A Healthy Economy Relies on Good Highways

- 36% of US/Canada trade flows through Michigan
- \$860 billion in freight is moved each year on Michigan's highways, rail air, & water ports
- Trucking accounts for 73% of all freight tonnage moved in Michigan
- 80% of Michigan tourism is auto-based






All Transportation Supports the Economy

- Operation of bus transit systems contribute an estimated \$740 million to the economy each year
- Passenger rail is expected to generate between \$1.0-1.5 billion in net economic benefit annually
- Aviation contributes more than \$20 billion/year
- Bicycling provides an estimated \$668 million/year in economic benefit





Michigan's Multi-Modal Transportation System



- Although the state trunkline system (M, US or I routes) accounts for only 8 percent of centerline miles, it carries 53 percent of all traffic and approximately 66 percent of commercial truck traffic.
- There were 95.1 billion Annual Vehicle Miles of Travel (AVMT) for all roads (2015).
- 51.5 billion AVMT on trunkline roads.
 43.6 billion AVMT on non-trunkline roads.
- As noted in the 2017-2021 Five-Year Program, MDOT will invest \$1.2 billion in its highway program, supporting 15,000 jobs during 2017.
- . Michigan's system of 122,280 miles of public roads is:
 - 10th largest in the nation.
- 28th largest state highway system.
- * Michigan's local roads are the nation's:
 - 4th largest county road system.
 - (89,512 route miles as of 2015 FHWA statistics)

 21st largest city street system.
 - (21,214 route miles as of 2015 FHWA statistics)
- LOCAL TRANSIT SYSTEMS

Using the Comprehensive Transportation Fund, MDOT provides a portion of the funding for the local but transit system, which consists of 80 agencies ranging from city and county-level transit systems to multi-county authorities and one fixed guide oway systems MDOT also provides support for 38 specialized transportation service provides, the Michilyan varpool program, two intercity bus carriers, and four marine passenger systems.


- A total of 684,202 passengers traveled on three Amtrak routes in Michigan in FY 2016. Ridership has increased more than 21 percent in the last 10 years.
- Revenue from the three routes totaled \$27 million in FY 2016.
- There are 22 active passenger stations in Michigan, 12 of which are multi-modal, serving passenger rail as well as intercity bus and transit.
- Amtrak operates three intercity passenger rail routes in Michigan, totaling \$20 miles;

and Chicago, III.

- The Wolverine: operates three daily round-trips between Pontiac, Mich., and Chicago, II.
- The Blue Water: operates a single daily round-
- trip between Port Huron, Mich., and Chicago, III.

 The Pere Marquette: operates a single daily round-trip between Grand Rapids, Mich.
- *Amtrak Thruway Bus services provide bus connections between Michigan Amtrak routes and communities around the state. There also is a Thruway Bus link between the Blue Water and Wolverine services that connects in Toledo, Ohlo, with Amtrak long-distance routes to the east coast.










MDOT State Highway Projected Pavement Condition; Current Investment (Including New Revenue)



2015 MDOT Highway Pavement Condition by Lane Miles




MDOT Pavement Only Program Investment Vs. Pavement Condition


Transportation Bonding

- Constitution allows pledging MTF revenue for bonds not general obligation of the state
- State Transportation Commission authorizes each bond issue with notice to legislature
- Bonding can only be used for capital projects on the bond project list
- Debt service based restricted transportation revenue is limited to:
 - 50% based on the Constitution and 25% based on Commission Policy



State Revenue Package



- Beginning in January 2017:
 - \$317 M in additional fuel tax revenues
 - Gasoline & diesel fuel tax rises to 26.3¢ (diesel parity)
 - 20% increase in vehicle registration fees totaling \$148 M
- Beginning in October 2019: General Funds appropriated for transportation & distributed through Act 51 formula for road agencies (60% to local agencies & 40% to MDOT):

• 2019: \$150 M

• 2020: \$325 M


• 2021: \$600 M

 Beginning in 2022, fuel tax will be indexed, rising in proportion to increases in Consumer Price Index, or 5%, whichever is less

State Revenue Package Non-Monetary Provisions

- Administrative Expenses: MDOT administrative expenses limited to 8% of budget
- Pavement Warranties: Projects over \$2 million
- Competitive Bidding: All agencies required to competitively bid projects more than \$100,000
