Michigan Problem-Solving Courts



Michigan problem-solving courts provide eligible, non-violent, justice-involved offenders the opportunity to participate in a highly structured, court supervised, treatment-based program to address underlying issues that cause these individuals to return to crime.

Michigan's Problem-Solving Court Types



Drug Courts

Includes adult drug courts, DWI sobriety courts, hybrid DWI/drug courts, family dependency courts, tribal healing-to-wellness courts, and juvenile drug courts

Mental Health Courts

Includes adult circuit courts, adult district courts, and juvenile mental health courts

Veterans Treatment Courts

Includes circuit and district courts

Drug Courts



- 10 Key Components
- Substance use disorder
- Restricted driver's license for repeat drunk drivers who install an ignition interlock device
- Common charges
 - Controlled substance use or possession
 - o DWI
 - Controlled substance manufacturing or distribution
 - Property offenses

Mental Health Courts



- Serious mental illness, serious emotional disturbance, or a developmental disability (as defined by mental health code)
 - Schizophrenia
 - Bipolar disorder
 - Psychotic disorder
- 10 Essential Elements
- Partnership with Community Mental Health
- Focus on medication and treatment compliance

Veterans Treatment Court



- 10 Key Components
- Veterans treatment court uses a hybrid integration of drug court and mental health court principles
- Coordinate with Department of Veterans Affairs healthcare networks, Veterans Benefits Administration, state Departments of Veterans Affairs, volunteer mentors, and organizations that support veterans and veterans' families
- Serve veterans struggling with addiction, serious mental illness, and co-occurring disorders




Reduced Recidivism – Drug Court






Reduced Recidivism - MHC






Reduced Recidivism – VTC






Improved Employment – Drug Court






Improved Employment - MHC









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Swift and Sure Sanctions Probation in Michigan

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Summary of Swift and Sure



- MCL 771A.1 to MCL 771A.8
- Different than drug court
- High-risk felony probationers
 - High risk yes; high need not necessarily
- Behavior modification
 - Fairness and perceived fairness
 - Certainty in sanctioning ("sure")
 - Sanction after every violation of probation
 - Immediate sanction ("swift")

Probationer Eligibility



- Eligibility under MCL 771A.6:
 - Risk level other than low (based on validated assessment) and not charged with certain serious offenses


Structure of a Swift and Sure Court



- Orientation hearing
- Violation hearing
- Probation appointments
- Random and frequent drug and alcohol testing
- Substance use and mental health treatment, if needed
- Home and employment checks
- Immediate sanction for every violation


