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Statutes

Michigan Medical Marihuana Act (MMMA)

- Initiated Law 1 of 2008 (Requires ¾ vote of the legislature to amend)
- Established the patient / caregiver registry card program

Medical Marihuana Facilities Licensing Act (MMFLA)

- Public Act 281 of 2016
- Established the commercial medical marijuana market

Michigan Regulation and Taxation of Marihuana Act (MRTMA)

- Initiated Law 1 of 2018 (Requires ¾ vote of the legislature to amend)
- Legalized marijuana possession and use for adults 21 and over
- Established the commercial adult-use marijuana market

Industrial Hemp Research and Development Act

- Public Act 547 of 2014
- Regulates the processing of industrial hemp products



Marijuana Funds

Marihuana Registry Fund

- Established in the Michigan Medical Marihuana Act (2008)
- Receives revenue from registry card fees
- Money is expended to support overseeing the medical marijuana program

Marihuana Regulatory Fund

- Established in the Medical Marihuana Facilities Licensing Act (2016)
- Receives revenue from regulatory assessments charged to medical licensees
- Money is expended to regulate the medical licensing program and for other specified purposes

Marihuana Regulation Fund

- Established in the Michigan Regulation and Taxation of Marijuana Act (2018)
- Receives revenue from regulatory assessments charged to adult-use licensees and the excise tax
- Money is expended to regulate the adult use licensing program and for other specified purposes



Tax Revenue

Medical and adult-use sales are subject to t	the	6%
state sales tax.		


Adult-use sales are subject to a 10% excise tax, distributed in order:

- 1. Implementation, administration, and enforcement of the MRTMA.
- 2. Until 2022, \$20 million/year for research into the efficacy of marijuana in treating veterans.
- 3. The remainder as follows:
 - 15% to municipalities with retail stores
 - 15% to counties with retail stores
 - 35% to the School Aid Fund
 - 35% to the Michigan Transportation Fund

Agency Organization

Licensing Division

Processes applications, conducts background checks, and issues state operating licenses and patient/caregiver registry cards.

Services the needs of licensees, including renewals, amendments and ownership changes.

Reviews licensee financial statements to ensure compliance with accounting and recordkeeping requirements.

Enforcement Division

Conducts inspections of licensed businesses and counsels licensees on being compliant.

Investigates suspected violations of statute or rule.

Oversees and supports the statewide monitoring system.

Provides technical expertise to the agency and industry on matters of science, testing, and safety standards.

Centralized Services

Receives incoming phone calls and emails and routes as appropriate.

Performs legal functions, including representing the agency in administrative hearings

Provides public relations services and administers social equity programs.

Enforcement

FY 2024 Executive Budget Recommendation

Create a state-run reference laboratory

- Enhance investigative capabilities by enabling the CRA to independently test marijuana products during an investigation.
- Increase confidence in the testing industry by performing audits of state licensed safety compliance facilities.
- Assist in industry standardization by developing and optimizing testing methods.
- Total Cost: \$4.4 million (\$2.8 million in one-time funding, \$1.6 million ongoing)

CRA Operations

 \$28 million and 173 FTEs to implement and enforce the statutes regulating the Michigan medical marijuana program, the commercial adult-use and medical marijuana industries, and industrial hemp processing.



The Cannabis Regulatory Agency will establish Michigan as the national model for a regulatory program that stimulates business growth while preserving safe consumer access to cannabis.

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
