#### **GLOSSARY**

#### **STATE BUDGET TERMS**

#### Line Item

Specific funding amount in an appropriation bill which establishes spending authorization for a particular program or function.

#### **Boilerplate**

Specific language sections in an appropriation bill which direct, limit, or restrict line-item expenditures, express legislative intent, and/or require reports.

#### Lapse

Appropriated amounts that are unspent or unobligated at the end of a fiscal year; appropriations are automatically terminated at the end of a fiscal year unless otherwise provided by law.

#### **Work Project**

Account authorized through statutory process which allows appropriated spending authorization from one fiscal year to be utilized for expenditures in a succeeding fiscal year or years for a specific project or purpose.

#### **APPROPRIATIONS AND FUND SOURCES**

#### **Appropriations**

Authority to expend funds for a particular purpose. An appropriation is not a mandate to spend.

**Gross:** Total of all applicable appropriations in an appropriation bill.

**Adjusted Gross:** Net amount of gross appropriations after subtracting interdepartmental grants (IDGs) and intradepartmental transfers (IDTs).

#### Interdepartmental Grant (IDG) Revenue

Funds received by one state department from another state department—usually for service(s) provided.

#### Intradepartmental Transfer (IDT) Revenue

Funds transferred from one appropriation unit to another within the same departmental budget.

#### **Federal Revenue**

Federal grant or match revenue; generally dedicated to specific programs or purposes.

#### **Local Revenue**

Revenue received from local units of government for state services.

#### **Private Revenue**

Revenue from non-government entities: rents, royalties or interest payments, payments from hospitals or individuals, or gifts and bequests.

#### State Restricted Revenue

State revenue restricted by the State Constitution, state statute, or outside restriction that is available only for specified purposes; includes most fee revenue; at yearend, unused restricted revenue generally remains in the restricted fund.

#### General Fund/General Purpose (GF/GP) Revenue

Unrestricted general fund revenue available to fund basic state programs and other purposes determined by the Legislature; unused GF/GP revenue lapses to the General Fund at the end of a fiscal year.

#### MAJOR STATE FUNDS

#### **General Fund**

The state's primary operating fund; receives state revenue not dedicated to another state fund.

#### School Aid Fund (SAF)

A restricted fund that serves as the primary state funding source for K-12 schools and Intermediate School Districts. Constitutionally, SAF revenue may also be used for postsecondary education.

#### **Budget Stabilization Fund**

The Countercyclical Economic and Budget Stabilization Fund (also known as the "rainy day fund"); the Management and Budget Act provides guidelines for making deposits into and withdrawals from the fund.

#### **DEPARTMENT OF STATE POLICE**

The Michigan Department of State Police (MSP) is the state's primary law enforcement and emergency response authority and is responsible for criminal law enforcement and investigation, traffic and commercial vehicle safety, emergency management and homeland security, and the administration and implementation of various programs, services, and technologies provided by the MSP and intended to enhance the capacity, capability, competency, and coordination of federal, state, and local law enforcement agencies, the criminal justice system, and the entire public safety community.

<u>Criminal Justice Information Center Service Fees</u> (\$1,423,000): Fees collected for various services, such as fingerprinting, criminal record checks, concealed pistol licensing, FOIA requests, and other services. Traffic Law Enforcement and Safety Fund (\$404,600): Established by the Michigan Vehicle Code, 1949 PA 300; supported by fees collected from driver's license applications and renewals pursuant to 1949 PA 300, MCL 257.811; funds utilized to enhance enforcement of traffic laws and ability to provide safety on state streets and highways.

This appropriation unit supports biometric and forensic science services, Criminal Justice Information Center, Office of School Safety, State 9-1-1 Administration, and grants and training to local law enforcement and criminal justice agencies.

<u>Michigan Incident Crime Reporting (MICR)</u>: Processes and analyzes crime data and publishes crime statistics on violent and property offenses, hate crimes, domestic violence, and law enforcement officers killed and assaulted.

<u>Traffic Crash Reporting Section</u>: Compiles, processes, and evaluates traffic crash reports from state and local law enforcement agencies, manages and maintains central database of traffic crash data, provides extensive data on fatal crashes to federal government, trains officers on proper completion of crash reports, and collaborates with Department of State to update driver records.

<u>Firearms Records</u>: Manages and maintains records related to registered handguns and concealed pistol licenses (CPL) and serves as liaison to FBI regarding Brady Act compliance.

<u>Sex Offender Registry</u>: Manages and maintains law enforcement and public databases providing information on registered sex offenders and assists in enforcing registration requirements.

<u>Public Information</u>: Coordinates and processes FOIA requests received by MSP and oversees retention of CJIC records.

<u>Audit and Training</u>: Conducts compliance audits of all criminal justice agencies and others to ensure security, integrity, and confidentiality of criminal justice information, and coordinates CJIC division training.

Criminal Justice Information Center Service Fees (\$18,579,900): Fees collected for various services, such as fingerprinting, criminal record checks, concealed pistol licensing, FOIA requests, and other services. Auto Theft Prevention Fund (\$8,205,600): Established by Insurance Code Act 1956, 1956 PA 218, under authority of Auto Theft Prevention Authority; supported by a \$1 per non-commercial vehicle assessment paid annually by automobile insurers operating within the state.

State Services Fee Fund (\$8,033,300): Established by Michigan Gaming Control and Revenue Act, 1997 PA 69; supported by annual assessments from three Detroit Casinos and application fees, license fees, and fines and penalties paid by casinos or their suppliers or employees.

Marihuana Regulation Fund (\$557,000): Established by Michigan Regulation and Taxation of Marihuana Act, 2018 IL 1; receives revenues from fees collected by Department of Licensing and Regulatory Affairs under the act and a 10% excise tax on recreational marihuana sales.

<u>Sex Offenders Registration Fund</u> (\$390,600): Established by Sex Offenders Registration Act, 1994 PA 295; funded through collection of \$30 from each registration. Supports training and maintenance regarding law enforcement database, publicly accessible website, and other requirements of the act.

Marihuana Regulatory Fund (\$259,700): Established by Medical Marihuana Facilities Licensing Act, 2016 PA 281; receives application fees and regulatory assessments from medical marihuana facilities licensees

Other State Restricted Revenue (\$2,799,800): Includes other revenue sources, such as reimbursement fees for forensic science services, motor carrier fees, MSP precision driving track fees, and traffic crash revenue.

Provides total state spending from state sources and payments to be made to local units of government.

#### Sec. 202. Applicability of Management and Budget Act

Subjects appropriations to the Management and Budget Act, 1984 PA 431.

#### Sec. 203. Terms and Acronyms

Defines various terms and acronyms appearing in the act.

#### Sec. 204. Internet Reporting Requirements

Requires MSP to use internet to fulfill reporting requirements; authorizes transmission of reports via e-mail.

#### Sec. 205. Purchase of Foreign Goods

Prohibits purchase of foreign goods or services if competitively priced and comparable quality American goods or services are available; gives preference to goods and services from Michigan businesses and Michigan businesses owned and operated by veterans.

#### Sec. 206. Deprived and Depressed Communities

Requires MSP Director to make an effort to contract with businesses in deprived and depressed communities.

#### Sec. 207. Out-of-State Travel Report

Requires MSP to submit report on out-of-state travel by state employees, including dates of each travel occurrence, related expenses, and fund sourcing.

#### Sec. 208. Hiring of External Counsel

Prohibits using appropriations to hire a person to provide legal services that are the responsibility of the Attorney General; prohibition does not apply to legal services for bonding activities or to services authorized by Attorney General.

#### Sec. 209. General Fund Lapse Report

Requires State Budget Office to report on estimated General Fund lapses by major program or program areas at close of prior fiscal year.

#### Sec. 210. Contingency Funding

Appropriates up to \$2.0 million in federal and \$4.0 million in state restricted contingency funds; authorizes expenditure of funds after legislative transfer to specific line items.

#### Sec. 211. Transparency Website

Requires MSP, in cooperation with DTMB, to maintain a searchable website accessible by public at no cost that includes information on expenditures, vendor payments, number of active employees, job specifications, and wage rates.

#### Sec. 212. Restricted Funds Report

Requires MSP to work with SBO to report on estimated restricted fund revenues, expenditures, and fund balances for FYs 2018-19 and 2019-20.

#### Sec. 213. Department Scorecard Website

Requires MSP to maintain, on a publicly accessible website, a scorecard that identifies, tracks, and regularly updates key metrics used to monitor and improve department's performance.

#### Sec. 214. Legacy Costs

Identifies total funding estimated to be expended on legacy costs in FY 2019-20; \$137.3 million (\$74.9 million on pension related legacy costs and \$62.4 million on health care legacy costs).

#### Sec. 215. Byrne Justice Assistance Grant

Requires MSP to provide \$1.5 million in federal Byrne grants to Judiciary via interdepartmental grant, if grant funds are available.

#### Sec. 216. Communication with the Legislature

Prohibits MSP from taking disciplinary action against employees for communicating with legislators or their staff. (*Governor declared this section unenforceable.*)

#### Sec. 217. Biannual Reporting on Achieving Requirements

Requires MSP to provide biannual reports on its performance against metrics cited in the act, status of work projects, and financial status.

#### Sec. 218. Department Core Services

Lists core services of MSP and requires appropriations to be expended for core services.

#### Sec. 219. Post Closure or Consolidation

Requires MSP to notify listed recipients not less than 90 days before recommending closure or consolidation of any state police post.

#### Sec. 220. Privatization Project Plans

Requires submission of a project plan 90 days before beginning any effort to privatize.

#### Sec. 221. Contractual Services Reimbursement

Requires MSP to be reimbursed for all costs incurred providing contractual services, including retirement and overtime costs; requires services provided to entities other than local units of government to be provided on an overtime basis; authorizes MSP to expend reimbursements for contractual services that are in excess of appropriations, if authorized by SBO.

#### Sec. 222. Michigan Public Safety Communications System

Requires MSP to act as a liaison between DTMB and various public safety agencies for issues related to Michigan Public Safety Communications System.

#### Sec. 223. Departmental Fees

Authorizes MSP to establish and collect fees for publications, videos, conferences, workshops, and related materials; limits fees to cost of expenditures.

#### Sec. 224. Authorization To Expend Private Donations

Authorizes MSP to accept monetary and non-monetary donations for purposes designated by the donor.

#### Sec. 225. Receive and Expend Authorization for Federal Revenues

Authorizes MSP to expend federal revenues received in excess of appropriations; requires MSP to report prior to expending excess federal revenues.

#### Sec. 226. Data Privacy

Expresses legislative intent that MSP protect data from unauthorized access or use; requires department to notify data subjects if an unauthorized person accesses their information. (*Governor declared this section unenforceable.*)

#### Sec. 227. Attrition School

Requires MSP to use attrition savings to conduct an FY 2019-20 attrition school that graduates at least 70 troopers.

#### Sec. 228. Officer Evaluation Criteria

Prohibits use of citation volumes as a metric for performance evaluation and prohibits setting of a specified number of citations for an officer. (*Governor declared this section unenforceable*.)

#### LAW ENFORCEMENT SERVICES

#### Sec. 401. Training

Requires MSP to develop and deliver training that supports enforcement and public safety efforts of criminal justice community, stipulates goal of average classroom occupancy of at least 55%, requires report submission pertaining to recruit schools admissions and graduations, and requires distribution and review of course evaluations.

#### Sec. 402. Criminal Justice Information Center

Requires unexpended revenues deposited into Criminal Justice Information Center Service Fees Fund to carryforward and not lapse to General Fund; requires unexpended revenue generated by local State Records Management System fees to carryforward and not lapse to General Fund; requires MSP to:

- Maintain criminal justice information systems in support of public safety and law enforcement communities.
- Conduct at least 30 outreach activities targeted to criminal justice agencies.
- · Compile crime statistics.
- · Compile, evaluate, and disseminate traffic crash reports.
- Maintain, disseminate, and exchange criminal history and juvenile records.
- Maintain firearms licensure records; requires department to submit report pertaining to revenues from and expenditures for concealed pistol licensure.
- Provide volumes processed by Internet Criminal History Access Tool.

#### Sec. 403. Forensic Science

Requires MSP to provide forensic testing services to aid in criminal investigations and to maintain accreditation of laboratories; stipulates turnaround times for forensic science services; requires MSP to provide data on turnaround times, staffing levels, and backlogged cases; requires MSP to provide forensic testing and profiling of DNA evidence to aid in criminal investigations.

#### Sec. 404. Biometrics and Identification

Requires MSP to manage specified identification databases and provide data on submissions to the Automated Fingerprint Identification System database; requires MSP to maintain staffing and resources to achieve an average 28-day wait time for polygraph examinations, with a goal of an average 15-day wait time; requires MSP to post changes to protocols for retention and purging of DNA records.

#### Sec. 405. Sexual Assault Kit Analysis Report

Requires a report on sexual assault kit backlog at the beginning and end of prior fiscal year, volumes of sexual assault kits collected and analyzed during that period, and average turnaround time to analyze sexual assault kits.

#### Sec. 406. Community Service Programs

Requires MSP to provide administrative support for Auto Theft Prevention Authority, the Edward Byrne memorial justice assistance program, and school safety grants.

#### Sec. 407. School Safety Report

Requires Office of School Safety to submit report detailing school safety grants, incidents of school violence or threats, OK2SAY-based incidents and activities, and recommendations for school safety measures.

#### MICHIGAN COMMISSION ON LAW ENFORCEMENT STANDARDS

#### Sec. 501. Commission on Law Enforcement Standards

Stipulates MCOLES' responsibilities and requires maintenance of proper staffing and resource levels to update standards within 120 days of enactment date of new applicable legislation.

#### **FIELD SERVICES**

#### Sec. 601. General Law Enforcement and Traffic Safety

(1) Stipulates MSP troopers shall not be prohibited from responding to criminal or emergency situations and shall make every effort to protect residents; (2) requires MSP to maintain staff and resources to enhance traffic safety and dedicate a minimum of 455,200 hours to statewide patrol, with a minimum of 40,000 in distressed cities; (3) requires MSP to conduct 7,000 residence checks of registered sex offenders; (4) requires report on Secure Cities Partnership. (Governor declared subsections 2 and 3 unenforceable.)

#### Sec. 602. Criminal Investigations

(1) Requires MSP to identify and apprehend criminals through investigations; (2) requires maintenance of a specified number of investigation hours; (3) requires MSP to meet or exceed case clearance rate of 62%; (4) requires MSP to provide four training opportunities to local law enforcement partners related to gambling or opioids; (5) requires MSP to increase opioid-related investigations by 20% and work toward enhancing drug-interdiction efforts. (*Governor declared subsections 2,3,4, and 5 unenforceable.*)

#### Sec. 603. Tobacco Tax Fraud Investigations

(1) Requires MSP to provide prevention and suppression of organized untaxed tobacco smuggling; (2) requires submission of report pertaining to tobacco tax enforcement activities and expenditures; (3) requires MSP to dedicate a minimum of 16,600 hour to tobacco tax enforcement. (Governor declared subsection 3 unenforceable.)

#### Sec. 604. Fire Investigations

(1) Requires MSP to provide fire investigation training and assistance; (2) requires MSP to maintain readiness to a specified number of requests for fire investigation services. (*Governor declared subsection 2 unenforceable*.)

#### **SPECIALIZED SERVICES**

#### Sec. 701. Special Operations

(1) Requires MSP to operate Michigan Intelligence Operations Center for Homeland Security (MIOC); (2) requires MIOC to provide timely and accurate information and increase public awareness on how to report suspicious activity; (3) requires MSP to operate Cyber Section and to increase completion of computer crimes cases; (4) requires MSP to provide digital forensic analysis, and states case turnaround goal. (Governor declared subsections 3 and 4 unenforceable.)

#### Sec. 702. Specialized Support Teams

(1) Requires MSP to provide for specialized support services; (2) requires MSP to maintain staffing and resources to provide training and maintain readiness to respond to at least the number of specialty service requests received in FY 2010-11; (3) requires canine unit to be available for call out 100% of the time; (4) requires bomb squad unit to be available for call out 100% of the time; (5) requires emergency support teams to be available for call out 100% of the time; (6) requires marine services team to be available for call out 100% of the time; (7) requires available for call out 100% of the time, unless prohibited by weather or mechanical breakdown; (8) requires maintenance of adequate levels of staffing and resources to provide security services at state Capitol Building and surrounding buildings, also requires a minimum of 35,000 patrols at state-owned and leased facilities. (Governor declared subsections 2 through 7 and the annual property inspection goal of 35,000 inspections in subsection 8 unenforceable.)

#### Sec. 703. Commercial Vehicle Regulation and Enforcement

(1) Requires MSP to maintain commercial vehicle and enforcement activities; (2) requires MSP to meet inspection goals consistent with the federal motor carrier assistance program; (3) authorizes revenues collected under the Motor Carrier Act to be expended and to be carried forward; (4) establishes a Commercial Vehicle Enforcement Operations Reserve Fund. (Governor declared subsection 4 unenforceable.)

#### Sec. 704. Emergency Management and Homeland Security

Requires MSP to coordinate emergency response activates of governmental units and:

- Authorizes expenditure of appropriated funds to call upon state agencies or departments to protect life or property or to protect health or safety of any area under a state of emergency or disaster; report to State Budget Director; submit recommendations to legislature for supplemental appropriations.
- Authorizes department to expend additional funds from various sources to provide emergency management training or emergency response activities and notify legislature.
- Requires department to maintain partnerships to protect the state from all hazards.
- Requires department to serve local emergency management preparedness programs and local emergency planning committees, operate and maintain State Emergency Operations Center, respond to civil disorders and natural disasters at a specified level, and perform hazardous materials response training.
- Requires department to conduct a minimum of three training sessions to enhance emergency response.
- Appropriates amounts necessary from Disaster and Emergency Contingency Fund to cover costs related to disasters and emergencies upon approval of State Budget Director, notification of legislature, and requires department to submit report related to expenditures from fund.
- Authorizes department to expend funds from any line item in order to respond to an emergency and requires detailed reporting when funds are expended from Disaster and Emergency Contingency Fund.
- Requires department to report biannually on assessment of critical infrastructure vulnerabilities.

#### Sec. 705. Highway Safety Planning

Requires MSP to provide highway safety traffic safety programs in partnership with other public and private organizations.

#### Sec. 706. Secondary Road Patrol Program - VETOED

Requires department to provide funding to county sheriff departments to patrol secondary roads; stipulates sheriffs' duties under Secondary Road Patrol program; requires department, in conjunction with State Court Administrator, to provide report on traffic infractions and collections of justice system assessments. (*Governor vetoed section. 2019 PA 154 includes language as section 651.*)

#### **ONE-TIME APPROPRIATIONS**

#### Sec. 801. Sexual Assault Prevention and Education Initiative

Requires funds to be used for a competitive grant to colleges, universities, and high schools in the state in order to mitigate sexual assault; stipulates how grant awards may be used; authorizes use of unawarded funding for other Office of School Safety programs.

#### **FY 2020-21 GENERAL SECTIONS**

#### Sec. 1001. FY 2020-21 Appropriation

Expresses legislative intent that FY 2020-21 appropriations are anticipated to be the same as FY 2019-20 appropriations, except adjustments for changes in caseloads, federal fund match rates, economic factors, and available revenue.

#### **FY 2019-20 SUPPLEMENTAL SECTIONS**

#### Section. 651. Secondary Road Patrol Program

Requires department to provide funding to county sheriff departments to patrol secondary roads; stipulates sheriffs' duties under Secondary Road Patrol program; requires department, in conjunction with State Court Administrator, to provide report on traffic infractions and collections of justice system assessments.
