



Infrastructure Funding to Communities

- Community Grant Assistance - \$48 million
- High Water Infrastructure Grants – \$34.3 million
- Infrastructure Investment Jobs Act - \$268 million
 - Energy - \$23 million
 - Orphan Wells - \$31 million
 - Water Infrastructure - \$214 million

Budget Allows for Quicker Action

Boilerplate Section 315 – Court Ordered Settlements

- Allows for quicker cleanup of contaminated sites
- Appropriates funds equal to court orders

Partnerships

- Home Repair and Plumbing Assistance - DHHS
 - \$40 million
- Transportation Infrastructure Resiliency - MDOT
 - \$66 million
- Electric Vehicle Rebates - Treasury
 - \$50 million
