HOUSE BILL NO. 5512**

A bill to make, supplement, adjust, and consolidate appropriations for the department of natural resources for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2025; to provide for certain conditions on appropriations; and to provide for the expenditure of the appropriations.

GENERAL SECTIONS

Sec. 201. In accordance with section 30 of article IX of the state constitution of 1963, for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2025, total state spending under part 1 from state sources is \$421,622,900.00 and state spending under part 1 from state sources to be paid to local units of government is \$11,252,900.00. The following itemized statement identifies appropriations from which spending to local units of government will occur:

15 Sec. 202. The appropriations under this part and part 1 are
 16 subject to the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1101
 17 to 18.1594.

18 Sec. 203. As used in this part and part 1:

19 (a) "Department" means the department of natural resources.

20 (b) "Director" means the director of the department.

21 (c) "FTE" means full-time equated.

22 (d) "IDG" means interdepartmental grant.

23 (e) "Standard report recipients" means the senate
 24 appropriations subcommittee on agriculture and natural resources,
 25 the house appropriations subcommittee on agriculture and rural
 26 development and natural resources, the senate and house fiscal
 27 agencies, the senate and house policy offices, and the state budget
 28 office.

29 Sec. 204. The department shall use the internet to fulfill the



1 reporting requirements of this part. This requirement includes
2 transmitting reports to the standard report recipients by email and
3 posting the reports on an internet site.

4 Sec. 205. To the extent permissible under section 261 of the
5 management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1261, all of the
6 following apply to the expenditure of funds appropriated in part 1:

7 (a) The funds must not be used for the purchase of foreign
8 goods or services, or both, if competitively priced and of
9 comparable quality American goods or services, or both, are
10 available.

11 (b) Preference must be given to goods or services, or both,
12 manufactured or provided by Michigan businesses, if they are
13 competitively priced and of comparable quality.

14 (c) Preference must be given to goods or services, or both,
15 that are manufactured or provided by Michigan businesses owned and
16 operated by veterans, if they are competitively priced and of
17 comparable quality.

18 Sec. 206. The department shall not take disciplinary action
19 against an employee of the department for communicating with a
20 member of the legislature or legislative staff, unless the
21 communication is prohibited by law and the department is exercising
22 its authority as provided by law.

23 Sec. 207. Consistent with section 217 of the management and
24 budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1217, the department shall prepare
25 a report on out-of-state travel expenses not later than January 1.
26 The report must list all travel by classified and unclassified
27 employees outside this state in the previous fiscal year that was
28 funded in whole or in part with funds appropriated in the
29 department's budget. The department shall submit the report to the



1 standard report recipients and to the senate and house
2 appropriations committees. The report must include all of the
3 following information:

4 (a) The dates of each travel occurrence.

5 (b) The total transportation and related expenses of each
6 travel occurrence and the proportions funded with state general
7 fund/general purpose revenues, state restricted revenues, federal
8 revenues, and other revenues.

9 Sec. 208. The department shall not use funds appropriated in
10 part 1 to hire a person to provide legal services that are the
11 responsibility of the attorney general. This section does not apply
12 to legal services for bonding activities or to outside legal
13 services that the attorney general authorizes.

14 Sec. 209. Not later than December 15, the state budget office
15 shall prepare and submit a report that provides estimates of the
16 total general fund/general purpose appropriation lapses at the
17 close of the previous fiscal year. The report must summarize the
18 projected year-end general fund/general purpose appropriation
19 lapses by major departmental program or program areas. The state
20 budget office shall submit the report to the standard report
21 recipients and to the chairpersons of the senate and house
22 appropriations committees.

23 Sec. 210. In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1,
24 there is appropriated an amount not to exceed \$25,000,000.00 for
25 state restricted contingency authorization. Amounts appropriated
26 under this subsection are not available for expenditure until they
27 have been transferred to another line item in part 1 under section
28 393(2) of the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1393.

29 Sec. 211. The department shall cooperate with the department



1 of technology, management, and budget to maintain a searchable
2 website accessible by the public at no cost that includes, but is
3 not limited to, all of the following for the department:

4 (a) Fiscal year-to-date expenditures by category.

5 (b) Fiscal year-to-date expenditures by appropriation unit.

6 (c) Fiscal year-to-date payments to a selected vendor,
7 including the vendor name, payment date, payment amount, and
8 payment description.

9 (d) The number of active department employees by job
10 classification.

11 (e) Job specifications and wage rates.

12 Sec. 212. Not later than 14 days after the release of the
13 executive budget recommendation, the department shall cooperate
14 with the state budget office to provide an annual report on
15 estimated state restricted fund balances, state restricted fund
16 projected revenues, and state restricted fund expenditures for the
17 previous 2 fiscal years. The report must be submitted to the
18 standard report recipients and to the chairpersons of the senate
19 and house appropriations committees.

20 Sec. 214. (1) Funds appropriated in part 1 must not be used to
21 restrict or impede a marginalized community's access to government
22 resources, programs, or facilities.

23 (2) From the funds appropriated in part 1, local governments
24 shall report any action or policy that attempts to restrict or
25 interfere with the duties of a local health officer.

26 Sec. 215. To the extent permissible under the management and
27 budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1101 to 18.1594, the director shall
28 take all reasonable steps to ensure geographically-disadvantaged
29 business enterprises compete for and perform contracts to provide



1 services or supplies, or both. The director shall strongly
2 encourage firms with which the department contracts to subcontract
3 with certified geographically-disadvantaged business enterprises
4 for services, supplies, or both. As used in this section,
5 "geographically-disadvantaged business enterprises" means that term
6 as defined in Executive Directive No. 2019-08.

7 Sec. 216. On a quarterly basis, the department shall report on
8 the number of full-time equated positions in pay status by civil
9 service classification, including a comparison by line item of the
10 number of full-time equated positions authorized from funds
11 appropriated in part 1 to the actual number of full-time equated
12 positions employed by the department at the end of the reporting
13 period. The report must be submitted to the senate and house
14 appropriations committees and to the standard report recipients.

15 Sec. 217. It is the intent of the legislature that the
16 department maximize the efficiency of the state workforce, and, if
17 possible, prioritize in-person work, and post its in-person,
18 remote, or hybrid work policy on its website.

19 Sec. 219. The department shall receive and retain copies of
20 all reports funded from appropriations in part 1. The department
21 shall follow federal and state guidelines for short-term and long-
22 term retention of records. The department may electronically retain
23 copies of reports unless otherwise required by federal and state
24 guidelines.

25 Sec. 220. Not later than April 1, the department shall report
26 on each specific policy change made to implement a public act
27 affecting the department that took effect during the previous
28 calendar year. The department shall submit the report to the
29 standard report recipients, to the senate and house appropriations



1 committees, and to the joint committee on administrative rules.

2 Sec. 222. To the extent possible, the department shall not
3 expend appropriations under part 1 until all existing authorized
4 work project funds available for the same purposes are exhausted.

5 Sec. 225. Funds appropriated under part 1 or this part must
6 not be used for construction, repair, or remodeling of a building
7 or structure owned or leased by this state unless the construction,
8 repair, or remodeling is performed by individuals who have
9 completed or are enrolled in a registered apprenticeship program,
10 as that term is defined in 29 USC 50c, that is certified as
11 approved by the United States Secretary of Labor as described in 29
12 USC 50c.

13 Sec. 226. (1) In addition to the money appropriated in part 1,
14 there is appropriated, from the following state restricted funds
15 and accounts of the Michigan conservation and recreation legacy
16 fund, the following amounts to the following departments and
17 officers:

11 (d) Michigan state parks endowment fund.

12 (e) Michigan nongame fish and wildlife trust fund.

13 Sec. 227. Pursuant to section 43703(3) of the natural
14 resources and environmental protection act, 1994 PA 451, MCL
15 324.43703, there is appropriated from the Michigan game and fish
16 protection trust fund to the game and fish protection account of
17 the Michigan conservation and recreation legacy fund, \$6,000,000.00
18 for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2025.

19 Sec. 228. The department may contract with or provide grants
20 to local units of government, institutions of higher education, or
21 nonprofit organizations to support activities authorized by
22 appropriations in part 1. As used in this section, contracts and
23 grants include, but are not limited to, contracts and grants for
24 research, wildlife and fisheries management, forest management,
25 invasive species monitoring and control, and natural resource-
26 related programs.

27 Sec. 229. To the extent permissible under section 261 of the
28 management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1261, preference
29 must be given to goods or services, or both, that are energy



1 efficient and minimize noise pollution, if they are competitively
 2 priced and of comparable quality.

3

4 **COMMUNICATION AND CUSTOMER SERVICES**

5 Sec. 240. (1) In addition to supporting the existing
 6 archeological responsibilities of the department within the
 7 Michigan History Center, the funds appropriated in part 1 for
 8 cultural resource management and cultural resource management one-
 9 time shall be utilized to continue the ongoing process of increased
 10 consultation with known lineal descendants and officials of Native
 11 American tribes on whose aboriginal lands a planned archeological
 12 activity will occur or an inadvertent discovery has been made. The
 13 consultation shall address the identification, treatment, and
 14 disposition of Native American cultural items.

15 (2) The department is encouraged to, whenever possible,
 16 repatriate or transfer from its collections Native American
 17 cultural items, including human remains, funerary objects, sacred
 18 objects, and objects of cultural patrimony, to the lineal
 19 descendants and to Native American tribes described in subsection
 20 (1).

21

22 **DEPARTMENT INITIATIVES**

23 Sec. 251. From the amounts appropriated in part 1 for invasive
 24 species prevention and control, the department shall allocate not
 25 less than \$3,600,000.00 for grants for the prevention, detection,
 26 eradication, and control of invasive species.

27 Sec. 252. (1) In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1,
 28 revenue deposited in the invasive species fund created in section
 29 41311 of the natural resources and environmental protection act,



1 1994 PA 451, MCL 324.41311, is appropriated and may be expended for
 2 invasive species immediate response efforts.

3 (2) The department shall annually notify the house and senate
 4 appropriations subcommittees on natural resources and the house and
 5 senate fiscal agencies of any expenditure of funds appropriated
 6 under subsection (1).
 7

8 **DEPARTMENT SUPPORT SERVICES**

9 Sec. 302. The department may charge land acquisition projects
 10 appropriated for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2025, and for
 11 prior fiscal years, a standard percentage fee to recover actual
 12 costs, and may use the revenue derived to fund the land acquisition
 13 service charges provided for in part 1.

14 Sec. 303. As appropriated in part 1, the department may charge
 15 both application fees and transaction fees related to the exchange
 16 or sale of state-owned land or rights in land authorized by part 21
 17 of the natural resources and environmental protection act, 1994 PA
 18 451, MCL 324.2101 to 324.2165. To the extent consistent with part
 19 21, fees shall be set by the director at a rate that allows the
 20 department to recover its costs for providing these services.

21 Sec. 304. In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1, the
 22 department may receive and expend money from state restricted
 23 sources to pay vendor costs associated with administering sales of
 24 carbon offset credits.
 25

26 **COMMUNICATION AND CUSTOMER SERVICES**

27 Sec. 408. By December 1, the department shall submit to the
 28 senate and house appropriations subcommittees on natural resources
 29 a report on all land transactions approved by the natural resources



1 commission in the prior fiscal year. For each land transaction, the
2 report shall include the size of the parcel, the county and
3 municipality in which the parcel is located, the dollar amount of
4 the transaction, the fund source affected by the transaction, and
5 whether the transaction is by purchase, public auction, transfer,
6 exchange, or conveyance.

7

8 **FOREST RESOURCES DIVISION**

9 Sec. 802. (1) From the funds appropriated in part 1, the
10 department shall, by January 1, prepare and submit to the senate
11 and house appropriations subcommittees on natural resources and the
12 standing committees of the senate and house with primary
13 responsibility for natural resources issues a report on all of the
14 following:

15 (a) The number of acres of state forestland prepared for
16 timber harvesting in the prior fiscal year.

17 (b) The number of acres of state forestland timber sold in the
18 prior fiscal year.

19 (c) The amount of revenue generated by the timber sale and
20 harvesting of state land in the prior fiscal year.

21 Sec. 803. In addition to the money appropriated in part 1, the
22 department may receive and expend money from federal sources to
23 provide response to wildfires and hazard incidents as required by a
24 compact with the federal government. If additional expenditure
25 authorization is required, the department shall so notify the state
26 budget office. The department shall notify the house and senate
27 appropriations subcommittees on natural resources and the house and
28 senate fiscal agencies by November 15 of the expenditures under
29 this section during the prior fiscal year.



1 Sec. 807. (1) In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1,
2 there is appropriated from the disaster and emergency contingency
3 fund up to \$800,000.00 to cover department costs related to any
4 disaster as defined in section 2 of the emergency management act,
5 1976 PA 390, MCL 30.402.

6 (2) Funds appropriated under subsection (1) shall not be
7 expended unless the state budget director recommends the
8 expenditure and the department notifies the house and senate
9 committees on appropriations. By December 1 each year, the
10 department shall provide a report to the senate and house fiscal
11 agencies and the state budget office on the use of the disaster and
12 emergency contingency fund during the prior fiscal year.

13 (3) If Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA)
14 reimbursement is approved for costs paid from the disaster and
15 emergency contingency fund, the federal revenue shall be deposited
16 into the disaster and emergency contingency fund.

17
18 **GRANTS**

19 Sec. 1001. Federal pass-through funds to local institutions
20 and governments that are received in amounts in addition to those
21 included in part 1 for grants to communities - federal oil, gas,
22 and timber payments and that do not require additional state
23 matching funds are appropriated for the purposes intended. By
24 November 30, the department shall report to the senate
25 appropriations subcommittee on agriculture and natural resources,
26 the house appropriations subcommittee on agriculture and rural
27 development and natural resources, the senate and house fiscal
28 agencies, and the state budget director on all amounts appropriated
29 under this section during the prior fiscal year.



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CAPITAL OUTLAY

Sec. 1103. The appropriations in part 1 for capital outlay shall be carried forward at the end of the fiscal year consistent with section 248 of the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1248.

ONE-TIME APPROPRIATIONS

Sec. 1201. (1) From the unexpended and unencumbered funds appropriated in 2022 PA 166 and 2023 PA 119 for equipment lifecycle replacement and body cameras for conservation officers, the following appropriations shall be made:

(a) \$3,000,000.00 for Huron Waterloo Pathways Initiative's Border-To-Border trail.

(b) \$1,000,000.00 for Upper Peninsula ski jump project.

(c) \$1,000,000.00 for Michigan the Beautiful Initiative.

(2) The funds appropriated under subsection (1) are considered work project appropriations for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2025. Any unencumbered or unallotted funds shall not lapse at the end of the fiscal year and shall be available for expenditure in succeeding years. The following is in compliance with section 451a of the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1451a:

(a) The purpose of the projects are to develop trail networks; to develop ski jump opportunities; and for staff, research, and data compilation to conserve 30% of state land and water by 2030.

(b) The projects will be accomplished by state employees or by contracts.

(c) The total estimated cost of the projects is \$5,000,000.00.

(d) The tentative completion date is September 30, 2029.
