To the committee representatives.

I am writing you to oppose HB 5679. As many of you are aware there are a number of issues with the current SORA that the court ruled unconstitutional over 3 years ago. During this time congress has done nothing to address those issue. Now that the "clock is running out" HB 5679 has been introduced in an effort to pass anything before the timer expires on the current court decision. Unfortunately HB 5679 does not address the court issues with the current SORA as has been pointed out by a number of people including the state AG. I understand why your committee and congress in general have been unable to pass a new law or even fix the issues with the current law.

Let's face it. The current SORA law and even HB 5679 are a dead frog of a law. By that I mean you and everyone in our state congress are unwilling to dissect this law and truly get your hands dirty. This is a complicated issue and no easy fix is readily available. Like many people in biology class the idea of dissecting a dead frog is not a pleasant one at the best of times. This is most definitely not the best of times right now. Unfortunately for all of you there is no lab partner that is going to step up and do the dirty work of dissecting this dead frog of a law.
