

Project

- MISSION: Our mission is to identify, engage and connect Veterans and Military families to mental health and substance abuse resources. This approach has shown to lower stigma, decrease suicides and promote self-advocacy.
- ❖ VISION: To create an effective and sustainable program that increases capacity in the publicly funded behavioral health care system. To encourage a proactive approach to the delivery of behavioral health services to Veterans and Military families with a best practice model that is mobile and easily replicated.
- VALUES: Safeguard, respect and encourage the behavioral wellbeing of Veterans and Military families. Collaborate and coordinate with state and local stakeholders to meet the comprehensive needs of Veterans and Military families. Continue to foster relationships with the Federal and local VA entities. Support Veterans and Military families on their road to self-sufficiency.

Walking with Warriors Program Successes

- ❖Ten Prepaid Inpatient Health Plans (PIHP) Regional Veteran Navigator positions full; Thirteen Community Mental Health (CMH) Veteran Navigators that cover Nineteen counties; and four Veteran Peer Support Specialists.
- Faith-based program utilized through webinars and annual retreat with focus on Moral Injury.
- Initiation of THRIVE Training: A Resilience/Suicide Prevention Community Centric approach to Veteran and family care.
- Ongoing robust relationships with all five Veteran Health Administration (VHA).
- ❖Overall success throughout our project: over 25,000 Veterans and Military families engaged with since November of 2016; stigma lowered by 72%; and one Veteran suicide in 2017.

Where are We Referring Newly Identified Veterans and Military Families?

- Community Mental Health/SUD Providers 47%
- ❖ Veterans Affairs (VHA, VBA) CBOCs, Local County VA's – 76% Only 40% of eligible Veterans are accessing their VA Benefits Nationwide
- Housing 80% (This demonstrates the increases we have identified over the past 18 months)
- ❖ Employment 18%
- ❖Education 12%
- ❖Transportation 10%
- ❖ Veteran Service Officer 40%
- ❖Legal/Veteran Court 7%
- ❖Growing Referrals Faith 6% and Food 5%

Connecting Our Veterans to Their Benefits

- Since 2018 we have been aggregating data on Veteran Service Connection Disability increases to demonstrate that our program is reaching those Veterans most at need of resources to improve their quality of life.
- Contact was initiated by Veteran Navigator.
- Veteran Service Connection increases for all Veterans since 2018.
- ❖ Veteran Service Connection Disability Federal Funds coming into Michigan since 2018 \$19,283,216.
- Most information gathered directly from Veteran or family member.



Survey Results

Individual reports being better equipped to function effectively in community = 74%

❖ Individual reports greater willingness to reach out for help = 72%
