GLOSSARY

STATE BUDGET TERMS

Gross Appropriations (Gross): The total of all applicable appropriations (statutory spending authorizations) in a budget bill.

Adjusted Gross Appropriations (Adjusted Gross): The net amount of all gross appropriations after subtracting interdepartmental grants (IDGs) and intradepartmental transfers (IDTs).

Lapses: Appropriation amounts that are unspent/unobligated at the end of a fiscal year. Appropriations are automatically terminated at the end of a fiscal year unless otherwise provided by law.

Work Project: A statutorily-authorized account which allows a spending authorization to be carried over from one fiscal year to a succeeding fiscal year or years—i.e., allows funds to be spent over a period of years.

APPROPRIATION BILL TERMS

Line Item: Specific funding amount in an appropriation bill which establishes spending authorization for a particular program or function (may be for a single purpose or for multiple purposes).

Boilerplate: Specific language sections in an appropriation bill which direct, limit or restrict line item expenditures, express legislative intent, and/or require reports.

REVENUE SOURCES

General Fund/General Purpose (GF/GP): Unrestricted General Fund revenue available to fund any activity accounted for in the General Fund; unused GF/GP revenue lapses to the General Fund at the end of a fiscal year.

State Restricted (Restricted): State revenue restricted by state law or outside restriction that is available only for specified purposes; at year-end, unused restricted revenue remains in the restricted fund.

Federal Revenue: Federal grant or matchable revenue dedicated to specific programs.

Local Revenue: Revenue from local units of government.

Private Revenue: Revenue from non-government entities: rents, royalties or interest payments, payments from hospitals or individuals, and gifts and bequests.

Interdepartmental Grant (IDG): Revenue or funds received by one state department from another state department (usually for a service provided by the receiving department).

Intradepartmental Transfer (IDT): Transfers or funds being provided from one appropriation unit to another in the same department.

MAJOR STATE FUNDS

Budget Stabilization Fund (BSF): The countercyclical economic and budget stabilization fund; also known as the "rainy day" fund.

School Aid Fund (SAF): A restricted fund; the primary funding source for K-12 schools and Intermediate School Districts (ISDs).

General Fund: The General Fund (funded from taxes and other general revenue) is used to account for the ordinary operations of a governmental unit that are not accounted for in another fund.

DEPARTMENT OF LABOR AND ECONOMIC GROWTH

The Department of Labor and Economic Growth (DLEG) has primary responsibility for regulatory functions that relate specifically to commercial, business, and workers' issues. It also includes activities of the former Department of Career Development, such as various employment training-related programs for displaced workers, adults, and youth, and employment services for the disabled and welfare recipients.

This appropriation unit covers the Department's upper management: those with responsibility for decision making, administrative/policy direction, and leadership to ensure the Department's mission is implemented. It also includes general administrative expenses of the Department such as rent, property management, worker's compensation, Civil Service charges for human resources, and administrative services.

SECTION 103: OFFICE OF FINANCIAL AND INSURANCE REGULATION

This unit funds the Office of Financial and Insurance Regulation (OFIR), created by EO 2000-4, which consolidated all of the state's financial regulatory activity into a single office by merging the Financial Institutions Bureau, Insurance Bureau, and Securities Division of the former Corporations, Securities, and Land Development Bureau.

The Office of Financial Evaluation regulates banks and trusts, credit unions, insurance, securities, the mortgage industry, health maintenance organizations, and receiverships. The Office of Regulatory Compliance and Consumer Assistance regulates consumer financial services, market conduct, consumer education, and provides non-financial regulation of BCBSM, HMOs, and insurance companies. The Office of General Counsel supports the implementation and enforcement of the various statutes through enforcement actions, hearings, issuing orders and bulletins, drafting rules, and working with the Attorney General in matters involving litigation.

SECTION 104: PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION

This appropriation unit provides spending authority for the Public Service Commission (PSC), which regulates investor-owned natural gas, electric, telephone, and water utilities; rural electric cooperatives; and intrastate motor carriers. The Commission, created by 1939 PA 3, consists of three commissioners appointed by the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Senate, to serve staggered six-year terms. No more than two commissioners may represent a single political party.

SECTION 105: LIQUOR CONTROL COMMISSION

The appropriation for the Liquor Control Commission funds staff responsible for enforcement of the liquor laws of the state and licensing of all vendors of alcoholic beverages. The five members of the Commission, no more than three of whom may be members of the same political party, are appointed by the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Senate, to serve four-year terms.

SECTION 106: MICHIGAN STATE HOUSING DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY

Programs in this appropriation unit improve the supply of safe and sanitary dwelling accommodations for low-income or moderate-income families, senior citizens, and the handicapped. Michigan State Housing Development Authority (MSHDA) empowers the supply of housing primarily through the sale of tax-exempt notes and bonds, makes grants to nonprofit organizations for home rehabilitation, and administers various federal programs in support of housing, including Section 8 rental housing for low-income families. Four of the seven members of the authority are appointed by the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Senate, to serve four-year terms; the remaining members are directors of state departments.

SECTION 107: OCCUPATIONAL REGULATION

This unit funds the Bureau of Construction Codes Enforcement, the Bureau of Fire Safety and the Bureau of Commercial Services. Primary functions of the unit include uniform administration/enforcement of state construction code and related legislation, approval of pre-manufactured construction components and new construction devices/materials/techniques, and occupational licensing and regulation. The unit also finds remedies and sets penalties for violations of various codes, and licenses and registers local and state construction code inspectors. The Bureau of Fire Safety includes three fire fighting programs: Office of the State Fire Marshall, Firefighter Training Council, and Fire Safety Program.

Specifies amount of state spending from state resources to be paid to local units of government.

Sec. 202. Applicability of Management and Budget Act

Makes appropriations in the act subject to the Management and Budget Act, 1984 PA 31.

Sec. 203. Definitions

Defines various acronyms appearing in the act.

Sec. 204. 1% Civil Service Charge

Allows Department of Civil Service to bill departments and agencies at the end of the first quarter for the 1% classified service payroll charge authorized by the Constitution; payments to be made by the end of the second quarter.

Sec. 205. Hiring Freeze

Prohibits DLEG from hiring new full-time state classified civil service employees and from filling vacant state classified civil service positions unless exception to the freeze is granted by state budget director.

Sec. 208. Internet Reporting Requirements

Outlines requirements regarding use of Internet to fulfill legislative reporting requirements in the act.

Sec. 209. Buy American and Michigan Requirements

Prohibits use of funds to purchase foreign goods or services if competitively priced and of comparable quality American goods or services are available; states preference for Michigan-business supplied goods or services.

Sec. 210. Deprived and Depressed Communities

Requires DLEG director to take steps to ensure Michigan businesses in deprived/depressed communities compete for and perform state contracts; encourages subcontracting with businesses in deprived/depressed communities.

Sec. 211. Affirmative Action Guidelines

Directs DLEG to maintain affirmative action programs based on guidelines developed by State Equal Opportunity Workforce Planning Council in compliance with Section 26 of Article I of the State Constitution of 1963.

Sec. 213. User Fees for Information Technology (IT)

Directs DLEG to use appropriation for IT services/projects for user fees to DIT subject to interagency agreement.

Sec. 214. IT Work Projects

Designates IT services and projects appropriation as a work project.

Sec. 215. Policy Changes

Requires DLEG to report on policy changes made to implement public acts; prohibits adoption of rules that have a disproportionate impact on small businesses.

Sec. 216. Appropriated Funds De-Aggregation

States intent that all part 1 fund sources not be aggregated into general categories, but be specifically identified as much as possible.

Sec. 217. Travel Expenditure Limitations

Details travel limitations and exceptions.

Sec. 219. Executive Branch Employee Communications With the Legislature

Prohibits disciplinary action against Executive employees that communicate with a legislator or legislative staff.

Sec. 220. Carryforward of Federal Funds

Allows DLEG to carry into the succeeding fiscal year unexpended federal pass-through funds to local governments.

Sec. 221. Prohibits Purchase of Legal Services

Bans the purchase of legal services from third parties that are the responsibility of the Attorney General.

Sec. 222. Government Efficiency Commission Recommendations

Requires DLEG to review recommendations of the Commission on Governmental Efficiency.

Sec. 223. Contingency Funds

Permits appropriation of federal, state restricted, local and private funds up to specified amounts.

Sec. 224. Restrictions on Out-of-State Travel to Training Seminars

Prohibits more than one DLEG employee traveling out-of-state for training conferences unless funded by federal or private funds.

Sec. 301. Fire Protection Grants

Requires that these grants be distributed in accordance with 1977 PA 289.

Sec. 302. Conservatorship Funds

Appropriates funds collected by Office of Financial and Insurance Services (OFIS) in connection with conservatorship of a mortgage servicer to cover expenses of administering the conservatorship.

Sec. 303. Insurance Liquidation Funds

Appropriates funds collected from corporations being liquidated by DLEG pursuant to the Insurance Code to cover expenses of administering the liquidation.

Sec. 304. Fees for Customized Listings

Allows DLEG to provide customized lists of non-confidential information to interested parties; establishes fees; states that funds lapse to appropriate restricted fund account; requires report on revenue collected.

Sec. 306. Michigan State Housing Development Authority (MSHDA) Production Goals

Requires MSHDA to report annually on its housing production goals under all financing programs; report to give special attention to efforts to raise affordable multifamily housing goals.

Sec. 308. Elevator Fees

Allows license and permit fee revenue (collected under Elevator Licensing and Elevator Safety Board acts) carryforward.

Sec. 310. Fire Safety Fees

Establishes schedule used to assess fees on hospitals and schools for fire safety inspections and plan reviews.

Sec. 311. Transfer to Construction Code Fund

Transfers \$3.0 million in surplus corporation fees (copy and certification fees) to the State Construction Code Fund.

Sec. 313. Licensing and Regulation Fees

Allows carryforward of revenue generated for occupational licensing/regulation fees in excess of appropriation.

Sec. 314. Expenditure of Additional Federal Unemployment Insurance Funding

Allows expenditure of federal funds authorized by U.S. Department of Labor for Unemployment Insurance Agency and Employment Service Agency in excess of amount appropriated, on notification of appropriation subcommittees and state budget office of the purpose and amount of grant awards.

Sec. 315. Sale of Documents

Allows DLEG to sell certain documents at a cost not to exceed cost of production and distribution; funds to be used for costs directly related to updating and distributing these documents.

Sec. 317. Workplace Deaths and Injuries

Requires report to the Legislature of the number of persons killed or injured on the job in regulated industries.

Sec. 326. Commission for the Blind Case Services

Provides that funds appropriated in part 1 for the Michigan Commission for the Blind may be used for tuition payments; permits carryforward.

Sec. 335. Low-Income/Energy Efficiency Assistance Program

Establishes deadlines for application and award announcements; requires Public Service Commission to report to Legislature and state budget office on distribution of funds.

Sec. 336. OFIR Expenditures

Requires report of actual expenditures for last completed fiscal year for each division within OFIR.

Sec. 337. OFIR Credit Scoring

Prohibits expending funds to implement a ban on credit scoring in insurance rate setting until the Legislature has authorized such a prohibition.

Sec. 340. Health Maintenance Organization (HMO) Financial Filings

Requires that OFIR provide copies of HMO quarterly and annual financial filings to the fiscal agencies.

Sec. 350. Adverse Determination by Health Benefit Plan/External Review Awareness Promotion

Directs DLEG to allocate funds to promote awareness of policy holders' right to request external review of adverse determination by a health benefit plan after exhaustion of health carrier's internal grievance process.

Sec. 352. Appellate Commission/Board of Magistrates Case Timeliness and Membership

Requires expenditures in part 1 be used so that cases are decided in a timely manner; funds from unclassified salaries appropriation line to support five appellate commissioners and 26 magistrates.

Sec. 355. Ergonomics Rules Prohibited

Prohibits promulgation of ergonomics rules that are more stringent than voluntary federal guidelines.

Sec. 356. Michigan Commission for the Blind Matching Funds

Establishes legislative intent that Michigan Commission for the Blind work collaboratively with service organizations to identify qualified match dollars to maximize use of available federal funds.

Sec. 357. Real Estate Red Book Publishing

Allocates up to \$50,000 to resume printing of a reference book of real estate laws and rules known as the Red Book.

Sec. 358. Real Estate Education Fund

Allows real estate pre- and post-licensure education to be delivered through on-line courses by a community college, university, or private school; allows Real Estate Education Fund to be used for grants to educational providers to establish on-line courses available to students.

Sec. 361. Land Bank Fast Track Authority

Allows Land Bank Fast Track Authority to expend funds received under Land Bank Fast Track Act to acquire, lease, manage, demolish, maintain, or rehabilitate real or personal property, pay debt service for notes or bonds issued by the authority, and any other expenses to clear or quiet title property held by authority.

Sec. 362. Administration and Enforcement of Boxing Regulation

Requires use of \$200,000 from funds in part 1 for administration/enforcement of boxing regulation in Michigan.

Sec. 364. Michigan Broadband Development Authority Loan Status

Requires MSHDA to report by January 1 on status of loans entered into by Michigan Broadband Development Authority.

Sec. 365. Training Grant to Aggregate Industry

Requires allocating not less than \$40,000 for training grants to non-profit organizations representing the aggregate industry in Michigan.

Sec. 368. Funds Collected Under Administrative Procedures Act of 1969

Appropriates funds collected under 1969 PA 306 for cost of publication/distribution of administrative procedures.

Sec. 369. Video Franchise Assessment Fund

Creates fund to implement the Uniform Video Services Local Franchise Act, PA 480 of 2006.

Sec. 370. MSHDA Report on Cities of Promise Blight Elimination Program

Mandates report on Cities of Promise Program including funding and outcomes by city.

Sec. 376. Liquor Control Commission Report

Requires Liquor Control Commission to estimate the lost state revenue due to spirits being purchasing in other states for individual consumption or illegal resale; requires an estimate of the cost of increased enforcement efforts.

Sec. 377. Appropriation of Unexpended Workforce Investment Act (WIA) Funds

Permits appropriation of unencumbered/unexpended WIA funds from prior years; requires report to the Legislature on such appropriations.

Sec. 378. SOAHR Decisions in Public Assistance Cases

States legislative intent that the State Office of Administrative Hearings and Rules (SOAHR) develop a system to post administrative hearings decisions regarding public assistance on the Internet.

Sec. 379. Teacher Tenure Cases

Requires SOAHR to report on the status of pending teacher tenure cases.

Sec. 401. Contributions to Michigan Career and Technical Institute (MCTI)

Allows MCTI to receive equipment and in-kind contributions from the Pine Lake Fund and other local or intermediate school districts.

Sec. 402. Sources of Matching Funds for Vocational Rehabilitation Programs

Requires Michigan Rehabilitation Services unit to make every effort to ensure that all possible sources of funds are used to match federal vocational rehabilitation funds.

Sec. 403. Local Match Requirements for Facilities Establishment Grants

Requires that local match for vocational rehabilitation facilities establishment grants not exceed 21.3% for the fiscal year ending September 30.

Sec. 404. Centers for Independent Living

Distributes grant funds to state's centers for independent living; requires biennial report to Legislature from Michigan Association of Centers for Independent Living on budget of each center, savings to taxpayers from grants, and program outcomes.

Sec. 405. Work First Program Guidelines

Establishes guidelines for administering Work First Program, including work participation requirements for welfare recipients enrolled in program by referencing applicable federal and state laws.

Sec. 406. Work First Data Reporting

Requires a three-year longitudinal study of former Work First participants' employment and salary situations, benefits, job retention, and general welfare; requires notification of study's Internet site location by March 15.

Sec. 407. Workforce Development Boards

Requires local workforce development boards to maintain partnerships with governmental agencies, schools, and colleges located within their service delivery areas; specifies membership of education advisory groups.

Sec. 409. Private Grant Funded Projects

Requires report to Legislature within 10 days of receipts of grants for private grant funded projects line.

Sec. 410. Disabled Veterans Outreach Program

Stipulates staffing levels for disabled veterans outreach program specialists and local veterans employment representatives to assist veterans within Michigan Works! Employment service centers.

Sec. 415. Private Occupational School License Fees

Requires that these appropriated fees be applied to administrative cost of Proprietary Schools Oversight unit.

Sec. 417. Defaulted Future Faculty Program Loan Collections

Appropriates up to \$100,000 collected on defaulted loans under Future Faculty Program in the King-Chavez-Parks initiative; states that funds be used to offset cost loan collection administration.

Sec. 418. Employment Outcomes for Future Faculty Program Participants

Requires participating universities to provide DLEG with information on employment outcomes of program participants; requires report on this data.

Sec. 421. Marketing of King-Chavez-Parks Program

Directs DLEG to market the program to parents and students, and report to the Legislature electronically on these marketing efforts; requires program be administered as it was when in the Department of Education.

Sec. 427. Youth Low-Vision Program

Identifies the Youth Low-Vision Program as the payer of last resort.

Sec. 429. Focus: HOPE Reporting

Requires Focus: HOPE to report on its use of funds appropriated in the budget act.

Sec. 431. Michigan Nursing Corps

Describes purpose and funding for Michigan Nursing Corps program, including accelerated training of both nurses and nursing faculty, and allows matching grants to hospitals providing clinical nursing training.

Sec. 432. No Worker Left Behind Program

Outlines report on program outcomes to be provided to the Legislature.

Sec. 432a. No Worker Left Behind (NWLB) Program

Allocates \$15.0 million GF/GP for NWLB to adult education programs, community colleges, and worker training; requires workgroup on collaboration in adult education programs; requires data collection system on training in in-demand occupations; requires GF/GP funds be expended to maximize participation of food assistance recipients; requires report.

Sec. 433. JET Program Outcomes Report

Specifies JET program outcome information to be included in report to the Legislature.

Sec. 434. Michigan After School Partnership

Allows up to \$25,000 be used to implement the December 15, 2003, Michigan After-School Initiative's recommendations for after school programs for school-age children.

Sec. 435. No Worker Left Behind Eligibility

Mandates that DLEG ensure that school districts and career preparation programs operated by school districts are eligible education providers under NWLB and other WIA-funded programs.

Sec. 437. Welfare-to-Work Funds Allocation

Allocates \$200,000 to public-private welfare-to-work partnership involving an imbedded DHS caseworker at the job site of an employer to work with employees receiving public assistance.

Sec. 438. Additional MSHDA Funding

Prescribes use of \$2.2 million grant to MSHDA, and includes report to the Legislature.

Sec. 439. Focus: HOPE Career Prep Pilot Program

Establishes legislative intent that DLEG work with Career Alliance (Genesee-Shiawassee Michigan Works! Agency) and other interested MWAs in implementing the career prep pilot program developed by Focus: HOPE.

Sec. 440. Gang Diversion

States legislative intent to set aside some Workforce Investment Act (statewide activities) funds to support gang diversion activities and support services of local law enforcement and MWAs in Wyoming, Detroit, and Benton Harbor.

Sec. 442. Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) Contingency Funds

Appropriates up to \$30.0 million in TANF funds, upon receipt of TANF Contingency Funds in FY 2007-08, and subsequent carryforward of TANF block grant funds in FY 2008-09.
