The House Committee on Judiciary was called to order by Chair Filler.

The Chair requested attendance be called:

Representative Howell moved to adopt the meeting minutes from September 15, 2020. There being no objection, the motion prevailed by unanimous consent.

The Chair laid HB 6030, HB 6031, HB 6032 and HB 6101 before the committee:

HB 6030 (Rep. Albert) A bill to provide minimum requirements for claims alleging exposure to COVID-19;

establishing liability standards for claims alleging exposure to COVID-19; precluding liability if conduct complies with regulations, orders, or

public health guidance; and limiting liability with respect to certain products made, sold, or donated

in response to COVID-19.

HB 6031 (Rep. Brann) A bill to amend 1974 PA 154, entitled "Michigan

occupational safety and health act," (MCL 408.1001 to 408.1094) by adding section 85.

HB 6032 (Rep. Filler) A bill to prohibit an employer from taking certain

actions against an employee who does not report to work under certain circumstances related to COVID-19; to prohibit an employee from reporting to work under certain circumstances related to COVID-19; to prohibit discrimination and retaliation for engaging in certain activities; to provide remedies; and to repeal acts and parts of acts.

HB 6101 (Rep. Byrd)

A bill to amend 1974 PA 154, entitled "Michigan occupational safety and health act," (MCL 408.1001 to 408.1094) by adding sections 85 and 85a.

HB 4676 (Rep. Anthony)

A bill to prohibit the recording of deeds or other instruments relating to real property that contain certain restrictive covenants or conditions; to make such restrictions unenforceable; and to provide remedies with respect to those instruments.

Representative Howell moved to report out House Bill No. 4676 with the recommendation that the bill be referred to the Committee on Local Government and Municipal Finance. The motion prevailed 13-0-0:

A bill to amend 1909 PA 17, entitled "An act to prohibit or limit the access by prisoners and by employees of correctional facilities to certain weapons and wireless communication devices and to alcoholic liquor, drugs, medicines, poisons, and controlled substances in, on, or outside of correctional facilities; to prohibit or limit the bringing into or onto certain facilities and real property, and the disposition of, certain weapons, substances, and wireless communication devices; to prohibit or limit the selling, giving, or furnishing of certain weapons, substances, and wireless communication devices to prisoners; to prohibit the control or possession of certain weapons, substances, and wireless communication devices by prisoners; and to prescribe penalties," by amending sections 1a and 3a (MCL 800.281a and 800.283a), section 1a as amended by 1998 PA 514 and section 3a as amended by 2012 PA 255.
