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GLOSSARY

STATE BUDGET TERMS

Line Item

Specific funding amount in an appropriation bill which establishes spending authorization for a particular program or function.

Boilerplate

Specific language sections in an appropriation bill which direct, limit, or restrict line-item expenditures, express legislative intent, and/or require reports.

Lapse

Appropriated amounts that are unspent or unobligated at the end of a fiscal year; appropriations are automatically terminated at the end of a fiscal year unless otherwise provided by law.

Work Project

Account authorized through statutory process which allows appropriated spending authorization from one fiscal year to be utilized for expenditures in a succeeding fiscal year or years for a specific project or purpose.

APPROPRIATIONS AND FUND SOURCES

Appropriations

Authority to expend funds for a particular purpose. An appropriation is not a mandate to spend.

Gross: Total of all applicable appropriations in an appropriation bill.

Adjusted Gross: Net amount of gross appropriations after subtracting interdepartmental grants (IDGs) and intradepartmental transfers (IDTs).

Interdepartmental Grant (IDG) Revenue

Funds received by one state department from another state department—usually for service(s) provided.

Intradepartmental Transfer (IDT) Revenue

Funds transferred from one appropriation unit to another within the same departmental budget.

Federal Revenue

Federal grant or match revenue; generally dedicated to specific programs or purposes.

Local Revenue

Revenue received from local units of government for state services.

Private Revenue

Revenue from non-government entities: rents, royalties or interest payments, payments from hospitals or individuals, or gifts and bequests.

State Restricted Revenue

State revenue restricted by the State Constitution, state statute, or outside restriction that is available only for specified purposes; includes most fee revenue; at yearend, unused restricted revenue generally remains in the restricted fund.

General Fund/General Purpose (GF/GP) Revenue

Unrestricted general fund revenue available to fund basic state programs and other purposes determined by the legislature; unused GF/GP revenue lapses to the General Fund at the end of a fiscal year.

MAJOR STATE FUNDS

General Fund

The state's primary operating fund; receives state revenue not dedicated to another state fund.

School Aid Fund (SAF)

A restricted fund that serves as the primary state funding source for K-12 schools and Intermediate School Districts. Constitutionally, SAF revenue may also be used for postsecondary education.

Budget Stabilization Fund

The Countercyclical Economic and Budget Stabilization Fund (also known as the "rainy day fund"); the Management and Budget Act provides guidelines for making deposits into and withdrawals from the fund.

DEPARTMENT OF STATE POLICE

The Department of State Police (MSP) is the state's primary law enforcement and emergency response authority, and is responsible for criminal law enforcement and investigations, traffic and commercial vehicle safety, emergency management and homeland security, and administering and providing various programs, services, and technologies to enhance the capabilities and coordination of federal, state, and local law enforcement agencies and the entire public safety community.

Criminal Justice Information Center Service Fees (\$2,584,600): Fees collected for various services, such as fingerprinting, criminal record checks, concealed pistol licensing, FOIA requests, and other services. Traffic Law Enforcement and Safety Fund (\$487,300): Established by the Michigan Vehicle Code, 1949 PA 300; supported by fees collected from driver's license applications and renewals pursuant to 1949 PA 300. MCL 257.811: funds utilized to enhance enforcement of traffic laws and ability to provide safety on state streets and highways.

Vehicle Sales Proceeds (\$450,000): Revenue from sales of MSP vehicles.

Drunk Driving Prevention and Training Fund (\$431,200): Established by Michigan Vehicle Code, 1949 PA 300; funded through a \$125 license re-instatement fee paid to Secretary of State, pursuant to MCL 257.320e. Supports purchase and maintenance of breath-alcohol testing equipment and law enforcement officer training on equipment use.

Motor Carrier Fees (\$351,200): Fees related to commercial vehicle operation within the state.

Highway Safety Fund (\$263,100): Established by Michigan Vehicle Code, 1949 PA 300; receives annual disbursement from Justice System Fund (1961 PA 236, MCL 600.181) of 23.66% of fund balance. Funds utilized for employment of enlisted personnel to enforce traffic laws on highways and freeways.

Marihuana Regulatory Fund (\$261,600): Established by Medical Marihuana Facilities Licensing Act, 2016 PA 281; receives application fees and regulatory assessments from medical marihuana facilities licensees.

State Services Fee Fund (\$213,000): Established by Michigan Gaming Control and Revenue Act, 1997 PA 69; supported by annual assessments from three Detroit casinos and application fees, license fees, and fines and penalties paid by casinos or their suppliers and employees.

Other State Restricted Revenue (\$457,700): Restricted revenue from various funds, service fees, and other sources.

SECTION 103: LAW ENFORCEMENT SERVICES

This appropriation unit provides funding for specific law enforcement functions and support services, including biometric and forensic science services, the Criminal Justice Information Center, Office of School Safety, State 911 Administration, and grants and training to local law enforcement and criminal justice agencies.

Criminal justice information center – 154.0 FTE positions (continued) <u>Criminal History Section</u>: Manages and maintains database of criminal arrests, charges, and convictions in Michigan, linking to FBI criminal records system; provides criminal history data to law enforcement agencies, employers, and regulators performing background checks, and to the public via Internet Criminal History Access Tool (ICHAT).

<u>Firearms Records</u>: Administers the Pistol Registration and License to Purchase program via the Michigan Pistol Sales Transfer and Licensing (miPistol) system, and maintains records of all handguns registered in Michigan; maintains all reported lost, stolen, and recovered gun records; serves as the point of contact for the FBI to ensure Michigan's compliance with the federal Brady Act.

<u>Law Enforcement Information Network (LEIN)</u>: Manages and maintains criminal justice database allowing entry, updates, and queries for records and information relating to warrants, stolen property, missing persons, protection orders, firearms records, Departments of State and Corrections records, sex offender registry status, and criminal history information.

Michigan Criminal Justice Information Network (MiCJIN): Provides a secure, single point of access to the range of law enforcement software applications utilized by state and local law enforcement agencies, including AFIS, SNAP, CODIS, LEIN, Department of State driver's license and state identification card images (MiDIRS), and firearms and sex offender registries.

<u>Michigan Incident Crime Reporting (MICR)</u>: Processes and analyzes crime data and publishes crime statistics on violent and property offenses, hate crimes, domestic violence, and law enforcement officers killed or assaulted.

<u>Public Information</u>: Coordinates and processes FOIA requests received by MSP and oversees retention of CJIC records.

<u>Set Aside and Expungement Unit</u>: Makes automatic criminal record set asides for all eligible individuals.

<u>Sex Offender Registry</u>: Manages and maintains law enforcement and public databases providing information on registered sex offenders and assists in enforcing registration requirements.

Statewide Records Management System (SRMS): Provides a single system to manage most aspects of a public safety agency's operations, including consolidating law enforcement and corrections records management. The program provides real-time and relevant public safety incident data to state, county, and local agencies; data is retrievable by both operational and administrative staff to enhance investigative efficiency and to provide accurate data to support evidence-based policing practices.

<u>Traffic Crash Reporting Section</u>: Compiles, processes, and evaluates traffic crash reports from state and local law enforcement agencies, manages and maintains central database of traffic crash data, provides extensive data on fatal crashes to federal government, trains officers on proper completion of crash reports, and collaborates with Department of State to update driver records.

<u>Auto Theft Prevention Program</u>: Serves Automobile Theft Prevention Authority (ATPA) by assessing scope of auto theft in the state, analyzing methods of combating auto theft, and administering grants awarded by ATPA to law enforcement agencies, prosecutors, and non-profit organizations for auto theft prevention activities.

<u>Prevention Services Section</u>: Supports activities of community service troopers assigned to posts across the state to conduct community outreach and engagement, as well as other community engagement and outreach programs.

<u>Management Services Section</u>: Oversees MSP owned and leased properties and procures and distributes uniforms and supplies to MSP personnel.

Criminal Justice Information Center Service Fees (\$22,534,800): Fees collected for various services, such as fingerprinting, criminal record checks, concealed pistol licensing, FOIA requests, and other services. Auto Theft Prevention Fund (\$8,226,800): Established by Insurance Code Act 1956, 1956 PA 218, under authority of Auto Theft Prevention Authority; supported by a \$1 per non-commercial vehicle assessment paid annually by automobile insurers operating within the state.

State Services Fee Fund (\$7,988,600): Established by Michigan Gaming Control and Revenue Act, 1997 PA 69; supported by annual assessments from three Detroit casinos and application fees, license fees, and fines and penalties paid by casinos or their suppliers and emplovees.

State Police Administrator and Coordinator 911 Fund (\$1,126,500): Established by Emergency 911 Service Enabling Act. 1986 PA 32. receives 2.44% of collections in the Emergency 911 Fund. Supports administration of the Emergency 911 Service Enabling Act and the office of the state 911 coordinator.

Forensic Science Reimbursement Fees (\$1,002,000): Pursuant to MCL 12.207, receives 45% of the balance in the State Laboratory Fund. Supports the cost of DNA profiling and DNA retention under the DNA Identification Profiling System Act of 1990.

State Forensic Laboratory Fund (\$767,600): Established by Forensic Lab Funding Act, 1994 PA 35, receives 5.35% of the monthly balance in the Justice System Fund. Pursuant to statute, 45% of the 5.35% is distributed to MSP for DNA profiling and retention and 55% is distributed to MSP and municipalities for conducting forensic laboratory

Sex Offenders Registration Fund (\$391,800): Established by Sex Offenders Registration Act, 1994 PA 295; funded through collection of \$30 from each registration. Supports training and maintenance regarding law enforcement database, publicly accessible website, and other requirements of the act.

Other State Restricted Revenue (\$1,291,800): Includes various other revenue sources, such as motor carrier fees, MSP precision driving track fees, and traffic crash revenue.

Appropriates up to \$2.0 million in federal and \$4.0 million in state restricted contingency authorization; authorizes expenditure of funds after legislative transfer to specific line items.

Sec. 212. Transparency Website

Stipulates that the legislature may intertransfer funds via concurrent resolution if the State Administrative Board transfers funds. (Governor's signing letter states this section is unenforceable.)

Sec. 219. Retention of Reports

Requires MSP to receive and retain copies of all reports funded by the department's budget, while complying with federal and state guidelines for records retention.

Sec. 220. Report on Policy Changes for Public Act Implementation

Requires MSP to report on policy changes made to implement public acts that took effect during the prior calendar year.

Sec. 221. Severance Pay Reporting

Requires MSP to report any severance pay for a director or other high-ranking official not later than 14 days after a severance agreement is signed; requires report on total amount of severance pay remitted and number of MSP employees receiving severance pay in FY 2022-23.

Sec. 222. In-Person Work

Expresses legislative intent that MSP maximize the efficiency of the state workforce and prioritize in-person work where possible, and post its in-person, remote, or hybrid work policy on its website.

Sec. 223. Access to Government Services

Prohibits funding from being used to restrict or impede a marginalized community's access to government resources, programs, or facilities; requires local governments to report any action or policy that attempts to restrict or interfere with a local health officer's duties.

Sec. 224. Biannual Reporting on Achieving Requirements

Requires MSP to provide biannual reports on its performance against metrics cited in the act, status of work projects, and financial status.

Sec. 225. Byrne Justice Assistance Grant

Requires MSP to provide \$1.5 million in federal Byrne grants to Judiciary via interdepartmental grant, if grant funds are available.

Sec. 226. Post Closure or Consolidation

Requires MSP to notify listed recipients when it recommends closure or consolidation of any MSP post and to include a local and state impact study.

Sec. 227. Privatization Project Plans - UNENFORCEABLE

Requires submission of a project plan if MSP presents the state employer with a plan to privatize and requires evaluation within 30 months. (Governor's signing letter states this section is unenforceable.)

Sec. 228. Contractual Services Reimbursement

Requires MSP to be reimbursed for all costs incurred providing contractual services; requires services provided to entities other than local units of government be provided on an overtime basis; authorizes MSP to expend reimbursements for contractual services that are in excess of appropriations, if authorized by SBO in SIGMA; requires notification if additional authorization is approved.

Sec. 229. Michigan Public Safety Communications System

Requires MSP to act as a liaison between DTMB and various public safety agencies for issues related to Michigan Public Safety Communications System.

Sec. 230. Departmental Fees

Authorizes MSP to establish and collect fees for publications, videos, conferences, workshops, and related materials; outlines permitted uses of collected fees; limits fees to cost of expenditures.

Sec. 231. Authorization to Expend Private Donations

Authorizes MSP to accept monetary and non-monetary donations for purposes designated by the donor; authorizes carry forward of unexpended funds; authorizes receive and expend, upon notification, of private donations received in excess of private revenue appropriations.

Sec. 232. Receive and Expend Authorization for Federal Revenues

Authorizes MSP to expend federal revenues received in excess of appropriations; requires MSP to report prior to expending excess federal revenues.

Sec. 233. Data Privacy

Expresses legislative intent that MSP protect data from unauthorized access or use and lists measures; requires department to notify data subjects if an unauthorized person accesses their information.

Sec. 234. Officer Evaluation Criteria - UNENFORCEABLE

Prohibits use of citation volumes as a metric for performance evaluation and prohibits setting of a specified number of citations for an officer. (Governor's signing letter states this section is unenforceable.)

Sec. 235. School Education Initiatives

Stipulates MSP shall collaborate with MDHHS and MDE to advise on training school and educational personnel to utilize trauma-informed practices and age-appropriate education on human trafficking and sexual abuse prevention.

Sec. 236. Grants Transparency

Provides process requirements for grants or projects awarded to single recipient organizations or local governments.

DEPARTMENTAL ADMINISTRATION AND SUPPORT

Sec. 301. Professional Development Training

Allows the Professional Development Bureau to conduct the following trainings: training directly related to an employee's departmental role, professional development training, training that allows the employee to seek expanded opportunities within MSP, advanced education training, and de-escalation training; requires a report on training courses and outlines required information.

Sec. 302. Local Law Enforcement Training

Requires MSP to work with MDCR and MCOLES to provide the following training to local police departments and officers free of charge: cultural awareness and competency, tolerance, diversity, and implicit bias, conflict management and de-escalation, use of force on vulnerable individuals, and mental health and wellness; requires quarterly reporting on the training.

LAW ENFORCEMENT SERVICES

Sec. 401. Training

Requires MSP to develop and deliver training that supports enforcement and public safety efforts of criminal justice community; report performance data; report recruit school admissions and graduations; distribute and review of course evaluations.

Sec. 402. Criminal Justice Information Center

Requires MSP to (1) maintain criminal justice information systems in support of public safety and law enforcement communities; (2) conduct at least 30 outreach activities targeted to criminal justice agencies and to report on these activities; (3) compile crime statistics; (4) compile and evaluate traffic crash reports; (5) provide traffic crash reports for \$15 per incident or an extract of electronic traffic crash data for \$0.25 per incident; (6) report traffic crash report revenues, expenditures, and adequacy; (7) maintain, disseminate, and exchange criminal history and juvenile records; (8) maintain records, including firearms licensure records; (9) provide background check volume processed by the Internet Criminal History Access Tool; requires that Criminal Justice Information Center Service Fees carry forward and not lapse to the general fund; requires unexpended revenue generated by local State Records Management System Fees to carry forward and not lapse to the general fund.

Sec. 403. Forensic Science

Requires MSP to provide forensic testing and DNA analysis services to aid in criminal investigations and to maintain accreditation of laboratories; stipulates turnaround times for forensic science services; requires MSP to provide data on turnaround times, staffing levels, and backlogged cases.

Sec. 404. Biometrics and Identification

Requires MSP to manage specified identification databases and provide data on submissions to the Automated Fingerprint Identification System database; requires MSP to maintain staffing and resources to achieve an average 28-day wait time for polygraph examinations, with a goal of an average 15-day wait time; requires MSP to post changes to protocols for retention and purging of DNA records.

Sec. 405. Sexual Assault Kit Analysis Report

Requires a report on sexual assault kit backlog at the beginning and end of prior fiscal year, volumes of sexual assault kits collected and analyzed during that period, and average turnaround time to analyze sexual assault kits.

Sec. 406. Community Service Programs

Requires MSP to provide administrative support for Auto Theft Prevention Authority, Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Program and other grant programs, Office of School Safety, and OK2SAY program.

Sec. 407. School Safety Report

Requires Office of School Safety to submit report detailing incidents of school violence or threats, OK2SAY-based incidences and activities, and recommendations for school safety measures.

Sec. 408. Trooper Recruit School Onboarding, Training, and Outfitting

Stipulates that unexpended GF/GP appropriated for Trooper Recruit School Onboarding, Training, and Outfitting must be deposited into the Trooper Recruit School Fund created under the Michigan Vehicle Code, 1949 PA 300.

MICHIGAN COMMISSION ON LAW ENFORCEMENT STANDARDS

Sec. 501. Commission on Law Enforcement Standards

Stipulates MCOLES' responsibilities and requires maintenance of proper staffing and resource levels to update standards within 120 days of enactment date of new applicable legislation.

Sec. 502. Public Safety Officers Benefit Fund

Requires GF/GP appropriated for Public Safety Officers Benefit Fund to be deposited to the Public Safety Officers Benefit Fund and appropriates all funds within the Public Safety Officers Benefit Fund.

Sec. 503. In-service Training

Requires funds appropriated for In-service Training to be deposited into the Law Enforcement Officers Training Fund; appropriates all funds in the Law Enforcement Officers Training Fund for expenditure to support implementation of required annual in-serve training standards for all licensed law enforcement officers.

FIELD SERVICES

Sec. 601. General Law Enforcement and Traffic Safety - PARTIALLY UNENFORCEABLE

(1) Stipulates MSP troopers shall not be prohibited from responding to criminal or emergency situations and shall make every effort to protect residents; (2) requires MSP to maintain staff and resources to enhance traffic safety and dedicate a minimum of 455,200 hours to statewide patrol, with a minimum of 40,000 in distressed cities; (3) requires MSP to report number of residence checks of registered sex offenders; (4) requires report on Secure Cities Partnership. (Governor's signing letter states item (2) is unenforceable.)

Sec. 602. Criminal Investigations - PARTIALLY UNENFORCEABLE

(1) Requires MSP to identify and apprehend criminals through investigations; (2) requires maintenance of investigation hours; (3) requires MSP to meet or exceed case clearance rate of 62%; (4) requires MSP to provide training opportunities to local law enforcement partners related to gambling, opioid investigations, and other emerging issues; (5) requires MSP to maintain staffing to investigate an average level of opioid cases and to link investigations among partners. (Governor's signing letter states items (2) through (5) are unenforceable.)

Sec. 603. Tobacco Tax Fraud Investigations

(1) Requires MSP to provide prevention and suppression of organized untaxed tobacco smuggling; (2) requires submission of report pertaining to tobacco tax enforcement activities and expenditures.

Sec. 604. Fire Investigations - PARTIALLY UNENFORCEABLE

(1) Requires MSP to provide fire investigation training and assistance; (2) requires MSP to maintain readiness for a specified number of requests for fire investigation services and be available for call out statewide. (Governor's signing letter states item (2) is unenforceable.)

Sec. 605. Department Diversity

Requires MSP to make an organized and strategic effort to recruit new employees that mirror the diversity of Michigan's communities, including individuals who are Black, Jewish, Native American, LGBTQ+, Indian/Hindu, Hispanic, Arab/Muslim, and Asian and Pacific Islander; requires an annual report on MSP's diversification efforts; allows MSP to utilize attrition savings to offset costs of diversity recruiting.

SPECIALIZED SERVICES

Sec. 701. Intelligence and Special Operations – PARTIALLY UNENFORCEABLE

(1) Requires MSP to operate Michigan Intelligence Operations Center for Homeland Security (MIOC); (2) requires MSP to provide timely and accurate information to partners regarding critical information key resource threats and to increase public awareness on how to report suspicious activity; (3) requires MSP to operate Cyber Section and to maintain staffing; (4) requires MSP to provide digital forensic analysis and states case turnaround goal. (Governor's signing letter states items (3) and (4) are unenforceable.)

Sec. 702. Specialized Support Teams - PARTIALLY UNENFORCEABLE

(1) Requires MSP to provide specialized support services; (2) requires MSP to maintain staffing and resources to provide training and maintain readiness to respond to an average number of specialty service requests; (3) requires canine unit to be available for call out 100% of the time; (4) requires bomb squad unit to be available for call out 100% of the time; (5) requires emergency support teams to be available for call out 100% of the time; (6) requires marine services team to be available for call out 100% of the time; (7) requires aviation services to be available for call out 100% of the time, unless prohibited by weather or mechanical breakdown; (8) requires maintenance of adequate levels of staffing and resources to provide security services at state Capitol Building and other state buildings and requires a minimum of 35,000 patrols at state-owned and leased facilities. (Governor's signing letter states items (2) through (8) are unenforceable.)

Sec. 703. Commercial Vehicle Regulation and Enforcement

(1) Requires MSP to maintain commercial vehicle and enforcement activities; (2) requires MSP to meet inspection goals consistent with the federal motor carrier assistance program; (3) authorizes revenues collected under the Motor Carrier Act of 1933 to be expended and to be carried forward.

Sec. 704. Emergency Management and Homeland Security – PARTIALLY UNENFORCEABLE

(1) Requires MSP to coordinate emergency and disaster response activities of governmental units; (2) authorizes expenditure of appropriated funds to call upon state agencies or departments to protect life or property or to protect health or safety of any area under a state of emergency or disaster; requires report to state budget director and submission of recommendations to legislature for supplemental appropriations; (3) authorizes MSP to expend additional funds from various sources to provide emergency management training or emergency response activities with notification of legislature; limits federal receive and expend under Sec. 704(3) and Sec. 232 to \$105.0 million; (4) requires MSP to maintain partnerships to protect the state from all hazards; (5) requires MSP to serve local emergency management preparedness programs and local emergency planning committees, operate and maintain State Emergency Operations Center, respond to civil disorders and natural disasters at a specified level, and perform hazardous materials response training; (6) requires MSP to conduct a minimum of three training sessions to enhance emergency response; (7) appropriates amounts necessary from Disaster and Emergency Contingency Fund to cover costs related to disasters and emergencies; (8) requires reporting if expenditures are made from the Disaster and Emergency Contingency Fund; (9) requires MSP to report biannually on assessment of critical infrastructure vulnerabilities; (10) requires carryforward of unexpended revenue collected for the emergency management and homeland security training center. (Governor's signing letter states items (8) and (9) are unenforceable.)

Sec. 705. Highway Safety Planning

Requires MSP to provide highway traffic safety programs in partnership with other public and private organizations.

Sec. 706. Secondary Road Patrol Program

Requires department to provide funding to county sheriff's departments to patrol secondary roads; stipulates sheriffs' duties under Secondary Road Patrol program.

ONE-TIME APPROPRIATIONS

Sec. 801. Community-Based Crisis Response Pilot Grants

(1) Requires Community-Based Crisis Response pilot grants be available to the cities of Ann Arbor, Dearborn, and Kalamazoo; (2) requires grant recipients provide 25% match to any state funding; (3) stipulates that an individual grant award cannot exceed \$500,000 in a fiscal year; (4) defines the term "community-based response program"; (5) provides work project status to unexpended funds; (6) allows MSP to expend up to \$50,000 for administering the grants; (7) requires a city that receives a grant to report to MSP and delineates information to be reported; (8) requires MSP to submit a report based on information reported under item (7).

Sec. 802. Michigan International Speedway Traffic Control

Allocates \$200,000 from the Contracts and Services line item for provision of traffic control support at MIS.

Sec. 803. Emergency Alert System Upgrades

Requires MSP to utilize the Emergency Alert System Upgrades appropriation to implement a statewide redundant emergency alert system network and perform equipment upgrades.

Sec. 804. MCOLES Active Shooter Response Training

Requires that \$1.3 million be allocated to MCOLES for training law enforcement officers on responding to active shooter situations.

Sec. 805. Firearms Safety

Allows MSP to collaborate with MDHHS to distribute firearms safety equipment to the public and law enforcement agencies at no cost.
