
Michigan's Local Health Departments

Essential Services – MI and CDC

Michigan - ELPHS (1978)

- Infectious Disease Control
- Sexually Transmitted Disease Control and Prevention
- Immunization
- Hearing Screening & Vision Services
- Public and Private Ground Water Supply
- Onsite Sewage Management
- Food Protection

Essential Local Public Health Services (ELPHS) are mandated and are subject to 50/50 cost share per P.A. Act 368 of 1978.

CDC – 10 Essential Services (1994)

- Assess and monitor population health status....
- Investigate, diagnose, and address health problems and hazards....
- Communicate effectively to inform and educate people about health....
- Strengthen, support, and mobilize communities and partnerships....
- **Create, champion**, and **implement** policies, plans, and laws that impact health
- Utilize legal and regulatory actions designed to improve and protect the public's health
- Assure an effective system that enables equitable access to the individual services and care needed to be healthy
- Build and support a diverse and skilled public health workforce
- **Improve and innovate** public health functions through ongoing evaluation, research, and continuous quality improvement
- **Build and maintain** a strong organizational infrastructure for public health

Local Health Dept. Leadership

Health Officer

- Training and expertise in public health
- Oversees operations
- Investigates health issues and hazards
- Encourages community partnerships
- Notifies, educates, directs and empowers people when health issues arise



Medical Director

- Licensed physicians trained in public health
- Oversees the development and evaluation of standards of medical care
- Advises the health officer in matters of medical policy
- Provides medical direction to the department's staff
