

# The Issue: Michigan residents face barriers to mental health care when being treated by a Nurse Practitioner. The Facts: Behavioral Health is part of every NP's curriculum and clinically training. NPs practice in every type of psychiatric medicine/behavioral health/mental health setting in Michigan. Psychiatric Nurse Practitioners receive specialty training in the area of behavioral health and treatment modalities. The Solution: Here are three primary solutions to improve mental health access for Michigan residents by amending the Mental Health Code (MHC) in Michigan Law. 1. Include Nurse Practitioners (NP) & Clinical Nurse Specialist (CNS) as Mental Health Professionals in the MHC. The MHC currently defines "Mental Health Professional" as a physician, psychologist, RN, MSW, licensed professional counselor, or a licensed marriage and family therapist. 2. Include NPs and CNSs in the MHC as providers able to initiate safety (chemical and physical) restraints. This barrier only exists for patients receiving care in a psychiatric setting. NPs and CNSs can protect their patients (and other providers) by performing face-to-face assessments and issuing safety restraints in every other medical setting. 3. Include NPs and CNSs in the MHC as providers able to issue initial certification for involuntary admission to a psychiatric facility. NPs and PAs can provide this critically important care in most states.

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
