

MCAN uses the term "college" to refer to the attainment of valuable postsecondary credentials beyond high school, including professional/technical certificates and academic degrees.



Postsecondary education is a prerequisite to success in a knowledge-based economy. Everyone must pursue and complete a postsecondary credential or degree beyond high school.







Our Goal

Increase the percentage of Michigan residents with degrees or postsecondary certificates to 60 percent by 2025.





Meeting Labor Market Needs


By the year 2020, 70% of the new jobs in Michigan will require formal postsecondary education.


Percentage of Adults (ages 25-64) with a Two- or Four-Year Degree by OECD Country







Percentage of U.S. Adults (ages 25-64) with a Two- or Four-Year Degree including estimated percentage of state residents who have








Level of education for Michigan residents, ages 25-64





What is an LCAN?

- Community-based coordinating body for college access strategy
- Committed to increasing college readiness, enrollment, and completion
- Highly structured collaborative effort, as opposed to isolated efforts of individual organizations
- Supported by an alliance of cross-sector leaders representing K-12, higher ed, nonprofit sector, government, business, and philanthropy

- Strengthen existing like-minded and missionaligned college access and success initiatives
- Share best practices amongst network

Reaching for Opportunity Report

- Reaching for Opportunity: An Action Plan to Increase Michigan's Postsecondary Credential Attainment, was published Dec. 1, 2015.
- The report outlines Goal 2025 for Michiganders, and presents challenges, opportunities, and recommendations for action and policy to increase credential attainment and grow Michigan's economy.





- Embeds well-trained, dedicated, near-peer college advisers in high schools
- Launched in 2015
- 56 advisers serving 70 high schools
- Intensive five-week training
