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GLOSSARY

Frequently-Used State Budget Terms

Adjusted Gross

Total net amount of all line item gross appropriations less (or minus) interdepartmental grants (IDGs) and intradepartmental transfers (IDTs)

Boilerplate

Specific language sections contained in an appropriations act which direct, limit or restrict line item expenditures, and/or require reports

Budget Stabilization Fund (BSF)

The countercyclical economic and budget stabilization fund—also known as the "rainy day" fund

Federal Revenues

Federal grant or matchable revenues dedicated to specific programs

General Fund/General Purpose (GF/GP)

The state's primary operating fund; the portion of the state's General Fund that does not include restricted revenues

Gross Appropriations (Gross)

The total of all applicable line item spending authorizations

Interdepartmental Grant (IDG)

Revenue or funds received by one state department from another state department (usually for a service the receiving department provides)

Intradepartmental Transfer (IDT)

Transfers or funds being provided from one appropriation unit to another in the same department

Lapses

Unspent/unobligated funds remaining in line item accounts at the end of the fiscal year

Line Items

DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE

A five-member Commission of Agriculture heads the Department and is appointed by the Governor with the consent of the Senate. Commission members are appointed for terms of four years. The Commission appoints a director to serve as chief administrative officer of the Department.

The Department of Agriculture promotes agricultural interests of the state and develops safeguards to protect the public from disease and unsanitary conditions in connection with food production and food handling, product labeling, dairy products, animals, and plants. The Department's responsibilities in the field of consumer protection include enforcement of laws relating to food, standard weights and measures, farm produce storage, and dairy products; inspection and enforcement of animal health; control of plant pests and diseases; and inspection of beans and perishable fruits and vegetables. Department is also charged with regulating Michigan's pari-mutuel horse racing industry through the Office of the Racing Commissioner, a type I agency located in the Department.

The Department's mission is: "To serve, promote and protect the agricultural interests of the people of the State of Michigan." Department responsibilities include ensuring that consumers receive safe and wholesome food and agricultural products; protecting the public, the food supply, and the environment from toxic substance contamination; and protecting and enhancing the land and water resource base. Department also promotes the development of food- and agriculture-based businesses and markets, and is charged with regulating the pari-mutuel horse racing industry.

In its dual role as regulator and marketer, the Department provides Michigan citizens with quality services and information by working cooperatively with many agencies and organizations including: United States Department of Agriculture; U.S. Environmental Protection Agency; Food and Drug Administration; the Michigan Departments of Community Health, Natural Resources, and Consumer and Industry Services; Michigan Jobs Commission; Michigan State University Colleges of Agriculture and Natural Resources and Veterinary Medicine and Extension; the food and agriculture industry; and private businesses.

SECTION 104: FOOD AND DAIRY

This appropriation unit provides funding for a variety of food safety programs administered by the Department. Funding is also included for grants to local health departments for food safety inspection activities.

Dairy: Ensures that consumers have the safest and most wholesome milk supply available in the world. By inspecting Michigan's 3,500 Grade A and 398 manufacturing grade milk- producing farms on a regular basis, the Dairy Section ensures that all fluid milk for bottling in the state meets stringent standards. In addition, cheese factories, butter plants, and ice cream facilities are checked for sanitation. Over 6,000 samples of dairy products are analyzed each year at the Department's laboratory to assure that standards are met. This appropriation unit provides funding for preservation of the health of domestic animals, livestock, and pets. This unit also assures the humane treatment of animals and provides diagnostic services for those needing assistance due to animal health problems.

SECTION 106: PESTICIDE AND PLANT PEST MANAGEMENT

This appropriation unit provides funding for enforcement of laws dealing with pesticide registration, use, and application certification and testing. In addition, this unit develops strategies to monitor and control pests that are harmful to the state's horticulture and timber industry.

Agricultural Products: Strives to prevent animal feed contaminations that are a direct threat to human health and to provide purchasers of feeds, seeds, fertilizers, liming materials, and livestock and poultry remedies with protections from false label claims. Division administration of programs which encourage installation and management of sustainable resource protection practices at the local level include:

Michigan Groundwater Stewardship: Protects groundwater resources through voluntary, locally-driven initiatives that address the concerns of individuals and maintain a focus on realistic solutions and financial and technical constraints which drive real-world decisions.

Michigan Clean Sweep: Develops a system for the legal, safe disposal of old, unwanted, suspended, or canceled pesticides. By providing for proper disposal, the Department and the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency reduce the potential for adverse environmental impacts.

Pesticide Container Recycling: Establishes an opportunity for pesticide users to bring clean, empty containers to preselected sites for grinding and recycling into a variety of products. This reduces the potential for adverse environmental impacts and saves valuable space in sanitary landfills.

Right to Farm: Investigates and responds to agricultural pollution complaints, including complaints regarding pesticide applications and land application of certain by-products. Program is conducted cooperatively with the Pesticide and Plant Pest Management Division.

Intercounty Drain Program: Staff represent the Department as chairpersons of all intercounty drainage boards, as provided by the Drain Code. Program is responsible for providing expertise to county drain commissioners, engineers, financial consultants, and attorneys on all intercounty drain issues.

Drinking Water Monitoring: Supports drinking water monitoring activities at migrant labor housing facilities.

Food, Dairy, and Beverage: Ensures the safety and quality of products offered by the food industry. Analyzes products for food-borne pathogens and extraneous material which renders the products unfit for human consumption.

Motor Fuel Quality: Ensures the quality of the gasoline supply in the state by performing octane, alcohol, lead, and additional tests.

Pesticides and Environment: Monitors formulated agricultural products; application and/or misuse of licensed and unlicensed pesticide products; chemically-induced plant, animal, and/or human health problems; and food residue.

Seed: Performs a variety of tests for farmers and seed dealers to check for purity.

States that an unobligated balance or excess revenue in any state restricted fund shall not lapse to the general fund.

Sec. 212. Bovine TB Indemnification Payments

Authorizes the Department to provide for indemnity; limits indemnification orders to \$100,000; and requires a report for the reason for, amount of, and person to whom the indemnification is to be paid. Authorizes the Department to indemnify for livestock that are killed by wolves or coyotes and to expend funds received from the Department of Natural Resources for the indemnification payments made pursuant to this section and requires current rate paid to those farmers prior to October 31, 2000. Note: the phrase authorizing payments for the loss of beehives caused by bears was vetoed.

Sec. 214. Grants Reporting

Sec. 401. Restaurant Inspection and Licensing

Requires the Department to monitor restaurant inspection and licensing activities conducted by locals and to report to the Legislature.

Sec. 402. Food Safety

Requires Department to produce reports on food-borne outbreaks and emergencies related to food safety.

Sec. 403. Local Programs

Requires that local units of government obtain permission from the Department prior to any moving or reallocation of program funds appropriated in section 104.

Sec. 450. Bovine Tuberculosis (TB)

Requires the Department to reimburse the Department of Natural Resources for mutually-agreed-to bovine tuberculosis costs.

Sec. 451. Bovine Tuberculosis - Split State Status

Requires the Department to pay for all whole herd testing costs to achieve and maintain split-state status.

Sec. 452. Bovine Tuberculosis Program Revenue

Requires the Department to pay seek state and federal revenue sources to cover increased program expenses.

Sec. 501. Pesticide Personnel

Allows up to \$100,000 from pesticide and plant pest management to be used to train pesticide applicators.

Sec. 503. Gypsy Moth

Authorizes the Department to enter into an agreement with a nonprofit organization associated with the Gypsy Moth Slow-the-Spread Program.

Sec. 807. Purse Supplements

Provides for overnight purse supplements.

Sec. 808. Horse Show

Allocates \$11,400 of the premiums line for a grant to the Michigan Horse Show Association's Fall Youth Show.

Sec. 809. Youth in Agriculture

Allocates \$120,000 from the premiums line for a grant to promote youth involvement in the animal agriculture industry and establishes guidelines for eligibility to receive grants.

Sec. 810. State Fair Expenditures

Spending limited to the amount appropriated in this act.

Sec. 811. Outstanding Unclaimed Tickets

Prohibits the use of funds for distribution of outstanding winning tickets until they are deposited in the agriculture equine industry development fund.

Sec. 812. Leasing and Grants

Declares that individuals leasing land, buildings, or other property are not eligible for state subsidy relating to their leased items.

Sec. 813. Estimates of Agriculture Equine Fund

Requires the Department, HFA, SFA, and DMB to estimate unreserved and unencumbered closing balance of the fund for FY 2002-03.

Sec. 901. Criminal Activity Information Rewards

Allows the racing commissioner to pay rewards up to \$5,800 to individuals who provide information on criminal activity involving the horse racing industry.
