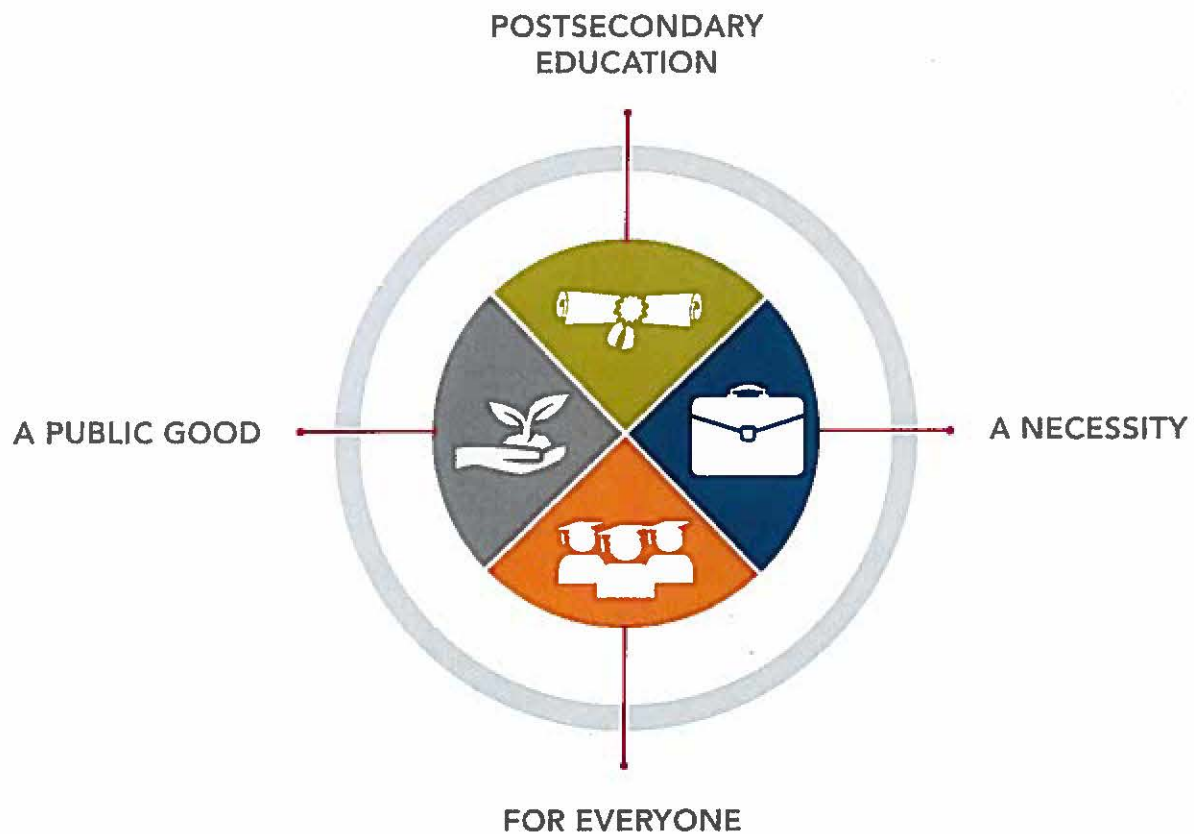
OUR MISSION

MICHIGAN'S EDUCATIONAL ATTAINMENT REPORT CARD

Michigan College Access Network is committed to monitoring statewide college access and success data through our public Michigan Educational Attainment Report Card. The dashboard utilizes benchmark data from the year 2012-13, and is updated annually to provide the most current available data for each goal and outcome measure.

The following is a snapshot of the current (or most up-to-date) available data for each goal and outcome measure. Arrows indicate if the outcome measure has gone up or down since the baseline year. GOAL #1 CULTURE
Enhance Michigan's College-Going Culture

Michigan residents who think college is very important to be successful in the labor market. **71.1%** ▼

Michigan residents who think that it is very likely that their child will get a college education **79%** ▼

GOAL #2 ACADEMIC READINESS
Increase the percentage of students who enter college prepared to succeed in credit bearing coursework

*Mean SAT score of 11th grade students **1001.2** ◀▶

*11th grade students scoring at or above the SAT college-ready benchmarks in both subjects **34.9%** ◀▶

Graduates enrolled not requiring remedial coursework **71.4%** ▼

**Beginning in 2016, the State of Michigan began assessing college readiness by utilizing the SAT. This data will serve as the new baseline moving forward.*

GOAL #3 FINANCIAL READINESS
Increase the percentage of students utilizing federal financial aid

Enrolled seniors completing the FAFSA **56.7%** ▲

GOAL #4 ENROLLMENT
Increase the percentage of students enrolling in college

Increase the percentage of students who enroll in college following high school graduation **63.4%** ▼

GOAL #5 COLLEGE PERSISTENCE
Significantly increase the percentage of students who persist toward degree completion

Graduates enrolled achieving at least 24 college credits within 16 months **71.9%** ▲

GOAL #6 COMPLETION
Increase the percentage of students completing postsecondary degrees and certificates

Students enrolled in Michigan's community colleges completing, graduating, or transferring within six years **54%** ▲

Students enrolled in Michigan's public universities graduating within six years **60.3%** ▲

Percent of high school graduates who complete a postsecondary certificate or degree within six years **34.6%** ▲

GOAL #7 ATTAINMENT
Big Goal: 60 percent of Michigan's residents will have a postsecondary degree or credential by the year 2025

Michigan young working-aged adults (25-34) with a degree or certificate **45.1%** ▲

Michigan working-aged adults (25-64) with a degree or certificate **43.3%** ▲

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THE GOAL

Advisers serve alongside existing school counselors as trained resources, mentors, and champions for higher education. As a result, the program will increase the number of students who make a successful transition to postsecondary education. There are currently 56 advisers serving 70 high schools.

THE MODEL

The program supports well-trained, dedicated, near-peer college advisers into high schools that serve significant numbers of low-income and first generation college students. Their efforts will contribute to a college-going culture within the high school.
