




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Most of the information in this report is for fiscal year 2018, which is October 1, 2017 to September 30, 2018.



## CWD

Montana Agency of Natural Resources & Fish, Wildlife and Parks are working with a coalition of state and federal partners to combat Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD). This highly infectious disease has been found in more than 20 states and two provinces across North America, and is considered a serious threat to the health of the nation's deer population.

In Montana, we have had 4,700+ confirmed deer testing positive, and could over 100,000 additional deer and mule deer tested. We are continuing to work with our partners to combat CWD. We have received several grants from foundations and individuals to help us continue our efforts.

Montana Agent and Title of DPA, the CWD Research and Management Program Manager, Dr. Mark Madl, says "Montana's continued commitment to test deer and mule deer for CWD is critical to our ability to manage this disease effectively. We are grateful for the support of our partners and the public in our efforts to combat CWD."



**Wildlife Classroom Curricula**

During the 2017-18 school year, five different wildlife curricula were offered for kindergarten through high school students:

1. Go Minnie! (kindergarten through 5th grades) had 867 educators register to participate reaching over 41,000 students.
2. During June Camp 2017 (kindergarten through 4th grades) 54 educators taught 3,000+ students.
3. A 4-week in Wondervan Wolf Hills and Waterflow (6 - 8th grades) had 65 educators register reaching over 4,500 students.
4. After Fall months informal students, 4 classes in the 11th and 12th grade Michigan Black Bear curriculum had 27 participating educators who reached an estimate 3,500 students.
5. DNR University curriculum (9 - 12th grades) had over 1,100 high school educators participating under instruction of 111 educators.
