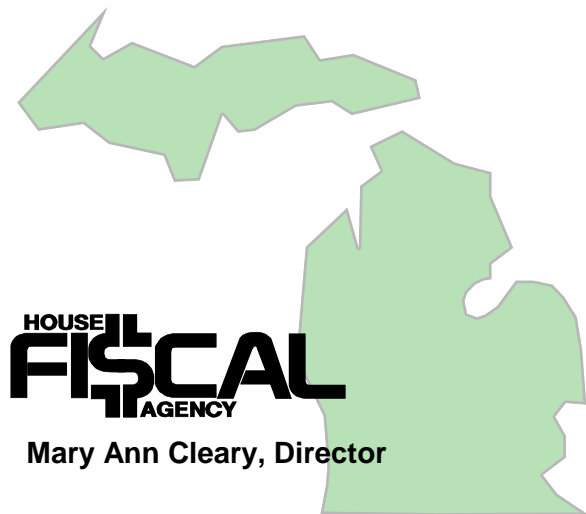

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GLOSSARY

STATE BUDGET TERMS

Line Item

Specific funding amount in an appropriation bill which establishes spending authorization for a particular program or function.

Boilerplate

Specific language sections in an appropriation bill which direct, limit, or restrict line-item expenditures, express legislative intent, and/or require reports.

Lapse

Appropriated amounts that are unspent or unobligated at the end of a fiscal year; appropriations are automatically terminated at the end of a fiscal year unless otherwise provided by law.

Work Project

Account authorized through statutory process which allows appropriated spending authorization from one fiscal year to be utilized for expenditures in a succeeding fiscal year or years for a specific project or purpose.

APPROPRIATIONS AND FUND SOURCES

Appropriations

Authority to expend funds for a particular purpose. An appropriation is not a mandate to spend.

Gross: Total of all applicable appropriations in an appropriation bill.

Adjusted Gross: Net amount of gross appropriations after subtracting interdepartmental grants (IDGs) and intradepartmental transfers (IDTs).

Interdepartmental Grant (IDG) Revenue

Funds received by one state department from another state department—usually for service(s) provided.

Intradepartmental Transfer (IDT) Revenue

Funds transferred from one appropriation unit to another within the same departmental budget.

Federal Revenue

Federal grant or match revenue; generally dedicated to specific programs or purposes.

Local Revenue

Revenue received from local units of government for state services.

Private Revenue

Revenue from non-government entities: rents, royalties or interest payments, payments from hospitals or individuals, or gifts and bequests.

State Restricted Revenue

State revenue restricted by the State Constitution, state statute, or outside restriction that is available only for specified purposes; includes most fee revenue; at year-end, unused restricted revenue generally remains in the restricted fund.

General Fund/General Purpose (GF/GP) Revenue

Unrestricted general fund revenue available to fund basic state programs and other purposes determined by the Legislature; unused GF/GP revenue lapses to the General Fund at the end of a fiscal year.

MAJOR STATE FUNDS

General Fund

The state's primary operating fund; receives state revenue not dedicated to another state fund.

School Aid Fund (SAF)

A restricted fund that serves as the primary state funding source for K-12 schools and Intermediate School Districts. Constitutionally, SAF revenue may also be used for postsecondary education.

Budget Stabilization Fund

The Countercyclical Economic and Budget Stabilization Fund (also known as the "rainy day fund"); the Management and Budget Act provides guidelines for making deposits into and withdrawals from the fund.

DEPARTMENT OF MILITARY AND VETERANS AFFAIRS

The Michigan Department of Military and Veterans Affairs serves the dual purpose of providing an operational military force in support of state and federal homeland security needs and providing a network of services and programs in support of the state's veteran population and their families.

NOTE: Funding for the Grand Rapids Home for Veterans is included in its own appropriation unit for transparency purposes. However, administration of the home still falls under the responsibility of the Michigan Veterans Affairs Agency.

SECTION 102: MILITARY

The Michigan National Guard, established by the Michigan Military Act 1967 PA 150 as amended, serves to protect the lives and property of Michigan citizens during times of emergency response and civil unrest in order to preserve peace, order, and public safety at the direction of the Governor, and to assist the federal government in defending sovereign interests of the United States. There are approximately 10,000 members of the Michigan National Guard, organized along several Army National Guard (ARNG) and Air National Guard (ANG) units.

National Guard operations	398,200	<p>Programs in support of National Guard operations and activities, which include:</p> <p><u>Military Appeals Tribunal</u> Per diem payments and administrative costs of the Military Appeals Tribunal. The tribunal is a five-member board appointed by the Governor; has appellate jurisdiction, upon petition by an accused National Guard service member, to hear and review the record in all decisions of a court martial under the Michigan Code of Military Justice, 1980 PA 523. It sits as a panel of three members with the concurrence of two members necessary for a decision. Members are eligible for a per diem equal to 1/250 of the state salary paid to circuit court judges, plus reimbursement for actual food, lodging, and travel expenses incurred.</p> <p><u>State Active Duty</u> Funding for military personnel who are called to state duty to perform unique administrative or maintenance functions necessary to support the operations of the department; typically includes security related to the Labor Day walk across on the Mackinac Bridge or ceremonial purposes, such as a gubernatorial inauguration.</p> <p><u>Homeland Security</u> Activities related to Homeland Security program; assessment, development, and evaluation of plans to detect, prepare for, prevent, protect against, respond to, and recover from terrorist threats/attacks.</p> <p><u>Michigan Emergency Volunteers</u> Materials and supplies for statutory organization of state military personnel that would be activated if all or part of the Michigan National Guard was mobilized for service during a national emergency.</p> <p><u>Counterdrug Program</u> Coordinates with federal, state, and local law enforcement agencies to counter the flow of illegal drugs in Michigan; helicopters assist in locating marijuana and U.S. Customs Agency support at Port Huron and Detroit border entry points.</p>

SECTION 103: MICHIGAN VETERANS AFFAIRS AGENCY

The Michigan Veterans Affairs Agency (MVAA) appropriations unit provides funding for various state programs and services for veterans administered by the MVAA. The agency was established by Executive Reorganization Order 2013-2 to serve as the coordinating body for state services to veterans. The agency directly administers several programs for veterans, often coordinating its activities with the several veteran's service organizations and county veteran's affairs departments. These activities include the operation of the two veterans' homes and the Michigan Veterans' Facility Authority, the administration of the Michigan Veterans' Trust Fund, and grants to veteran's service organizations. The agency also coordinates the activities of departments and agencies across state government in the delivery of state healthcare, education, employment, and other quality of life programs to veterans.

The homes were established pursuant to statute – Grand Rapids Home for Veterans by 1885 PA 152 and D.J. Jacobetti Home for Veterans by 1977 PA 107 – to provide care for aged and disabled veterans. Later amendments to statutes extended admission eligibility to widows, widowers, spouses, former spouses, and parents of state veterans. The homes provide three levels of care: domiciliary, nursing, and special needs and are governed by the Board of Managers, a seven-member board appointed by the Governor. The Michigan Veterans' Facility Authority was established by 2016 PA 560, and will oversee the construction and administration of new state veterans homes.

Michigan veterans affairs agency administration – 39.0 FTE positions	7,061,200	<p>Operation and administration of the Michigan Veterans Affairs Agency; the agency includes a director, general counsel, and senior policy executive, a deputy director overseeing the homes and Michigan Veterans' Trust Fund, a chief executive officer of the Veterans Health System, and a deputy director overseeing communications, outreach, strategic planning, and service delivery.</p> <p><u>Strategic Planning:</u> Includes staff coordinating the development and delivery of programs and services to veterans across state departments, focusing on healthcare services, education benefits, employment services, and quality of life programs.</p> <p><u>Strategic Communications and Customer Service:</u> Includes staff focusing on the development of a web portal and social media, program outreach and communications, benefit claims management (VetraSpec), development of a "no wrong door" approach to service delivery and improving collaboration with other non-government providers of services to veterans.</p> <p><u>Targeted Outreach and Performance Management:</u> Includes staff providing assistance with filing claims for VA benefits, and training and accountability activities for veteran service organizations (VSOs) and county veterans' affairs departments.</p> <p><u>Veterans Service Regional Coordinators:</u> Provides funding to VSOs or others to hire 10 regional coordinators who are responsible for managing the workload of VSO service officers, monitoring service officer performance, and ensuring compliance with grant and boilerplate performance requirements. These coordinators also serve as a liaison to other public and private agencies serving veterans.</p> <p><u>County Veterans Service Enhancements:</u> Provides financial assistance to county veterans service departments to expand veterans benefits claims processing capabilities. These funds are used to support technology improvements, such as the acquisition of an electronic claims management system, to hire additional VA accredited counselors, or to establish a veterans service department either directly through county employees or indirectly through service agreements with neighboring counties.</p> <p><u>Legal Services/Federal Claims Representation:</u> Supports legal services/federal claims representation of the MVAA. This funding supports the agency's legal costs incurred in representing veterans' claims for VA benefits before the Board of Veterans Appeals, the Court of Appeals for Veterans Claims, and beyond. Legal Services are a necessary part of the MVAA's accreditation by the VA to assist veterans in filing claims for VA benefits.</p>

SECTION 104: GRAND RAPIDS HOME FOR VETERANS

The Grand Rapids Home for Veterans (GRHV) is situated on 70 acres in Grand Rapids and opened in 1886; has authorization for 450 nursing beds and 140 domiciliary beds. Besides domiciliary, nursing, and special needs care, GRHV has an Alzheimer's unit, a variety of therapy programs, and offers a variety of activities for members. This appropriation unit consists of three line items, which delineate the separate expenditure areas for the Grand Rapids Home for Veterans: staffing, contracted services, and basic operational costs.

Sec. 201. State Spending and State Appropriations Paid to Local Units of Government

Specifies total state spending from state resources and payments to local units of government from state resources.

Sec. 202. Appropriations Subject to the Management and Budget Act

Subjects appropriations to the Management and Budget Act, 1984 PA 431.

Sec. 203. Terms and Acronyms

Defines various terms and acronyms contained in Article XIV.

Sec. 204. Internet Availability of Required Reports

Requires DMVA to use the Internet to fulfill reporting requirements; authorizes transmission of reports via e-mail.

Sec. 205. Purchase of Foreign Goods

Prohibits the purchase of foreign goods or services if competitively priced and of comparable quality American goods or services are available; requires preference be given to goods and services manufactured by Michigan businesses and Michigan businesses owned and operated by veterans.

Sec. 206. Businesses in Deprived and Depressed Communities

Requires the department director to take all reasonable steps to ensure businesses in deprived and depressed communities compete for and perform contracts.

Sec. 207. Out-of-State Travel

Requires DMVA to report on out-of-state travel expenses paid for in whole or in part with state appropriations.

Sec. 208. Use of Funding for Legal Services

Prohibits using appropriations to hire a person to provide legal services that are the responsibility of the attorney general; prohibition does not apply to legal services for bonding activities and for those activities that the attorney general authorizes.

Sec. 209. General Fund Lapse Report

Requires the State Budget Office to report on estimates of general fund lapses at the close of the prior fiscal year.

Sec. 210. Contingency Funding

Contains authorization for up to \$10.0 million in federal, \$3.0 million in state restricted, \$500,000 in local, and \$100,000 in private contingency funds; authorizes expenditure of the funds only after legislative transfer to specific line items.

Sec. 211. Transparency Website

Requires the department to provide the data necessary for DTMB to maintain a searchable website that is accessible by the public at no cost that includes expenditure data, data on payments made to vendors, and data on number of active employees, job specifications, and wage rates.

Sec. 212. State Restricted Funds Report

Requires the department and the State Budget Office to report on state restricted fund balances, projected state restricted fund revenues, and state restricted fund expenditures.

Sec. 213. Performance Metrics Website

Requires the department to maintain a publicly accessible website that identifies and tracks its performance against key metrics used to monitor and improve its performance.

Sec. 214. Annual Legacy Costs

States that estimated FY 2017-18 legacy retirement costs total \$17,075,800 gross, including pension costs of \$8,787,300 and retiree health care costs of \$8,288,500.

Sec. 215. Communications with the Legislature

Prohibits the department from taking disciplinary action against employees for communicating with legislators or their staff.

Sec. 216. Quarterly Reporting on Achieving Requirements

Requires the department to provide quarterly reports on the status of work projects, its financial status, evidence of efficiencies, corrective action plans for requirements not achieved, the department's performance against metrics stated in the act, and employment levels.

Sec. 217. Department Core Services

Lists core services of the department; requires appropriations to be used for core services.

Sec. 218. Capital Outlay Carryforward

Authorizes capital outlay appropriations to be carried forward at the end of the fiscal year, consistent with the Management and Budget Act.

Sec. 219. Intention to Sell Department Property

Requires the department to provide a 60-day notice of intent to sell property.

MILITARY

Sec. 301. Unclassified Positions

Lists titles of unclassified positions currently in the department; requires the department to notify the subcommittees prior to submitting requests for additional unclassified positions or requests for substantive changes to the duties of existing unclassified positions.

Sec. 302. Armories and Joint Force Readiness

Requires the department to provide for the executive level administration of the department, operations of the Michigan military establishment, and maintenance and operation of National Guard armories as provided under listed laws and regulations; requires quarterly report on the status of armories; and requires a report by December 1 assessing the current state of the armories and developing an investment strategy for physical improvements at the armories, including the consolidation of armories and the establishment of new armories.

Sec. 303. Michigan Youth Challenge Academy

Requires the department to maintain proper levels of staffing and resources to operate the Michigan Youth Challenge Academy as provided under federal law; lists specific operating requirement and performance metrics.

Sec. 304. Military Family Relief Fund

Requires DMVA to provide grant funding from the Military Family Relief Fund, outreach services to military families of members of the reserve component called into active duty, and quarterly reports on the financial activities of the fund.

Sec. 305. National Guard Training Facilities and Air Bases

Requires the department to provide Army National Guard (ARNG) and Air National Guard (ANG) forces, when directed, in support of state and local emergencies, and in support of federal military requirements; requires the department to operate and maintain ARNG facilities (including Fort Custer and Camp Grayling) and ANG facilities (Selfridge ANG Base, Battle Creek ANG Base, and the Alpena Combat Readiness Training Center); and requires quarterly reports on National Guard personnel strength.

Sec. 306. Billeting Fund

Requires annual report of operations and expenditures regarding the Billeting Fund account, which supports program operations of the Chargeable Transient Quarters Program at National Guard training facilities.

Sec. 307. National Guard Tuition Assistance Program

Requires DMVA to establish and maintain a tuition assistance program for members of the Michigan National Guard; states the program's objectives and performance metrics.

Sec. 308. Starbase Grant

Requires DMVA to maintain a Starbase program, providing programs in mathematics, science, and technology to primarily 5th grade students, at ANG facilities.

MICHIGAN VETERANS AFFAIRS AGENCY

Sec. 401. Board of Managers (Veterans Homes)

Provides that the Board of Managers and Michigan Veterans' Facility Authority shall exercise certain regulatory and governance authority over GRHV and DJJHV.

BOILERPLATE SECTION INFORMATION

Sec. 402(1)-(3), (9)-(19). Grand Rapids Home for Veterans (GRHV) and D.J. Jacobetti Home for Veterans (DJJHV) Service and Care Requirements

Requires the GRHV and DJJHV to meet applicable standards of care as provided under listed federal and state legal authorities; also specifies standards around issues concerning psychiatric care, the monitoring of comprehensive care plans, supply inventory, pharmaceutical inventory, controls over donated goods and monies, and the personal funds of residents. Requires information on the complaint process to be conspicuously posted at the home; requires GRHV DJJHV and Board of Managers policies to be posted on the MVAA website; and requires the department to report budgeting and quality of care metrics to the Legislature, including health and safety issues, status of Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) certification, resident member demographics, upgrades to facilities, and the financial status of the homes.

Sec. 402(4)-(7). GRHV Competency Evaluated Nursing Assistants

Requires that contractors that provide nursing assistants (CENAs) at the home meet certain performance standards regarding pre-service and in-service training and experience.

Sec. 402(8). GRHV and DJJHV Complaint Management Process

Requires that complaints of alleged abuse or neglect received by a supervisor at the home be reported to the director of nursing upon receipt, and requires that the director of nursing provide information on the nature and final disposition of complaints received at least monthly to the home administrator, Board of Managers, MVAA, subcommittees, legislative fiscal agencies, and the State Budget Office.

Sec. 403. DJJHV CMS Certification

Requires the department to pursue CMS certification for DJJHV with the appropriations in part 1; requires CMS certification completion by June 1, 2018; and requires standards of care to improve with CMS certification.

Sec. 404. GRHV and DJJHV CMS Certification Reporting

Requires the department report to the Legislature quarterly regarding improvements in full-spectrum health care resulting from facility upgrades to obtain CMS certification.

Sec. 405. Veterans' Trust Fund Grants

Requires the MVAA to report on the Michigan Veterans Trust Fund financial status, awarded grants, and administrative expenses; and establishes a capacity metric of 2,000 applications.

Sec. 406(1). MVAA Outreach Services

Requires the MVAA to provide outreach services to veterans, communicate information on available VA benefits, process requests for military discharge documents, digitize military medical and discharge documents, and assist in processing claims for VA benefits; requires quarterly reports on the MVAA's performance against the performance outcomes, measures, and objectives stated in its strategic plan developed under 2013 PA 9; and requires a report by April 1 providing an estimate on the state's homeless veterans population and a summary of the activities and strategies developed under the MVAA community assessment and regional service delivery model pilot projects that are specifically aimed at improving use of community-based services among homeless veterans and at reducing the incidence of veterans homelessness.

Sec. 406(2). Regional Service Coordination

Requires the MVAA to provide for the regional coordination of services, including benefit counseling, state health and human service programs, workforce and economic development programs, and community-based programs; allows service officers to include mental health care referral services; requires the MVAA to work with the Department of Health and Human Services and the Department of Corrections in coordinating benefits and services to eligible veterans; requires training on processing veterans benefits due to military sexual trauma, post-traumatic stress disorder, depression, anxiety, substance abuse, and other mental health issues.

Sec. 406(3). MVAA Benefits Counseling Services

Requires MVAA to assist veterans in filing claims for VA benefits; establishes a capacity metric of 500 claims per year and a performance metric of 40% of claims considered to be fully developed by the VA; and requires quarterly data on the number and type of claims activities.

Sec. 406(4). County Veterans Services

Requires the MVAA to provide training to county veterans counselors (CVCs); establishes performance metrics for training and CVC-filed claims for VA benefits; and requires quarterly reports on the number and percentage of CVCs requesting training by the MVAA.

BOILERPLATE SECTION INFORMATION

Sec. 406(5). County Veterans Service Enhancement Grants

Specifies that the funds appropriated in part 1 be used, in part, to enhance the capacity and capabilities of CVCs, by providing a grant to implement an Internet-based data system, to increase the number of CVCs, and to increase the number of counties that provide benefit counseling services; and requires a quarterly report on grant activities.

Sec. 406(6). Legal Services/Federal Claims Representation

Authorizes up to \$50,000 from the funds appropriated in part 1 for MVAA administration to be expended to provide legal services to represent veterans benefit cases before federal courts in order to maintain accreditation by the VA.

Sec. 407. Grants to Veterans Service Organizations

Requires MVAA to provide grants to veterans service organizations (VSOs) in a manner that is consistent with MVAA performance goals and objectives; requires grant recipients to meet performance metrics, including a goal that 40% of VSO-filed claims for VA benefit be considered fully developed by the VA. Specifies the basic parameters of the grant agreement, including regional service delivery, payment of a fixed hourly rate of \$34.00 per hour, the provision of service hours based upon appropriations and the fixed hourly rate, including in state correctional facilities; and requires quarterly reports on claims activities.

Sec. 408. Veterans Trust Fund Administration

Requires the MVAA to provide emergency grants from the Michigan Veterans Trust Fund (MVTF) as provided by listed legal authorities; requires an annual report on MVTF financial and grant activities; and requires unexpended funds to lapse back to the MVTF.

CAPITAL OUTLAY

Sec. 501. Land and Acquisitions

Requires the department to provide for the acquisition and disposition of National Guard armories, facilities, and lands as provided under the Michigan Military Act; and requires a quarterly report on property sales and acquisitions.

Sec. 502. Special Maintenance – National Guard

Authorizes capital outlay appropriations to be carried forward at the end of the fiscal year; requires appropriations to be expended in accordance with sections 302 and 305 of the department budget act to modernize and repair National Guard facilities; and requires quarterly reports on maintenance projects at National Guard facilities funded from capital outlay appropriations made in part 1 and in prior appropriations years.

Sec. 503. Special Maintenance – Veterans Homes

Authorizes capital outlay appropriations to be carried forward at the end of the fiscal year; requires appropriations to be expended in accordance with section 402 of the department budget act to modernize and repair the two veterans homes; and requires quarterly reports on maintenance projects at the veterans' homes funded from capital outlay appropriations made in part 1 and in prior appropriations years.

ONE-TIME APPROPRIATIONS

Sec. 601. Armory Maintenance

Authorizes capital outlay appropriations to be carried forward at the end of the fiscal year; and requires appropriations to be expended in accordance with sections 302 and 305 of the department budget act to modernize and repair National Guard facilities.

PROVISIONS CONCERNING ANTICIPATED APPROPRIATIONS FOR FY 2018-19

Sec. 701. Anticipated Appropriations

Legislative intent to provide the same appropriations for FY 2018-19 as provided in FY 2017-18, except for where adjustments are made for caseload and related costs, federal fund match rates, economic factors, and available revenue.

Sec. 702. MVAA Outreach

Specifies that the MVAA shall provide quarterly reports on the percentage of Michigan veterans contacted through its outreach activities, with a goal of contacting 100% of Michigan veterans.

Sec. 703. MVAA Claims Services

Requires that 50% of MVAA-filed claims for VA benefits be fully-developed.
