
SB289: TRANSFORMATIONAL BROWNFIELD PROGRAM AMENDMENTS

A BRIEF HISTORY OF THE TBP LEGISLATION

- Enacted in 2017 with strong bipartisan support.
- Amended in 2021 to make it easier for communities to access.
- Program cap is about to be reached.
- Needs to be extended, and further reformed, so communities throughout Michigan can benefit.








WHAT IS A TRANSFORMATIONAL BROWNFIELD PROJECT?

- TBP is for the most significant and challenging brownfield redevelopment projects in our communities.
- Think of that key site that has been empty for decades because the cost of clean up and redevelopment is more than could ever be recovered—that is a TBP site.
- Different minimum investment thresholds for communities of different sizes.
- Local designation and approval required before state approval.

HOW DOES THE TBP PROGRAM WORK?

- TBP builds on the longstanding brownfield program to make it work for the largest and most challenging projects.
- Traditional brownfield tax increment financing relies primarily on local support. But that is not enough for the most difficult projects.
- TBP recognizes the state has a role in supporting transformational community development and allows *incremental* state tax dollars generated from brownfield sites to be reinvested into the projects to make them financially feasible.

WHY TBP HAS ALWAYS HAD STRONG BI-PARTISAN SUPPORT



No Money Upfront: Not a grant, not a credit



<u>Smart Economic Policy</u>: Vacant sites produce no benefits; reinvesting new taxes to enable redevelopment is a win-win



<u>Need-Based</u>: TBP assistance is strictly limited to the amount needed to make the project possible



<u>Performance-Based</u>: If a project is not completed, there are no benefits



<u>Statewide Need and Benefit</u>: Strong support from communities in every corner of Michigan





What Does SB289 Do?

- 1. Reauthorizes the Program—Increases the cap by \$40 million per year to enable transformational projects throughout the state to move forward. Without this legislation, these projects will not be possible.
- 2. <u>Ensures Geographic Equity</u>: Requires at least 33% of TBPs to be in communities smaller than 100,000 and at least 33% of TBPs to be in communities between 100,000 and 225,000.
- 3. <u>Updates the Program</u>: Prior formula was focused on office-centric redevelopments. The world has changed, and the TBP program needs to adapt to support the "live-play" developments that our communities, and our state, need.




It's About Talent: Building vibrant cities and town centers is fundamentally about attracting and retaining talent to grow our state.
