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#### **GLOSSARY**

#### **APPROPRIATIONS AND FUND SOURCES**

#### **Appropriation**

Authority to expend funds. An appropriation is not a mandate to spend. Constitutionally, state funds cannot be expended without an appropriation by the Legislature.

#### **Gross Appropriations**

Total spending authority from all revenue sources.

#### Interdepartmental Grant (IDG) Revenue

Funds received by one state department from another state department—usually for service(s) provided.

#### **Adjusted Gross Appropriations**

Gross appropriations excluding IDGs; avoids double counting when adding appropriation amounts across budget areas.

#### **Federal Revenue**

Federal grant or match revenue; generally dedicated to specific programs or purposes.

#### **Local Revenue**

Revenue received from local units of government for state services.

#### **Private Revenue**

Revenue from individuals and private entities, including payments for services, grants, and other contributions.

#### State Restricted Revenue

State revenue restricted by the State Constitution, state statute, or outside restriction that is available only for specified purposes; includes most fee revenue.

#### General Fund/General Purpose (GF/GP) Revenue

Unrestricted general fund revenue available to fund basic state programs and other purposes determined by the Legislature.

#### **MAJOR STATE FUNDS**

#### **General Fund**

The state's primary operating fund; receives state revenue not dedicated to another state fund.

#### School Aid Fund (SAF)

A restricted fund that serves as the primary state funding source for K-12 schools and Intermediate School Districts. Constitutionally, SAF revenue may also be used for postsecondary education.

#### **Budget Stabilization Fund**

The Countercyclical Economic and Budget Stabilization Fund (also known as the "rainy day fund"); the Management and Budget Act provides guidelines for making deposits into and withdrawals from the fund.

#### STATE BUDGET TERMS

#### Fiscal Year

The state's fiscal year (FY) runs from October to September. FY 2016-17 is October 1, 2016 through September 30, 2017.

#### Line Item

Specific appropriation amount in a budget bill which establishes spending authorization for a particular program or function.

#### **Boilerplate**

Specific language sections in an appropriation bill which direct, limit, or restrict line-item expenditures, express legislative intent, and/or require reports.

## Lapse

Appropriated amounts that are unspent or unobligated at the end of a fiscal year. Appropriations are automatically terminated at the end of a fiscal year unless designated as a work project. Lapsed funds are available for expenditure in the subsequent fiscal year.

# **Work Project**

Account authorized through statutory process which allows appropriated spending authorization from one fiscal year to be utilized for expenditures in a succeeding fiscal year or years for a specific project or purpose.

#### DEPARTMENT OF STATE POLICE

The Michigan Department of State Police (MSP) is the state's primary law enforcement and emergency response authority and is responsible for criminal law enforcement and investigation, traffic and commercial vehicle safety, emergency management and homeland security, and the administration and implementation of various programs, services, and technologies provided by the MSP and intended to enhance the capacity, capability, competency, and coordination of federal, state, and local law enforcement agencies, the criminal justice system, and the entire public safety community.

NOTE: The Legislature has significantly and continually rearranged the structure of the MSP budget over recent years by condensing appropriation units, combining line items, coalescing fund sources, and generally extending funding flexibility while expanding performance metrics via reporting requirements. Beginning in FY 2011-12, the line items within the budget were variously combined and the quantity was ultimately reduced from nearly 60 ongoing line items to merely five within the FY 2014-15 budget. These five ongoing line items, arranged under four appropriation units, encompassed 20 nonbinding schedules of programs. Furthermore, the budget included a schedule of revenues which indicated nonbinding budget-wide estimated amounts of specific fund sources, whereas generic fund types (e.g., federal, restricted, GF/GP) were appropriated from to support line items.

The Legislature made significant revisions to the structure of the FY 2016-17 MSP budget, which consists of six appropriation units containing a total of twenty-nine separate line items. The schedule of programs and schedule of revenues budget structure is eliminated, but each appropriation unit is still funded through generic fund types.

# **SECTION 103: LAW ENFORCEMENT SERVICES**

Appropriation unit includes five line items, which support biometric and forensic science services, the Criminal Justice Information Center, and grants and training to local law enforcement and criminal justice agencies.

Polygraph Section: Provides highly trained examiners utilizing polygraph instruments along with validated psychophysiological and credibility assessment techniques to distinguish truth from deception and give investigative direction to law enforcement agencies requesting services. Criminal Justice Information Center – 133.0 FTE positions 18,485,400 Supports the staff and operations of the Criminal Justice Information Center (CJIC), which includes:

Enforcement Records Unit: Manages and maintains several electronic records management systems, including those related to traffic crash reporting, citations, officer daily logs and the Automated Incident Capture System (AICS) used for the collection, storage, and reporting of incident information by law enforcement officers during the course of investigations.

<u>Criminal History Section</u>: Manages and maintains database of criminal arrests, charges, and conviction in Michigan, linking to the FBI criminal records system, and provides criminal history data to law enforcement agencies, employers and regulators performing background checks, and the public via the Internet Criminal History Access Tool (ICHAT). <u>Law Enforcement Information Network (LEIN)</u>: Manages and maintains criminal justice database allowing entry, updates, and queries for records and information relating to warrants, stolen property, missing persons, protection orders, firearms records, Departments of State and Corrections records, sex offender registry status, and criminal history information.

Michigan Criminal Justice Information Network (MiCJIN): Provides a secure, single point of access to the range of law enforcement software applications utilized by state and local law enforcement agencies, including AFIS, SNAP, CODIS, LEIN, Department of State driver's license and state identification card images (MiDIRS), and firearms and sex offender registries.

Michigan Incident Crime Reporting (MICR): Processes and analyzes crime data and publishes crime statistics on violent and property offenses, hate crimes, domestic violence, and law enforcement officers killed and assaulted.

<u>Traffic Crash Reporting Section</u>: Compiles, processes, and evaluates traffic crash reports from state and local law enforcement agencies, manages and maintains a central database of traffic crash data, provides extensive data on fatal crashes to the federal government, trains officers on proper completion of crash reports, and collaborates with the Department of State to update driver records.

<u>Firearms Records</u>: Manages and maintains records relating to registered handguns and concealed pistol licenses (CPL) and serves as liaison to FBI regarding compliance with the Brady Act.

<u>Sex Offender Registry</u>: Manages and maintains the law enforcement and public databases providing information on registered sex offenders and assists in enforcing registration requirements.

<u>Public Information</u>: Coordinates and processes FOIA requests received by the department and oversees retention of CJIC records.

<u>Audit and Training</u>: Conducts compliance audits of all criminal justice agencies and others to ensure the security, integrity, and confidentiality of criminal justice information and coordinates CJIC division training.

Supports the staff and operations of the Forensic Science Division, which examines evidentiary materials collected and submitted by law enforcement agencies through specialized analyses under several technical disciplines (i.e., biology and DNA, toxicology, latent prints, firearms and tool marks, controlled substances, and trace evidence and questioned documents) performed in accredited laboratories located across the state, provides direct assistance and training to law enforcement agencies in the processing of crime scenes and collection of evidence, and contributes expert testimony in criminal court cases.

Office of Justice Program Grants: Distributes federal Byrne Justice Assistance Grant (JAG) program funds to state and local criminal justice agencies used for a variety of law enforcement purposes and administers the federal Residential Substance Abuse Treatment for State Prisoners (RSAT) Program, which assists states and local governments in developing and implementing residential substance abuse treatment programs in state and local correctional and detention facilities.

<u>Auto Theft Prevention Program</u>: Serves the Automobile Theft Prevention Authority (APTA) by assessing the scope of automobile theft in the state, analyzing various methods of combating automobile theft, and administering grants awarded by APTA to state and local units of government for automobile theft prevention-related activities.

<u>Community Service Troopers</u>: Supervises the activities of troopers assigned to posts across the state related to community outreach and education initiatives and partnerships.

Supports the staff and operations of the Training Division, which conducts periodic recruit schools, ongoing employee training, various specialized training programs (e.g., precision driving, fire investigation, firearms, explosives, canine, underwater recovery), the Michigan Youth Leadership Academy, and includes:

<u>Academy Services Section</u>: Provides administrative and financial services, manages residential and hospitality functions, and coordinates scheduling related to the Academy.

<u>Career Development Section</u>: Provides for the development and delivery of numerous supervisor and leadership programs.

<u>Trooper Development Section</u>: Provides for recruit and in-service training for the department's front-line and supervisory enforcement personnel.

<u>Chaplain Corps</u>: Provides spiritual services to MSP employees and their families and participate in formal and informal meetings and ceremonies.

<u>Traffic Services Section</u>: Provides statewide traffic-related programs and resources including traffic crash reconstruction, training, and statistics, alcohol enforcement training, speed measurement and in-car video equipment, traffic control orders, vehicle code analysis, public information campaigns, and the Precision Driving Facility.

<u>Recruiting and Selection Section</u>: Provides for the recruitment and selection of applicants for periodic recruit schools for troopers, motor carrier offices, and state property security officers conducted at the Academy.

<u>Criminal Justice Information Center Services</u> (Subtotal: \$14,388,500): Fees collected for various services, such as fingerprinting, criminal records checks, application and licensing of concealed pistol licenses, FOIA requests, and others.

State Services Fee Fund (Subtotal: \$7,708,200): Established by the Michigan Gaming Control and Revenue Act 1997 PA 69, MCL 432.212a. Supported by an annual assessment from the three Detroit Casinos and application fees, license fees, and fines and penalties paid by the casinos or their suppliers or employees.

<u>Auto Theft Prevention Fund</u> (Subtotal: \$7,674,100): Established by the Insurance Code Act 1956 PA 218, MCL 500.6107. Under the authority of the Auto Theft Prevention Authority, MCL 500.6103; supported by a \$1 per non-commercial vehicle assessment paid by annually by automobile insurers operating within the state.

Forensic Laboratory Fund (Subtotal: \$1,528,800): Established by the Forensic Laboratory Funding Act 1994 PA 35, MCL 12.203. Supported by third party gifts and grants as well as an annual distribution from the Justice System Fund equal to 5.35% fund balance, pursuant to 1961 PA 236 MCL 600.181.

<u>Drunk Driving Prevention and Training Fund</u> (Subtotal: \$1,452,300): Established by the Michigan Vehicle Code 1949 PA 300, MCL 257.625h. Supports the purchase and maintenance of breath-alcohol testing equipment and training to law enforcement officers in using the equipment. Funded through a \$125 license re-instatement fee paid to the Secretary of State, pursuant to MCL 257.320e.

Sex Offenders Registration Fund (Subtotal: \$390,600): Established by the Sex Offenders Registration Act 1994 PA 295, MCL 28.725b. Funded through the collection of \$30 from each registration. Supports training and maintenance regarding the law enforcement database, publically accessible website, and other requirements of the act.

Other State Restricted Revenue (Subtotal: \$1,941,500): Includes other revenue sources, such as reimbursement fees for forensic science services (\$1,393,400), motor carrier fees (\$128,900), MSP precision driving track fees (\$327,800), and traffic crash revenue (\$91,400).

#### **GENERAL SECTIONS**

#### Sec. 201. State Spending From State Resources and Payments to Local Units of Government

Specifies amount of state spending from state resources, and the amount to be paid to local units of government.

## Sec. 202. Applicability of Management and Budget Act

Subjects appropriations in the article to the Management and Budget Act, 1984 PA 431.

#### Sec. 203. Definitions

Defines various terms and acronyms appearing in the article.

#### Sec. 204. IDG Funding Received by the Department

Lists specific amounts and sources of interdepartmental grant funding received by the MSP.

#### Sec. 204a. IDG Funding Made Available to Other State Departments

Lists specific amounts and sources of interdepartmental grant funding made available by the MSP to other state departments and stipulates that the MSP shall provide \$1.5 million in federal Byrne grants to the state Judiciary.

#### Sec. 206. Contingency Funds

Permits appropriation of federal, state restricted, local, and private contingency funds up to specified amounts, subject to the legislative transfer process.

#### Sec. 207. Transparency Website

Requires the MSP, working with DTMB, to maintain a searchable website accessible by the public at no cost, which includes various appropriation, expenditure, procurement, and staffing information.

#### Sec. 208. Internet Reporting Requirements

Outlines requirements regarding use of the Internet to fulfill legislative reporting requirements.

#### Sec. 209. Buy American and Buy Michigan

Requires the MSP to purchase goods and services made in America, preferably in Michigan and preferably by veterans, if competitively priced at comparable quality.

#### Sec. 210. Deprived and Depressed Communities

Requires the MSP to reasonably ensure that businesses in "deprived and depressed" communities compete for and perform contracts for services and supplies.

#### Sec. 215. Communications with the Legislature

Prohibits the MSP from taking disciplinary action against an employee for communicating with a member of the Legislature or its staff.

#### Sec. 218. Out-of-State Travel Report

Requires the MSP to submit a report pertaining to out-of-state travel for state employees, including the dates of each travel occurrence and the related expenses and fund sourcing of each travel occurrence.

# Sec. 219. Quarterly Reporting on Achieving Requirements

Requires the MSP to provide quarterly reports on its performance against the metrics cited in the article, status of work projects, financial status, and summary of fund shifts.

#### Sec. 221. Department Core Services

Lists the core services of the MSP and requires appropriations to be expended for core services.

#### Sec. 222. Post Closure or Consolidation

Requires the MSP to notify subcommittees not less than 90 days before recommending closure or consolidation of any state police posts.

#### Sec. 223. Privatization Project Plans

Requires the submission of a project plan to the appropriations subcommittees and the fiscal agencies 90 days before beginning any effort to privatize.

## Sec. 224. Prohibits Purchase of Legal Services

Prohibits the purchase of legal services from third parties that are the responsibility of the Attorney General.

#### Sec. 226. Contractual Services Reimbursement

Requires that contractual services provided by the MSP be reimbursed for all costs incurred, including retirement and overtime costs, and that services provided to entities other than local units of government be provided on an overtime basis.

#### Sec. 228. General Fund/General Purpose Lapse Report

Requires the State Budget Office to submit an annual report providing estimates of GF/GP lapses for MSP programs.

#### Sec. 229. Restricted Funds Report

Requires the MSP to cooperate with the State Budget Office to submit a report to the Legislature pertaining to restricted fund revenues, expenditures, and balances for the previous two fiscal years.

#### Sec. 230. Department Scorecard Website

Requires the MSP to maintain a department scorecard website that identifies, updates, and tracks key metrics to monitor the department's performance.

#### Sec. 232. Michigan Public Safety Communications System

Requires the MSP to act as a liaison between DTMB and local public safety agencies for issues relating to the Michigan Public Safety Communications System.

#### Sec. 233. Annual Legacy Costs

Identifies annual pension-related and retiree health care legacy costs for the MSP.

#### Sec. 238. Authorization To Expend Private Donations

Appropriates money privately donated to the MSP for the purposes designated by the donor.

#### Sec. 241. Receive and Expend Authorization for Federal Revenues

Authorizes the department to expend federal revenues that are received in excess of what is appropriated by the Legislature in part 1. Requires the department to report to the subcommittees and fiscal agencies prior to expending excess federal revenues.

#### **EXECUTIVE DIRECTION AND DEPARTMENTAL SERVICES**

#### Sec. 301. Capitol and Secondary Complex Security

Requires the MSP to maintain adequate levels of staffing and resources for providing security services at the state Capitol Building and surrounding building; requires the MSP to pursue federal grants to improve security services; requires a minimum of 35,000 patrols at state owned and leased facilities.

#### LAW ENFORCEMENT SERVICES

#### Sec. 401. Training

Requires the MSP to maintain proper levels of staffing and resources perform its programmatic responsibilities; stipulates goal of average classroom occupancy of 55%; requires the MSP to submit reports pertaining to recruit schools admissions and graduations; requires the MSP to distribute and review course evaluations.

#### Sec. 402. Criminal Justice Information Center

Stipulates that unexpended revenues deposited into the CJIS Service Fees Fund shall carryforward and not lapse to the General Fund, and stipulates that unexpended revenue generated by local SRMS fees shall carryforward and not lapse to the General Fund; requires the department to:

- maintain criminal justice information systems in support of the public safety and law enforcement communities;
- conduct at least 30 outreach services to improve submission of criminal history information;
- complete and publish crime statistics;
- complete, evaluate, and disseminate traffic crash reports;
- maintain, disseminate, and exchange criminal history and juvenile records:
- maintain firearms licensure records; requires the MSP to submit a report pertaining to the revenues and expenditures to implement concealed pistol licensure;
- maintain the sex offender registry;
- and provide information of the number of background checks processed through ICHAT.

#### Sec. 403. Forensic Science

Requires the MSP to provide forensic testing services to aid in criminal investigations; requires MSP to maintain accreditation of laboratories; stipulates turnaround times for forensic science services; requires the MSP to provide data on turnaround times, staffing levels, and backlogged cases; stipulates goals for decreasing firearms and toxicology backlogs; requires the MSP to provide forensic testing and profiling of DNA evidence to aid in criminal investigations; requires the MSP to post changes to protocol for retain and purging DNA records; and stipulates goal for decreasing DNA analysis backlog.

#### Sec. 404. Biometrics and Identification

Requires the MSP to manage specified identification databases; requires the MSP to provide data on submission to the AFIS database and stipulates a goal for electronic submissions; requires the MSP to maintain staffing and resources to achieve an average 28-day wait time for polygraph examinations and stipulates a goal of an average 15-day wait time; requires the MSP to provide information on the number of fingerprint checks processed.

#### Sec. 405. Sexual Assault Kit Analysis

Requires the department to report to the subcommittees and the fiscal agencies the current number of sexual assault kits received and analyzed, as well as the remaining backlog.

#### Sec. 406. Community Service Programs

Requires the department to provide administrative support for operations of the auto theft prevention authority, the Edward Byrne memorial justice assistance program, statewide 9-1-1 operations, and other grants and community policing efforts.

#### **COMMISSION ON LAW ENFORCEMENT STANDARDS**

#### Sec. 501. Commission on Law Enforcement Standards

Requires MCOLES to maintain proper levels of staffing and resources to perform its programmatic responsibilities and update standards within 120 days of the enactment date of new, applicable legislation.

#### **FIELD SERVICES**

#### Sec. 601. General Law Enforcement and Traffic Safety

Stipulates that MSP troopers shall not be prohibited from responding to criminal or emergency situations and shall make every enforce to protect residents; requires the MSP to maintain staff and resources to enhance traffic safety and dedicate a minimum of 400,000 hours to statewide patrol, 40,000 within distressed cities and 4,000 within Belle Isle; requires the MSP to maintain a 93% compliance rate for reporting by register sex offenders; requires the MSP to submit a report pertaining to the Secure Cities Partnership.

#### Sec. 602. Criminal Investigations

Requires the MSP to identify and apprehend criminals through investigations; requires the MSP to maintain a specified number of investigation hours; requires the MSP to meet or exceed case clearance rate of 62%; requires the MSP to provide four training opportunities to local law enforcement partners related to gambling or opioids; and requires the department increase opioid-related investigations by 20% and work toward enhancing drug-interdiction efforts.

#### Sec. 603. Tobacco Tax Fraud Investigations

Requires the MSP to provide prevention and suppression of organized untaxed tobacco smuggling; submit a report pertaining to tobacco tax enforcement activities and expenditures; requires the MSP to dedicate a minimum of 16,600 hour to tobacco tax enforcement.

#### Sec. 604. Fire Investigations

Requires the MSP to provide fire investigation training and assistance; requires the MSP to maintain readiness to a specified number of request for fire investigation services.

# SPECIALIZED SERVICES

#### Sec. 701. Special Operations

Requires the MSP to provide specialized law enforcement services; requires the MSP to operate the Michigan Intelligence Operations Center for Homeland Security (MIOC); requires the MIOC to provide timely and accurate information and increase public awareness on how to report suspicion activity; requires the MSP to maintain readiness to respond to a specified number of requests for specialty services; requires the MSP to support the Cyber Section.

#### Sec. 702. Commercial Vehicle Regulation and Enforcement

Requires the MSP to maintain commercial vehicle and enforcement activities; requires the MSP to meet inspection goals consistent with the federal motor carrier safety assistance program; requires the MSP to inspect school buses; and stipulates that revenues collected under the motor carrier act do not lapse at the end of a fiscal year.

#### Sec. 703. Emergency Management and Homeland Security

Requires the MSP to coordinate emergency response activates of governmental units and:

- authorizes the MSP to expend appropriated funds to call upon state agencies or departments to protect life
  or property or to protect the health or safety of any area under a state of emergency or disaster and report to
  the State Budget Director and submit recommendations to the Legislature for supplemental appropriation;
- authorizes the MSP to expend additional funds from various sources to provide emergency management training or emergency response activities and notify the Legislature;
- requires the MSP to maintain partnerships to protect the state from all hazards;
- requires the MSP to serve local emergency management preparedness programs and local emergency planning committees, operate and maintain the State Emergency Operations Center, respond to civil disorders and natural disasters at a specified level, and perform hazardous materials response training;
- requires the MSP to conduct a minimum of three training sessions to enhance emergency response;
- appropriates amounts necessary from the Disaster and Emergency Contingency Fund to cover costs related
  to disasters and emergencies upon approval of the State Budget Director notification of the Legislature and
  requires the MSP to submit a report related to expenditures from the Fund;
- and allows the department to expend funds from any line item in order to respond to an emergency and requires detailed reporting when funds are expended from the Disaster and Emergency Contingency Fund.

#### Sec. 704. Highway Safety Planning

Requires the MSP to provide highway safety traffic safety programs in partnership with other public and private organizations.

## SECONDARY ROAD PATROL PROGRAM

#### Sec. 801. Secondary Road Patrol Program

Requires the MSP to provide funding to county sheriff departments to patrol secondary roads; stipulates sheriffs' duties under the Secondary Road Patrol program; requires the MSP to provide quarterly information related to secondary road patrol activities and submit reports at least semiannually; requires the MSP to request budgetary information from counties receiving grants for secondary road patrol activities.

#### **ONE-TIME APPROPRIATIONS**

#### Sec. 901. School Safety Initiative

Stipulates that the department will administer a competitive grant to award \$2.0 million to K-12 schools for security improvements, technology and equipment, or security consultations.

#### Sec. 902. Sexual Assault Prevention and Education Initiative

Stipulates that the department will administer a competitive grant to award \$500,000 to colleges and universities in this state in order to mitigate sexual assault on and off campus.

#### Sec. 903. Advanced 9-1-1

Requires the department to administer and oversee the initial implementation of a statewide advanced 9-1-1 system that utilized voluntarily-provided data to support and enhance responses to emergencies.

#### **FY 2016-17 GENERAL SECTIONS**

#### Sec. 1201. FY 2017-18 Appropriation

States intent that FY 2017-18 appropriations are anticipated to be the same as FY 2016-17 appropriations, except for adjustments for changes in caseloads, federal match rates, economic factors, and available revenue.
