In this report, line item vetoes are presented in the following manner: appropriation amounts shown in strikeout are those that appear in the enrolled bill; amounts shown directly below strikeout amounts reflect the effect of the veto.

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GLOSSARY

STATE BUDGET TERMS

Gross Appropriations (Gross): The total of all applicable appropriations (statutory spending authorizations) in a budget bill.

Adjusted Gross Appropriations (Adjusted Gross): The net amount of all gross appropriations after subtracting interdepartmental grants (IDGs) and intradepartmental transfers (IDTs).

Lapses: Appropriation amounts that are unspent/unobligated at the end of a fiscal year. Appropriations are automatically terminated at the end of a fiscal year unless otherwise provided by law.

Work Project: A statutorily-authorized account which allows a spending authorization to be carried over from one fiscal year to a succeeding fiscal year or years—i.e., allows funds to be spent over a period of years.

APPROPRIATION BILL TERMS

Line Item: Specific funding amount in an appropriation bill which establishes spending authorization for a particular program or function (may be for a single purpose or for multiple purposes).

Boilerplate: Specific language sections in an appropriation bill which direct, limit or restrict line item expenditures, express legislative intent, and/or require reports.

REVENUE SOURCES

General Fund/General Purpose (GF/GP): Unrestricted General Fund revenue available to fund any activity accounted for in the General Fund; unused GF/GP revenue lapses to the General Fund at the end of a fiscal year.

State Restricted (Restricted): State revenue restricted by state law or outside restriction that is available only for specified purposes; at year-end, unused restricted revenue remains in the restricted fund.

Federal Revenue: Federal grant or matchable revenue dedicated to specific programs.

Local Revenue: Revenue from local units of government.

Private Revenue: Revenue from non-government entities: rents, royalties or interest payments, payments from hospitals or individuals, and gifts and bequests.

Interdepartmental Grant (IDG): Revenue or funds received by one state department from another state department (usually for a service provided by the receiving department).

Intradepartmental Transfer (IDT): Transfers or funds being provided from one appropriation unit to another in the same department.

MAJOR STATE FUNDS

Budget Stabilization Fund (BSF): The countercyclical economic and budget stabilization fund; also known as the "rainy day" fund.

School Aid Fund (SAF): A restricted fund; the primary funding source for K-12 schools and Intermediate School Districts (ISDs).

General Fund: The General Fund (funded from taxes and other general revenue) is used to account for the ordinary operations of a governmental unit that are not accounted for in another fund.

DEPARTMENT OF STATE POLICE

The mission of the Michigan Department of State Police (MSP) is to provide the highest quality law enforcement and public safety services throughout Michigan. In addition to the department's role of providing general law enforcement services and the enforcement of traffic laws, the department is responsible for the development and coordination of state-level programs, technologies, and specialized services that enhance enforcement and emergency response capabilities for the entire public safety community. Organizational goals of the department are to provide statewide policing to enhance public safety, to provide the highest quality training and technology to departmental employees, and to enhance services to the public and law enforcement community by improving performance management.

Note: Appropriations for FY 2013-14 are contained in seven appropriation units and 12 line items, with 19 corresponding scheduled programs. (See the Table of Contents.) The scheduled programs are informational in nature and may be adjusted within the larger line items by the department, with the approval of the State Budget Office, but without legislative approval. The only specific listing of revenue in the bill is in the Schedule of Revenue in Part 1, with the bill providing that revenues may not necessarily be received in the amounts listed or from the sources listed.

Several programs (line items) that have existed in prior years have been rolled up into a related scheduled program, which generally correspond to the "core services" of the department. However, the state's accounting system continues to follow the prior budget structure, maintaining separate accounts for the former line items that are now rolled-up into the larger scheduled programs and line items that appear in the bill. This summary continues to present the budget information following the prior budget structure (as that is the way it is presented in the accounting system) to provide a greater amount of detail than what is presented in the budget bill itself. Only the appropriations for the 12 actual line items are legally binding.

SCHEDULE OF REVENUES

Within the bill, revenues in each appropriations unit are denoted only by the general category of revenue – e.g., IDG/IDT, federal, local, private, restricted, and GF/GP. A listing of revenue by the specific source is included in the Schedule of Revenues included in Part 1.

Boilerplate Section 216 provides the department with some flexibility in the receipt of revenue in noting that revenues may not necessarily be received from the funding entities and sources listed in the bill. Despite this disclaimer, any funding that is required by statute is not subject to the flexibility provided through the schedule of programs and the schedule of revenue.

SECTION 102: EXECUTIVE DIRECTION

The Executive Direction unit provides funding for the Office of the Director. The office is responsible for the administration of the department, including policy formulation and review, program planning and execution, and administrative decision-making. There are a number of separate sections organized within the Office of the Director, including the Public Affairs Section, Legislative and Legal Resources Section, Professional Standards Section, Office of Behavioral Science, and the Executive Protection Section. Funding for the Executive Protection Section is funded through a separate scheduled program.

The Executive Direction Unit also includes a line item providing funding for the salaries of unclassified positions, as provided in Section 455 of the Management and Budget Act, 1984 PA 431 (MCL 18.1455).

*There are two line items in this appropriations unit: Unclassified Positions and Executive Direction. There are two scheduled programs associated with the Executive Direction line item: Executive Direction and Special Operations and Events.

SECTION 102: EXECUTIVE DIRECTION Line Item: Unclassified Positions

Article 11, Section 5 of the State Constitution generally establishes the classified employment system, but excludes from classified service the heads of principal departments and up to five other positions (generally of a policy-making nature) within each principal department, among other positions.

Section 455 of the Management and Budget Act, MCL 18.1455, requires that "[t]he appropriations made under a budget act for unclassified positions as specified by a line item appropriation shall only be used for those positions."

<u>Public Information:</u> Coordinates and processes all Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) requests received by the department; oversees retention of CJIC records.

<u>Enforcement Records Unit</u>: Oversees the many electronic records management systems, including those related to traffic crash reporting, citations, officer daily logs, and the Automated Incident Capture System (AICS) used for the collection, storage, and reporting of incident information by MSP troopers and other officers during the course of investigations.

<u>Criminal History Section</u>: Maintains a database of criminal arrests, charges, and conviction in Michigan; links to the FBI criminal records system; provides criminal history data to law enforcement agencies and in support of employment- and licensing-related background checks; maintenance of the Internet Criminal History Access Tool (ICHAT), allowing public criminal history searches.

<u>Law Enforcement Information Network (LEIN)</u>: Criminal justice database allowing entry, updates, and queries for records and information relating to warrants, stolen property, missing persons, protection orders, firearms records, Department of State records, Department of Corrections records, sex offender registry status, and criminal history information.

<u>Firearms Records</u>: Maintenance of records relating to registered handguns and concealed pistol licenses (CPLs); liaison to FBI regarding compliance with the Brady Act.

Michigan Criminal Justice Information Network (MiCJIN): Provides a secure, single point of access to the range of law enforcement software applications utilized by MSP and local law enforcement agencies, including pistol registration (APRS), digital photographic images (SNAP), LEIN, Department of State driver's license and state identification card images (MiDIRS), CPL database, and the Sex Offender Registry.

<u>Michigan Incident Crime Reporting (MICR)</u>: Processes and analyzes crime data; publishes crime statistics on violent offenses (murder, rape, aggravated assault, robbery) and property offenses (burglary, larceny, motor vehicle theft, arson), hate crimes, domestic violence, and law enforcement officers killed and assaulted.

<u>Audit and Training</u>: Compliance audits of all criminal justice agencies and others to ensure the security, integrity, and confidentiality of criminal justice information; coordinates CJIC division training.

The CJIC program line also supports parts of the Biometrics and Identification Division:

<u>Automated Print Identification Section</u>: Maintenance of the Automated Fingerprint Identification System (AFIS), a centralized computerized repository to encode, search, and match fingerprints. Law enforcement agencies upload fingerprint submissions to the system, and query the system to identify perpetrators.

<u>Digital Image Section</u>: Maintenance of the Statewide Network of Agency Photographs (SNAP), a centralized computerized repository of digital criminal images, including mug shots, scars, tattoos, and other marks. Law enforcement agencies upload photographs and query the system to identify perpetrators.

Under the plan, the 29 remaining posts are fully operational and open to the public; 19 posts were retained as detachments that serve as locations where troopers can start and end their shifts, accomplish administrative tasks, and meet with the public by appointment; and 14 posts were closed. The department also operates out of many other detachments co-located with other state facilities – including MDOT Transportation Service Centers, state correctional facilities, and a National Guard armory – as well as facilities used primarily by other local government entities.

Sec. 204. IDG Funding Received by the Department

Lists specific amounts and sources of interdepartmental grant funding received by the department.

Sec. 205. IDG Funding Made Available to Other State Departments

Lists specific amounts and sources of interdepartmental grant funding made available by the department to other state departments.

Sec. 206. Contingency Funding

Appropriates up to \$10.0 million in federal, \$3.5 million in state restricted, \$1.0 million in local, and \$200,000 in private contingency funds; authorizes expenditure of funds after legislative transfer to specific line items.

Sec. 207. Transparency Website

Requires the department to provide the data necessary for DTMB to maintain a searchable website that is accessible by the public at no cost that includes expenditure data, data on payments made to vendors, and data on number of active employees, job specifications, and wage rates.

Sec. 208. Internet Availability of Required Reports

Requires the department to use the Internet to fulfill reporting requirements; authorizes transmission of reports via e-mail.

Sec. 209. Purchase of Foreign Goods

Prohibits the purchase of foreign goods or services if competitively priced and of comparable quality American goods or services are available; requires preference be given to goods and services manufactured by Michigan businesses and Michigan businesses owned and operated by veterans; requires preference to goods and services provided by small business where veterans comprise at least 35% of the total workforce.

Sec. 210. Businesses in Deprived and Depressed Communities

Requires the department director to take all reasonable steps to ensure businesses in deprived and depressed communities compete for and perform contracts.

Sec. 212. Receipt and Retention of Required Reports

Requires the department to receive and retain copies of all required reports; requires federal and state guidelines to be followed for short- and long-term retention of records; authorizes the department to electronically retain copies of reports unless otherwise required by federal and state guidelines.

Sec. 215. Disciplinary Action Against State Employees

Prohibits the department from taking disciplinary action against employees for communicating with legislators or their staff.

Sec. 216. Schedule of Programs Disclaimer

Specifies that the schedule of programs is a list of programs which may be, but is not required to be, funded; specifies that the schedule of revenue sources may or may not be received from the entities listed; specifies that Secondary Road Patrol funding is not subject to funding flexibility and the program will be funded in accordance with law; specifies that funding required by statute is not subject to funding flexibility.

Sec. 217. Budgetary Efficiency

Requires the department to improve its budgetary efficiency by prioritizing personnel over buildings, pursuing consolidation of support services, seeking expenditure reductions, and identifying efficiencies that can be gained via the reduction or elimination of programs.

Sec. 218. Out-of-State Travel

Requires the department to report on out-of-state travel expenses paid for in whole or in part with state appropriations.

Sec. 219. Quarterly Reporting on Achieving Requirements

Requires the department to provide quarterly reports on the its performance against the metrics cited in the act, status of work projects, financial status, information which validates that all requirements in the article have been achieved, corrective action plans for requirements not achieved, and summary of fund shifts.

Sec. 221. Department Core Services

Lists core services of the department and requires appropriations to be used for core services.

Sec. 222. Post Closure or Consolidation

Requires the department to notify subcommittees not less than 90 days before recommending closure or consolidation of any state police posts.

Sec. 223. Privatization

Requires submission of a project plan to the appropriations subcommittees and the fiscal agencies 90 days before beginning any effort to privatize.

Sec. 224. Use of Funding for Legal Services

Prohibits using appropriations to hire a person to provide legal services that are the responsibility of the attorney general; prohibition does not apply to legal services for bonding activities and for those activities that the attorney general authorizes.

Sec. 226. Contractual Services

Requires that contractual (reimbursed) services provided by the department be reimbursed for all costs incurred, including retirement and overtime costs; requires cost service delivery models; requires reimbursed services provided to entities other than local units of government be provided on an overtime basis.

Sec. 228. General Fund Lapses

Requires the department and DTMB to report on estimates of general fund lapses at the close of the fiscal year.

Sec. 229. Report on State Restricted Funds

Requires the department and DTMB to report on state restricted fund balances, projected state restricted fund revenues, and state restricted fund expenditures.

Sec. 230. Performance Metrics Report

Requires the department to maintain a publicly accessible website that identifies and tracks the department's performance against key metrics used to monitor and improve the department's operations.

Sec. 231. Assistance to Communities Without Adequate Law Enforcement

Requires the department to provide general law enforcement assistance to communities that have no local law enforcement, or that are underserved, until adequate services can be provided by other means.

Sec. 232. Michigan Public Safety Communications System (MPSCS)

Requires the department to act as a liaison between DTMB and local public safety agencies to facilitate the use of MPSCS towers and to establish interoperability standards among communications systems.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTION

Sec. 250. Unclassified Positions

Lists titles of unclassified positions currently in the department; requires the department to notify the subcommittees prior to submitting requests for additional unclassified positions or requests for substantive changes to the duties of existing unclassified positions.

Sec. 251. Administration of the Department

Requires the effective and efficient executive administration of the department.

Sec. 252. Special Operations

Requires the department to provide effective protection for the governor and visiting dignitaries.

SCIENCE, TECHNOLOGY, AND TRAINING BUREAU

Training

Sec. 302. Training and Education Metrics

Requires the department to maintain proper levels of staffing and resources for providing training and educational opportunities that support enforcement and public safety efforts of the criminal justice community.

Sec. 303. MCOLES Services

Requires MCOLES to provide standards for law enforcement officers and to maintain proper levels of staffing and resources for providing basic law enforcement training for police academy programs.

Sec. 304(1)-(4). Criminal History and Accident Data Collection System

Requires the department to maintain proper levels of staffing and resources for maintaining criminal history and accident data collection systems; requires criminal records to be maintained in accordance with federal and state requirements.

Sec. 304(5)-(8). Fingerprint and Background Checks

Requires the department to maintain proper levels of staffing and resources for providing fingerprint and background check services to law enforcement agencies.

Sec. 304(9)-(12). Law Enforcement Information Network (LEIN) Services

Requires the department to maintain proper levels of staffing and resources for maintaining LEIN services in support of public safety and law enforcement communities; requires report on ways to reduce LEIN costs by 5% without adversely affecting services.

Sec. 304(13)-(15). Sex Offender Registry

Requires the department to maintain proper levels of staffing and resources for overseeing and enforcing the state's Sex Offender Registry; requires the SOR unit to follow up on tips assigned to law enforcement agencies within 10 working days.

FORENSIC SCIENCES

Forensics

Sec. 401. Forensic Testing Services and Evidence

Requires the department to maintain proper levels of staffing and resources for providing forensic testing services and evidence; requires the department to post changes to protocol for retaining and purging DNA samples and records on the department's website.

UNIFORM SERVICES

Traffic Safety and Enforcement

Sec. 501(1)-(3). Traffic Safety and Enforcement

Requires the department to maintain proper levels of staffing and resources for overseeing traffic safety and enforcement; requires at least 300,000 patrol hours, including at least 24,000 patrol hours in distressed cities.

Sec. 501(4). Duties of Enlisted Personnel

Requires enlisted personnel to respond to crimes in progress and other emergency situations in addition to enforcing traffic laws.

Sec. 501(5). Sex Offender Reporting Compliance

Requires the department to maintain staffing and resources to perform activities necessary to maintain a 93% compliance rate for reporting by registered sex offenders.

Sec. 501(6). Cities in Distress Public Safety Initiative

Requires the department to report on statistics associated with the cities in distress public safety initiative (i.e., statistics regarding trooper schools, criminal activity, and local law enforcement officers) for the prior fiscal year.

Sec. 501(7)-(9). Security at Events

Requires the department to respond to potential and imminent threats to the state's facilities. Systems and property, and large scale recreational events and major public sponsored events; directs that funds appropriated in part 1 be expended in support of the department's costs associated with additional show-of-force, enforcement, or traffic safety efforts; requires the department to maintain the ability to support the cost of 7,000 overtime hours or the financial equivalent in terms of fuel, equipment, and other costs.

Sec. 501(10). Michigan International Speedway Traffic Control

Requires the department to provide traffic control for events at Michigan International Speedway.

Capitol Security

Sec. 505. Security Services at the Capitol Building

Requires the department to maintain proper levels of staffing and resources for providing security services at the state Capitol Building and surrounding buildings; requires the department to pursue federal grants to improve security services; requires at least 35,000 patrol hours.

SPECIALIZED SERVICES

Specialty Teams

Sec. 601. Specialty Services to Citizens

Requires the department to maintain proper levels of staffing and resources for providing specialty services, such as canine unit, bomb squad, emergency support teams, underwater recovery, and aviation services; requires private donations to the canine unit to be used for purchasing equipment and other items to enhance operation of the unit.

Criminal Investigation

Sec. 602. Criminal Investigations

Requires the department to maintain proper levels of staffing and resources for identifying and apprehending criminals through criminal investigations; requires the department to enforce the tobacco products tax act; requires at least 16,600 hours enforcing tobacco tax laws.

Fire Investigation

Sec. 603. Fire Investigation Services

Requires the department to maintain proper levels of staffing and resources for providing fire investigation services through investigative assistance to local law enforcement agencies.

Motor Carrier Enforcement

Sec. 604(1). Motor Carrier Enforcement

Requires the department to maintain proper levels of staffing and resources to enforce the motor carrier safety act and related regulations.

Sec. 604(2). School Bus Inspections

Requires the department to annually inspect all black and yellow school buses.

Sec. 604(3). Commercial Vehicle Inspections

Requires the department to maintain proper levels of staffing and resources for annually inspecting 53,000 commercial vehicles.

SUPPORT SERVICES

Sec. 701. Department Administrative Support Services

Requires the department to maintain proper staffing and resources to ensure proper accountability of state funds, adherence to financial management and administrative guidelines, and proper controls in the procurement of goods and services.

State Emergency Operations Center Operations and Preparedness

Sec. 702(1)-(3). Civil Disorders, Natural Disasters, and Intelligence Operations Center

Requires the department to respond to civil disorders and natural disasters and to maintain readiness, including training and equipment; requires the department to provide public and private partners with timely and accurate information regarding threats reported to the Michigan Intelligence Operations Center (MIOC).

Sec. 702(4)-(6). Emergency Management Framework

Requires the department to foster partnerships to protect the state from all hazards, maintain local emergency management preparedness programs and planning committees, operate the State Emergency Operations Center (SEOC), and provide training in responding to civil disorders, natural disasters, hazardous materials, and other emergencies and incidents.

Sec. 702(7)-(8). Emergency Management Fund

Authorizes the department to expend appropriated funds to call upon any agency or department to protect life or property or to protect the health or safety of any area under an state of emergency or state of disaster; provides authority to expend funds received in above the amounts appropriated in part 1 for any federal, private, local, or state resource to provide emergency management training or emergency preparedness, response, recovery, or mitigation.

Sec. 702(9). Urban Search and Rescue

Allocated \$500,000 from the funds appropriated in part 1 to support the urban search and rescue taskforce.

Sec. 704. Disaster and Emergency Contingency Fund

Authorizes the expenditure of up to \$800,000 from the Disaster and Emergency Contingency Fund as provided in the Emergency Management Act; requires prior approval of the state budget director and prior notice to the appropriations committees; requires annual report on fund activities; allows carry forward of unexpended funds.

Highway Safety Planning and Awareness

Sec. 705. Public Awareness Campaigns

Requires the department to provide highway safety information and awareness to the public and other interested parties.

ONE-TIME APPROPRIATIONS

Sec. 801. Secondary Road Patrol

Provides that the \$150,000 GF/GP appropriated for the Secondary Road Patrol (SRP) program is one-time; states intent to establish a workgroup look at revenue, allocation formula, administration, and other issues.

Sec. 802. Trooper Recruit School

Requires the department to train at least 107 recruits.

Sec. 803. Grand Rapids Forensics Laboratory

Requires the one-time \$400,000 GF/GP appropriation to the Grand Rapids forensic laboratory to be expended for special maintenance at the lab.

Sec. 804. Emergency Vehicle Response Team

Requires the one-time \$350,000 GF/GP appropriation for the emergency response team to be used for the purchase of two vehicles to support the response team.

ANTICIPATED APPROPRIATIONS

Sec. 1201. Anticipated Appropriations

Expresses intent of the Legislature to provide the same appropriations for fiscal year 2014-15 as provided in fiscal year 2013-14, except for where adjustments are made for caseload and related costs, federal fund match rates, economic factors, and available revenue.

Sec. 1202. Retirement Costs

Expresses legislative intent that the department identify the amounts of normal retirement and legacy retirement for FY 2014-15 for the line items listed in part 1.
