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GLOSSARY

Frequently-Used State Budget Terms

Adjusted Gross

Total net amount of all line item gross appropriations less (or minus) interdepartmental grants (IDGs) and intradepartmental transfers (IDTs)

Boilerplate

Specific language sections contained in an appropriations act which direct, limit or restrict line item expenditures, and/or require reports

Budget Stabilization Fund (BSF)

The countercyclical economic and budget stabilization fund—also known as the "rainy day" fund

Federal Revenues

Federal grant or matchable revenues dedicated to specific programs

General Fund/General Purpose (GF/GP)

The state's primary operating fund; the portion of the state's General Fund that does not include restricted revenues

Gross Appropriations (Gross)

The total of all applicable line item spending authorizations

Interdepartmental Grant (IDG)

Revenue or funds received by one state department from another state department (usually for a service the receiving department provides)

Intradepartmental Transfer (IDT)

Transfers or funds being provided from one appropriation unit to another in the same department

Lapses

Unspent/unobligated funds remaining in line item accounts at the end of the fiscal year

Line Items

Specific funding amount in an appropriations bill which establishes spending authorization for a particular program or function (may be for a single purpose or for multiple purposes)

Local Revenue

Revenues from local units of government

State Restricted (Restricted Funds)

State revenue dedicated to a specific fund; revenue which results from state mandates or initiatives; used for used for specific programs pursuant to the Constitution or statute

Private Funds

Revenues from non-government entities such as rents, royalties or interest payments, payments from hospitals, payments from individuals, and gifts and bequests

School Aid Fund (SAF)

The primary funding source for K-12 schools and Intermediate School Districts (ISDs)

DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE

A five-member Commission of Agriculture heads the Department and is appointed by the Governor with the consent of the Senate. Commission members are appointed for terms of four years. The Commission appoints a director to serve as chief administrative officer of the Department.

The Department of Agriculture promotes agricultural interests of the state and develops safeguards to protect the public from disease and unsanitary conditions in connection with food production and food handling, product labeling, dairy products, animals, and plants. The Department's responsibilities in the field of consumer protection include enforcement of laws relating to food, standard weights and measures, farm produce storage, and dairy products; inspection and enforcement of animal health; control of plant pests and diseases; and inspection of beans and perishable fruits and vegetables. Department is also charged with regulating Michigan's pari-mutuel horse racing industry through the Office of the Racing Commissioner, a type I agency located in the Department.

The Department's mission is: "To serve, promote and protect the agricultural interests of the people of the State of Michigan." Department responsibilities include ensuring that consumers receive safe and wholesome food and agricultural products; protecting the public, the food supply, and the environment from toxic substance contamination; and protecting and enhancing the land and water resource base. Department also promotes the development of food- and agriculture-based businesses and markets, and is charged with regulating the pari-mutuel horse racing industry.

In its dual role as regulator and marketer, the Department provides Michigan citizens with quality services and information by working cooperatively with many agencies and organizations including: United States Department of Agriculture; U.S. Environmental Protection Agency; Food and Drug Administration; the Michigan Departments of Community Health, Natural Resources, and Consumer and Industry Services; Michigan Jobs Commission; Michigan State University Colleges of Agriculture and Natural Resources and Veterinary Medicine and Extension; the food and agriculture industry; and private businesses.

This appropriation unit provides funding for a variety of food safety programs administered by the Department. Funding is also included for grants to local health departments for food safety inspection activities.

This appropriation unit provides funding for preservation of the health of domestic animals, livestock, and pets. This unit also assures the humane treatment of animals and provides diagnostic services for those needing assistance due to animal health problems.

SECTION 107: ENVIRONMENTAL STEWARDSHIP

This appropriation unit provides funding for programs that provide assistance to soil and water conservation districts, local governments, drain commissioners, and land users in the conservation and development of the state's soil and water resources. Programs encourage the installation and management of sustainable resource protection practices at the local level.

Michigan Groundwater Stewardship: Protects groundwater resources through voluntary, locally-driven initiatives that address the concerns of individuals and maintain a focus on realistic solutions and financial and technical constraints which drive real-world decisions.

Michigan Clean Sweep: Develops a system for the legal, safe disposal of old, unwanted, suspended, or canceled pesticides. By providing for proper disposal, the Department and the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency reduce the potential for adverse environmental impacts.

Pesticide Container Recycling: Establishes an opportunity for pesticide users to bring clean, empty containers to preselected sites for grinding and recycling into a variety of products. This reduces the potential for adverse environmental impacts and saves valuable space in sanitary landfills.

Right to Farm: Investigates and responds to agricultural pollution complaints, including complaints regarding pesticide applications and land application of certain by-products. Program is conducted cooperatively with the Pesticide and Plant Pest Management Division.

Intercounty Drain Program: Staff represent the Department as chairpersons of all intercounty drainage boards, as provided by the Drain Code. Program is responsible for providing expertise to county drain commissioners, engineers, financial consultants. and attorneys on all intercounty drain issues.

<u>Drinking Water Monitoring:</u> Supports drinking water monitoring activities at migrant labor housing facilities.
