STATE SUMMATIVE ASSESSMENTS

M-STEP (Michigan Student Test of Educational Progress)

- Given to students in grades 3-7 to measure student progress on academic standards in English language arts (ELA) and mathematics
- Given to students in grades 5, 8, and 11 to measure student progress on science (field test) and social studies standards

• PSAT (Pre-SAT by College Board)

- PSAT 8/9 given to students in grade 8 to measure student progress on academic standards in ELA and mathematics *and* prepare for SAT taken in high school
- PSAT 8/9 for students in grade 9 (no statewide reporting or accountability)
- PSAT 10 for students in grade 10 (no statewide reporting or accountability)

STATE SUMMATIVE ASSESSMENTS (CONT'D)

• MME (Michigan Merit Exam):

- Given to students in grade 11
- Consists of three required components:
 - SAT with Essay to measure student progress on ELA and mathematics standards and college readiness
 - M-STEP to measure student progress on science and social studies standards
 - ACT WorkKeys to measure work place readiness

REIMBURSEMENT FOR VENDOR-PROVIDED BENCHMARK ASSESSMENTS

- Districts may select vendor-provided assessment options that meet defined criteria and apply for grant funding to supplement the cost for their LEA
- Covered grades K-8, for ELA and Math
 - 651 Districts Applied, Covering 924,896 Students
 - Average per student amount provided to districts was \$9.94
