmental grants (IDGs) and intradepartmental transfers (IDTs).

Lapses: Appropriation amounts that are unspent/unobligated at the end of a fiscal year. Appropriations are automatically terminated at the end of a fiscal year unless otherwise provided by law.

Work Project: A statutorily-authorized account which allows a spending authorization to be carried over from one fiscal year to a succeeding fiscal year or years— i.e., allows funds to be spent over a period of years.

APPROPRIATION BILL TERMS

Line Item: Specific funding amount in an appropriation bill which establishes spending authorization for a particular program or function (may be for a single purpose or for multiple purposes).

Boilerplate: Specific language sections in an appropriation bill which direct, limit or restrict line item expenditures, express legislative intent, and/or require reports.

REVENUE SOURCES

General Fund/General Purpose (GF/GP): Unrestricted General Fund revenue available to fund any activity accounted for in the General Fund; unused GF/GP revenue lapses to the General Fund at the end of a fiscal year.

State Restricted (Restricted): State revenue restricted by state law or outside restriction that is available only for specified purposes; at year-end, unused restricted revenue remains in the restricted fund.

Federal Revenue: Federal grant or matchable revenue dedicated to specific programs.

Local Revenue: Revenue from local units of government.

Private Revenue: Revenue from non-government entities: rents, royalties or interest payments, payments from hospitals or individuals, and gifts and bequests.

Interdepartmental Grant (IDG): Revenue or funds received by one state department from another state department (usually for a service provided by the receiving department).

Intradepartmental Transfer (IDT): Transfers or funds being provided from one appropriation unit to another in the same department.

MAJOR STATE FUNDS

Budget Stabilization Fund (BSF): The countercyclical economic and budget stabilization fund; also known as the "rainy day" fund.

School Aid Fund (SAF): A restricted fund; the primary funding source for K-12 schools and Intermediate School Districts (ISDs).

General Fund: The General Fund (funded from taxes and other general revenue) is used to account for the ordinary operations of a governmental unit that are not accounted for in another fund.

The mission of the Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) is to protect and enhance the state's environmental quality.

SECTION 108: WASTE AND HAZARDOUS MATERIALS

The Waste and Hazardous Materials Division is responsible for implementation and administration of hazardous and non-hazardous waste regulations, management and disposal of hazardous liquid industrial and solid waste, scrap tires, radioactive materials, and land application of certain solid waste beneficial to the soil. The Division administers the solid waste management program, radiological protection program, and medical waste regulation program; issues permits and licenses; registers disposal facilities and waste transporters; and regulates the design, construction, and operation of above-ground and underground storage tanks. Grant funds are provided for cleanup and disposal of abandoned scrap tires, development of markets for scrap tires, and indoor radon education and testing.

SECTION 109: WATER

The Water Division protects and enhances the water quality of the state's surface waters, including the Great Lakes. The division administers several programs which establish water quality standards and assess water quality, issues permits to regulate the discharge of industrial and municipal waste waters, monitors compliance with state and federal laws, provides oversight and technical consultation for local water supply inspection programs, and provides technical and financial assistance to watershed management councils.

Itemizes payments to locals from the funds appropriated.

Sec. 202. Appropriations Subject to Management and Budget Act

Requires appropriations be expended subject to the Management and Budget Act.

Sec. 203. Federal Fund Acronyms

Defines abbreviations used in this act for federal fund sources.

Sec. 204. Civil Service Charges

Requires Department of Civil Service to charge state departments 1% of salary payments, pursuant to Article XI, Section 5, of the State Constitution.

Sec. 205. State Hiring Freeze

Requires report identifying and justifying exceptions to the state hiring freeze.

Sec. 206. Reports on Internet

Requires reports to be put on the Internet.

Sec. 207. Report Retention

Requires copies of all reports funded through this act to be received and provided for public use, following state and federal guidelines.

Sec. 208. Restricted Fund Revenue, Expenditures, and Fund Balances

Requires report on fund revenue, spending, and estimated year-end balances for each restricted fund appropriated in this act.

Sec. 209. Department Grant and Loan Programs

Requires report with description of available grant and loan programs, criteria for awards, and list of recipients.

Sec. 210. Great Lakes Water Diversion

Requires notifying the Legislature and providing public meetings on any request received by the State of Michigan to divert water from the Great Lakes.

Sec. 211. Consolidated Report on Environmental Cleanup Projects

Requires status report on approved cleanup projects funded through environmental cleanup and redevelopment program, state cleanup, emergency actions, superfund cleanup, revitalization revolving loan program, Brownfield grants and loans, leaking underground storage tank cleanup program, contaminated lake and river cleanup program, and environmental protection bond projects.

Sec. 212. Appropriations for Environmental Cleanup Projects

Specifies that available funds be appropriated for environmental cleanup and redevelopment program and leaking underground storage tank program to clean up any legislatively-approved cleanup site. Appropriates unspent amounts from prior appropriations for cleanup and redevelopment fund, bottle deposits fund, and Clean Michigan Initiative bond response activities fund for expenditure for any site listed in an appropriation act.

Sec. 213. Michigan Youth Conservation Council

Includes environmental education appropriation of \$5,000 for MSU Extension Service 4-H programs for the Michigan Youth Conservation Council.

Sec. 214. Information Services User Fees

Directs DEQ to pay fees following service rate schedules for standard services and information system support, subject to the interdepartmental agreement.

Sec. 215. Information Technology Appropriation Work Project

Designates appropriated funds for information technology as a work project.

Sec. 216. Out-of-State Travel Report

Requires annual report on employee out-of-state travel expenses.

Sec. 217. American Made Goods and Services

Urges DEQ to purchase American-made goods and services if they are of comparable quality.

Sec. 218. Michigan Great Lakes Areas of Concern

Directs DEQ to develop a strategy, with the federal EPA and public advisory councils, to remove Michigan's Great Lakes Areas of Concern from the federal list.

Sec. 219. Prohibition of Disciplinary Actions For Legislative Contacts

Provides that state employees who communicate with the Michigan Legislature shall not be disciplined.

Sec. 220. Criminal and Civil Fine Revenue

Requires report of criminal and civil fine revenue collected during FY 2005-06.

Sec. 221. Carryforward of Settlement Fund Revenue

Allows carryforward of up to \$2.5 million of settlement fund revenue into FY 2007-08.

Sec. 222. Permit Program Benchmark Study – VETOED

Requires consultant study of DEQ permit programs.

Sec. 223. EPA Regulatory Innovation Agreement

States intent that DEQ renew its agreement with federal EPA to help farms and farm operations prevent or minimize agricultural pollution risks.

Sec. 225. Contracts With Firms Located in Economically Deprived or Depressed Communities

Encourages DEQ to enter into contracts with vendors located in economically depressed communities, including Baldwin in Lake County.

Sec. 226. Restricted Fund Allocation Plan for Administrative Units

Requires DEQ to develop cost allocation plan for DEQ administrative units, including information technology.

Sec. 227. Oil or Alternative Fuels Refinery Permits

Requires report on permits necessary to construct and operate proposed refineries; directs DEQ to expedite the permit process for these facilities.

Sec. 229. NPDES Rules Enforcement – VETOED

Prohibits DEQ from enforcing rules more stringent than federal requirements.

Sec. 401. Air Quality Program Revenue and Expenditures

Requires report on annual expenditures and revenue by fund source and by program function.

Sec. 501. Bond Fund Report

Requires report of amount/disposition of bond funds and descriptions of activities supported from bond revenue.

Sec. 502. Laboratory Services Revenue Carryforward

Allows carryforward of unspent interdepartmental laboratory revenue.

Sec. 503. Fruit and Vegetable Regulatory Compliance Guide

Requires publication of a health and safety regulation guide for fruit and vegetable growers.

Sec. 504. Brownfield Grants and Loans Work Projects

Establishes a work project for the \$8.8 million appropriation for contaminated site cleanup projects.

Sec. 601. Stream Habitat Project Fees

Allows waiving permit fees for nonprofit organizations conducting approved stream habitat improvement projects.

Sec. 602. Beach Grooming Practices

Requires report on appropriate beach grooming practices.

Sec. 701. Work Projects – Environmental Response Programs

Considers appropriations for emergency cleanup action to be a work project.

Sec. 702. Peer-Reviewed Site Cleanup Criteria

Directs Department to include cleanup criteria in remedial action plans derived from peer-reviewed risk assessments.

Sec. 703. St. Louis Water Supply Wells

Provides funds to develop an alternative water supply for the City of St. Louis.

Sec. 704. Refined Petroleum Cleanup Site List

Requires list of sites to be addressed through the permanent refined petroleum cleanup program 30 days after enactment of legislation establishing the program.

Sec. 705. Environmental Cleanup Site List

Lists cleanup projects funded through environmental cleanup and redevelopment program.

Sec. 801. Notice of Order Suspending Sale of Petroleum Products – VETOED

Requires 48-hour notice to Legislature before DEQ issues an order suspending sale of petroleum products by a wholesale or retail operator.

Sec. 802. Construction Permit Site Review Board

States intent that approval by the Site Review Board represents the final approval for construction permit applications referred by DEQ.

Sec. 803. Waste Disposal Report to Cities of Romulus and Taylor

Requires report to City of Romulus and/or City of Taylor if hazardous waste or hazardous waste constituents are discharged or released.

Sec. 901. Water Quality Enforcement Report

Requires report on enforcement and program activities funded from National Pollution Discharge Elimination System Fund.

Sec. 902. Federal Drinking Water Act Technical Assistance

Specifies allocation of 2% of available funds for safe drinking water technical assistance activities.

Sec. 1101. Septage Waste Compliance Program Grants

Allows DEQ to provide county septage waste compliance services if a certified health department does not exist, or if the county health department fails to fulfill mandated responsibilities.

Sec. 1102. Scrap Tire Fire Suppression Costs

Provides \$100,000 for grants to communities for scrap tire suppression costs, provided that owner liability bonds and other available funding sources have been exhausted.

Sec. 1103. Real-Time Water Quality Monitoring

Provides grant to Macomb County and St. Clair County to support real-time water quality monitoring programs in the St. Clair watershed.

Sec. 1104. Muskegon County Wetland Development – VETOED

Provides funding for Muskegon County to develop a wetland at the county wastewater treatment facility along Little Black Creek.

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
