WATER COURSES

Under the leadership of Dr. Suzanne Selig, the Department of Public Health and Health Sciences provided an 8-week course with panels comprised of leaders on the water crisis, followed by a question and answer session.



GIS MAPPING

Through a \$150,000 grant from Google, created an Android app that helps residents determine whether their homes are at high risk of having lead-contaminated water.

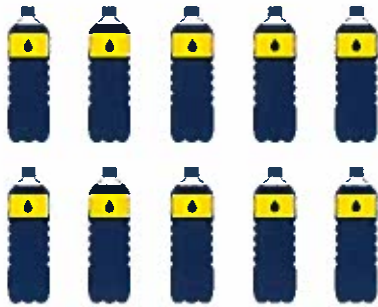

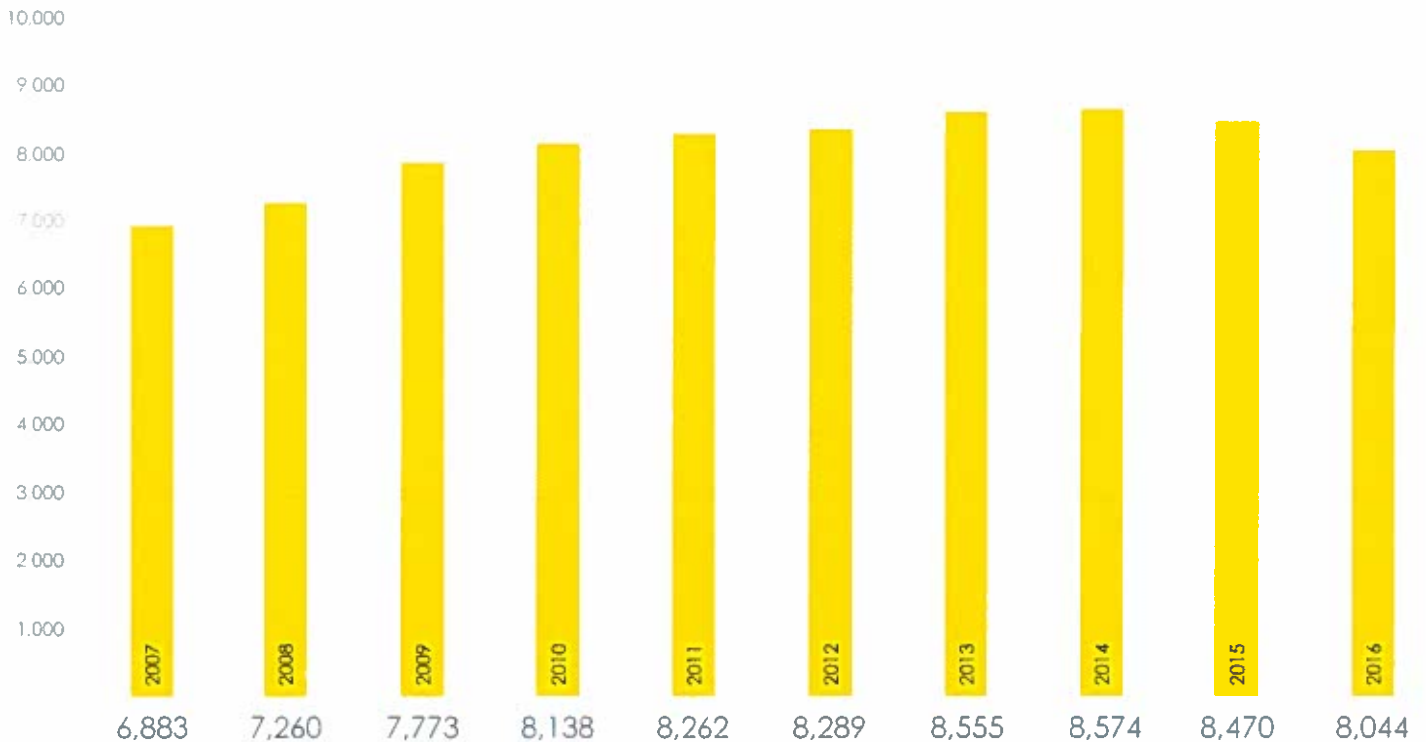


AMOUNT SPENT ON LABOR COSTS

EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION

225 children served by 2 new early childhood centers in Flint, where 20-40 UM-Flint students will be trained as early childhood educators starting in 2017

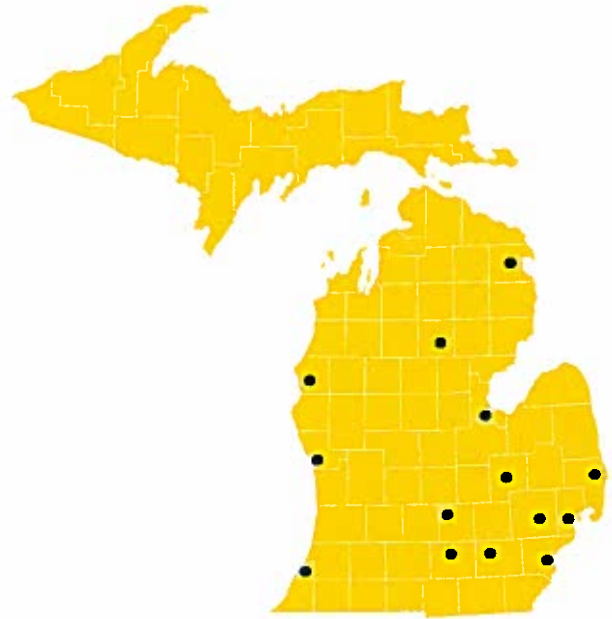
