






# National Poll on Healthy Aging 2022 and 2023

- Most older adults (88%) want to age in their current homes as long as possible.
- 48% of those living alone don't have anyone who could help them with personal care if needed.
- Only 19% of those living alone are very confident they could pay someone to assist them with household chores, grocery shopping, personal care or managing finances.
- One in three older adults reported infrequent contact (once a week or less) with people from outside their home in 2023.






#### **About AAANM**

## Increasing challenges serving seniors

- People don't know where to turn or how to access services
- Caregiver burnout
- Need for more in-home services
- Direct Care Worker shortage
- Social isolation
- Behavioral health (mental and substance use)
- Increasing elder abuse including financial exploitation
- Housing and transportation
- Food insecurity

## **About Rural Northwest Michigan**

Majority of population is distributed in low densities across the region

- High cost of living due to geographic location "view of the bay"
- Economically distressed individuals live in remote areas where housing is more affordable (when stock is available)
- Heavy reliance on personal vehicles (rather than public transit)
- Greater distances to travel to provide or receive services
- Separation of many households from convenient access to services

= Isolation, high travel costs and difficulty accessing many types of services



## Examples of what this looks like:

Thank you for supporting policy changes to increase housing availability!

- Limited or no access to medical care services within 60-90 minutes of home
  - Medical care is increasingly reliant on telehealth capabilities to reach rural areas
  - Large swaths of areas in NW Michigan lacking broadband or cell phone coverage (and then there's affording it ...)
- ➤ In Manistee County, 1,015 meals are delivered in one week, driving an average of 2,479 miles
- ➤ Inflation increasing senior homelessness or at risk of homelessness and food insecurity with lack of social support

Many seniors have to choose between food and medicine

## Examples of what this looks like:

Thank you for supporting increasing Direct Care Worker wages!

- ➤ Direct Care Work force challenges are amplified
  - Fewer people of working age living in NW Michigan to fill positions
  - Housing crisis coupled with inflation makes it impossible for those with lower wage jobs to live in region
  - Transportation costs to perform Direct Care Work are a significant barrier
- Fewer vendors providing transportation for senior needs (shortage of workers, rising costs)
