# GLOSSARY

## Frequently-Used State Budget Terms

**Adjusted Gross**

Total net amount of all line item gross appropriations less (or minus) interdepartmental grants (IDGs) and intradepartmental transfers (IDTs)

**Boilerplate**

Specific language sections contained in an appropriations act which direct, limit or restrict line item expenditures, and/or require reports

**Budget Stabilization Fund (BSF)**

The countercyclical economic and budget stabilization fund—also known as the "rainy day" fund

**Federal Revenues**

Federal grant or matchable revenues dedicated to specific programs

**General Fund/General Purpose (GF/GP)**

The state's primary operating fund; the portion of the state's General Fund that does not include restricted revenues

**Gross Appropriations (Gross)**

The total of all applicable line item spending authorizations

**Interdepartmental Grant (IDG)**

Revenue or funds received by one state department from another state department (usually for a service the receiving department provides)

**Intradepartmental Transfer (IDT)**

Transfers or funds being provided from one appropriation unit to another in the same department

**Lapses**

Unspent/unobligated funds remaining in line item accounts at the end of the fiscal year

**Line Items**

Specific funding amount in an appropriations bill which establishes spending authorization for a particular program or function (may be for a single purpose or for multiple purposes)

**Local Revenue**

Revenues from local units of government

**State Restricted (Restricted Funds)**

State revenue dedicated to a specific fund; revenue which results from state mandates or initiatives; used for used for specific programs pursuant to the Constitution or statute

**Private Funds**

Revenues from non-government entities such as rents, royalties or interest payments, payments from hospitals, payments from individuals, and gifts and bequests

**School Aid Fund (SAF)**

The primary funding source for K-12 schools and Intermediate School Districts (ISDs)

**Work Project**

An account established to allow for certain specific unspent funds to be carried over from one fiscal year to a succeeding fiscal year or years



## DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE

*A five-member Commission of Agriculture heads the Department and is appointed by the Governor with the consent of the Senate. Commission members are appointed for terms of four years. The Commission appoints a director to serve as chief administrative officer of the Department.*

*The Department of Agriculture promotes agricultural interests of the state and develops safeguards to protect the public from disease and unsanitary conditions in connection with food production and food handling, product labeling, dairy products, animals, and plants. The Department's responsibilities in the field of consumer protection include enforcement of laws relating to food, standard weights and measures, farm produce storage, and dairy products; inspection and enforcement of animal health; control of plant pests and diseases; and inspection of beans and perishable fruits and vegetables. Department is also charged with regulating Michigan's pari-mutuel horse racing industry through the Office of the Racing Commissioner, a type I agency located in the Department.*

*The Department's mission is: "To serve, promote and protect the agricultural interests of the people of the State of Michigan." Department responsibilities include ensuring that consumers receive safe and wholesome food and agricultural products; protecting the public, the food supply, and the environment from toxic substance contamination; and protecting and enhancing the land and water resource base. Department also promotes the development of food- and agriculture-based businesses and markets, and is charged with regulating the pari-mutuel horse racing industry.*

*In its dual role as regulator and marketer, the Department provides Michigan citizens with quality services and information by working cooperatively with many agencies and organizations including: United States Department of Agriculture; U.S. Environmental Protection Agency; Food and Drug Administration; the Michigan Departments of Community Health, Natural Resources, and Consumer and Industry Services; Michigan Jobs Commission; Michigan State University Colleges of Agriculture and Natural Resources and Veterinary Medicine and Extension; the food and agriculture industry; and private businesses.*

*This appropriation unit provides funding for a variety of food safety programs administered by the Department. Funding is also included for grants to local health departments for food safety inspection activities.*

Enforces laws and regulations through inspection and compliance monitoring activities that govern processing, packaging, transportation, storage and sale of food and beverages.</p> <p><u>Food Service Sanitation</u>: Oversees sanitation inspections of food service operations by 43 local health departments. Through this program, the state provides training and technical assistance to local governments on key food safety issues. Working cooperatively with the Food Product Safety Assurance Program, the Food Service Sanitation Program tracks food-borne disease reports from across the state and provides investigative assistance.</p> <p><u>Dairy</u>: Ensures that consumers have the safest and most wholesome milk supply available in the world. By inspecting Michigan's 3,500 Grade A and 398 manufacturing grade milk-producing farms on a regular basis, the Dairy Section ensures that all fluid milk for bottling in the state meets stringent standards. In addition, cheese factories, butter plants, and ice cream facilities are checked for sanitation. Over 6,000 samples of dairy products are analyzed each year at the Department's laboratory to assure that standards are met. 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## SECTION 105: ANIMAL INDUSTRY

*This appropriation unit provides funding for preservation of the health of domestic animals, livestock, and pets. This unit also assures the humane treatment of animals and provides diagnostic services for those needing assistance due to animal health problems.*

Diseases threatening Michigan livestock include pseudorabies, eastern equine encephalitis, equine infectious anemia, tuberculosis, rabies, and various toxicities.</p> <p><u>State Veterinarian</u>: Responsible for overall livestock and poultry disease programs and toxic substance contamination concerns as they relate to animal health. Division works on eradication of animal diseases, which helps provide for import and export of healthy livestock. These provisions have a significant impact on human health and welfare through the protection of the food supply. Division is responsible for monitoring livestock in areas where bovine tuberculosis has been found in the deer population. This ongoing effort is coordinated with the Michigan Departments of Natural Resources and Community Health.</p> <p><u>Animal Industry Division</u>: Participates in an industry/state/federal pseudorabies eradication program for swine as well as the Market Cattle Identification Program which tests cattle after slaughter. ## SECTION 106: PESTICIDE AND PLANT PEST MANAGEMENT

*This appropriation unit provides funding for enforcement of laws dealing with pesticide registration, use, and application certification and testing. In addition, this unit develops strategies to monitor and control pests that are harmful to the state's horticulture and timber industry.*

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Pesticide and plant pest management - 132.3 FTE positions	12,924,100	<p>Funding for the following programs:</p> <p><u>Pesticides</u>: Focuses on pesticide applicator certification, pesticide enforcement, and pesticide registration components to ensure that pesticide storage, distribution, usage, and disposal will not result in adverse effects on human health and the environment.</p> <p><u>Plant Industry</u>: Ensures that agricultural commodities are free of insect pests and disease, and provides consumer protection for agricultural products and inspection and grading of fresh fruit and vegetable products. Examples of such programs include apiary inspections and agricultural products inspection.</p> <p><u>Plant Pest</u>: Charged with regulatory responsibility to prevent introduction and dissemination of serious insects and diseases which are injurious to nursery stock, plants, and plant products; and to facilitate exportation and importation of nursery stock, plants, plant products, and agricultural commodities to and from other states or countries. A major program in this area aims to minimize the spread of gypsy moth infestation on nursery stock, to slow the spread in forested areas, and reduce the annoyance from gypsy moths to people living in infested areas in Michigan.</p> <p><u>Fruit and Vegetable Inspection</u>: Provides verification of fruit and vegetable quality through inspection and grading services based on government standards and processor specifications.</p> <p><u>Agricultural Products</u>: Strives to prevent animal feed contaminations that are a direct threat to human health and to provide purchasers of feeds, seeds, fertilizers, liming materials, and livestock and poultry remedies with protections from false label claims.</p> <p><u>Disease and Pest Intervention Fund</u>: Responds to exotic or regulatory pests on a priority basis; prior to FY 2002-03, appropriated as a separate line item.</p>

## SECTION 107: ENVIRONMENTAL STEWARDSHIP

*This appropriation unit provides funding for programs that provide assistance to soil and water conservation districts, local governments, drain commissioners, and land users in the conservation and development of the state's soil and water resources. Programs encourage the installation and management of sustainable resource protection practices at the local level.*

Full-time equated classified positions

55.0 FTE positions in the classified service of the state.

Environmental stewardship - 38.0 FTE positions

3,281,000 Funds the Environmental Stewardship Division which provides assistance to soil and water conservation districts, local governments, drain commissioners, and land users in the conservation and development of Michigan's soil and water resources. Division administration of programs which encourage installation and management of sustainable resource protection practices at the local level include:

Michigan Groundwater Stewardship: Protects groundwater resources through voluntary, locally-driven initiatives that address the concerns of individuals and maintain a focus on realistic solutions and financial and technical constraints which drive real-world decisions.

Michigan Clean Sweep: Develops a system for the legal, safe disposal of old, unwanted, suspended, or canceled pesticides. By providing for proper disposal, the Department and the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency reduce the potential for adverse environmental impacts.

Pesticide Container Recycling: Establishes an opportunity for pesticide users to bring clean, empty containers to preselected sites for grinding and recycling into a variety of products. This reduces the potential for adverse environmental impacts and saves valuable space in sanitary landfills.

Right to Farm: Investigates and responds to agricultural pollution complaints, including complaints regarding pesticide applications and land application of certain by-products. Program is conducted cooperatively with the Pesticide and Plant Pest Management Division.

Intercounty Drain Program: Staff represent the Department as chairpersons of all intercounty drainage boards, as provided by the Drain Code. Program is responsible for providing expertise to county drain commissioners, engineers, financial consultants, and attorneys on all intercounty drain issues.

Drinking Water Monitoring: Supports drinking water monitoring activities at migrant labor housing facilities.

*This appropriation unit provides funding for analytical, diagnostic, and technical laboratory services to consumers, industry, and government agencies.*

Laboratory analysis program - 73.5 FTE positions	6,321,500	<p>Provides analytical, diagnostic, and technical services for protecting consumers from food-borne illnesses, toxic substances contamination, and economic deception. Promotes agricultural products and markets through testing and certification services, and provides scientific and technical data necessary to the functioning of consumer protection and regulatory programs of the Department and other state and federal agencies.</p> <p><u>Animal Disease Surveillance</u>: Analyzes animal blood for any Michigan animal owner required to meet state and federal statutes to assure disease-free movement of animals within the state as well as the movement of animals to other countries.</p> <p><u>Equine Drug Testing</u>: Provides analytical, diagnostic, and technical services to the Office of Racing Commissioner and the Fairs and Racing Section of the Finance and Technology Division to ensure that horses competing at licensed tracks and fairs are doing so without the use of illegal drugs.</p> <p><u>Feed and Fertilizer</u>: Works closely with the Pesticide and Plant Pest Management Division to ensure that all products meet label guarantees.</p> <p><u>Food, Dairy, and Beverage</u>: Ensures the safety and quality of products offered by the food industry. Emergency Services: Protects the state's food and agriculture resources in times of emergencies such as hazardous materials spills, natural disasters, or other types of emergencies or disasters. Coordinates the Michigan Commission of Agriculture meetings and the Agricultural Marketing and Bargaining Board, which receives updates of the asparagus and processing apples accreditations which certify grower associations to bargain on behalf of their members with over 100 processors and handlers of perishable commodities. Coordination of freedom of information requests resides in this section.

Requires the Department to submit a project plan 60 days before beginning any effort to privatize and requires an evaluation of any privatization effort be submitted to the Legislature within 30 months.

**Sec. 208. Internet Reporting**

Requires the Department to pilot a program that places all reports on the internet.

**Sec. 209. Buy American**

Prohibits the purchase of foreign goods and services when competitively priced American goods and services are available.

**Sec. 210. Depressed Communities**

States that the director shall ensure that businesses in depressed communities contract and subcontract with the Department and its vendors.

**Sec. 211. Revenue Carry-Forward**

States that an unobligated balance or excess revenue in any state restricted fund shall not lapse to the general fund.

**Sec. 212. Bovine TB Indemnification Payments**

Authorizes the Department to provide for indemnity; limits indemnification orders to \$100,000.00; and requires a report for the reason for, amount of, and person to whom the indemnification is to be paid. Authorizes the Department to indemnify for livestock that are killed by wolves or coyotes and to expend funds received from the Department of Natural Resources for the indemnification payments made pursuant to this section and requires current rate paid to those farmers prior to October 31, 2000.

**Sec. 213. Transfers and Supplementals**

States that the Department will provide the fiscal agencies with transfer or supplemental information when submitted to DMB.

**Sec. 214. Grants Reporting**

Requires a ten-day notice to the House and Senate Appropriations Subcommittees on Agriculture when a grant is made from any line item other than a grant line item.

**Sec. 215. Simulcast Revenue**

States the Legislature's intent not to fund non-fair and non-horse racing programs in FY 2000-01.

**Sec. 216. Agriculture Equine Industry Development Fund**

Appropriates revenue to the Michigan agriculture equine industry development fund according to the horse racing law of 1995.

**Sec. 219. Information Technology**

Requires the Department to pay user fees to the Department of Information Technology.

**Sec. 220. Information Technology Work Projects**

Authorizes carry forward of funds for technology projects.

**Sec. 224. Early Retirement and Budgetary Savings**

Establishes criteria for early retirement savings and budgetary savings.

**Sec. 225. Cigarette Tax Contingency Grants**

Appropriates grants contingent on passage of the legislation raising the tax on cigarettes.

**Sec. 301. Commission and Boards**

Sets the per diem rates for commissions and boards.

**Sec. 302. Miscellaneous Expenditures**

Allows the Department to receive and expend revenue necessary to cover expenses related to publications, audits, sales, inspections, and other Department functions.

**Sec. 303. Surveys**

Requires that \$90,000 of the appropriation for statistical reporting service be used for an ongoing rotational crop survey of fruits, vegetables, and nursery stock.

**Sec. 401. Restaurant Inspection and Licensing**

Requires the Department to monitor restaurant inspection and licensing activities conducted by locals and to report to the Legislature.

**Sec. 402. Food Safety**

Requires Department to produce reports on food-borne outbreaks and emergencies related to food safety.

**Sec. 403. Local Programs**

Requires that local units of government obtain permission from the Department prior to any moving or reallocation of program funds appropriated in section 104.

**Sec. 450. Bovine Tuberculosis (TB)**

Requires the Department to reimburse the Department of Natural Resources for mutually-agreed-to bovine tuberculosis costs.

**Sec. 451. Bovine Tuberculosis – Split State Status**

Requires the Department to pay for all whole herd testing costs to achieve and maintain split-state status.

**Sec. 501. Pesticide Personnel**

Allows up to \$100,000 from pesticide and plant pest management to be used to train pesticide applicators.

**Sec. 503. Gypsy Moth**

Authorizes the Department to enter into an agreement with a nonprofit organization associated with the Gypsy Moth Slow-the-Spread Program.

**Sec. 601. Energy Conservation**

Requires the Department to distribute energy conservation program funds based on statewide energy conservation criteria.

**Sec. 602. Migrant Labor Housing**

Provides for migrant labor housing grants and states that such grants shall not exceed \$5,000 per unit.

**Sec. 603. Migrant Labor Housing**

Requires the Department to apply for any available federal funds to support the migrant labor housing program.

**Sec. 604. Local Soil Conservation Districts**

Allocates appropriations for local conservation districts.

**Sec. 605. Open Space Development Payments - VETOED**

Requires Department to use open space development rights easement payments only to reimburse local units of government for lost revenues associated with open space development rights easements.

**Sec. 701. Grape and Wine Industry Council**

Appropriates \$603,000 for the Grape and Wine Industry Council for the purpose of making grants.

**Sec. 702. Food Bank**

Allows the Food Bank Council to expend unused funds for direct food purchase.

**Sec. 704. Future Farmers of America**

Prohibits indirect costs from being charged against the future farmers of America grant.

**Sec. 705. Export Market**

Directs \$100,000 for state participation in export marketing programs offered by the federal government.

**Sec. 707. Agriculture Development Fund**

Provides for receipt of revenue for expenditure in the Agriculture Development Fund.

**Sec. 801. State Simulcasting Tax Revenue Report**

Requires the Department to submit a monthly report on state simulcasting tax revenues and license fees.

**Sec. 802. Horse Race Purses and Supplements**

Outlines the segregation of the purses and supplements-licensed tracks appropriation; also outlines the division of the light horse racing appropriation.

**Sec. 803. Thoroughbred Program**

Allocates \$30,500 of the thoroughbred program line item appropriation to the Michigan United Thoroughbred Breeders and Owners Association to conduct a thoroughbred yearling show.

**Sec. 804. Thoroughbred Owners Awards**

Requires the Department to develop a program to provide for thoroughbred owners' awards.

**Sec. 805. Agriculture Equine Fund Reduction Report**

Requires the Department to notify the Legislature ten days prior to reductions in appropriations, allocations, or expenditures from the agriculture equine industry development fund.

**Sec. 806. Fairs**

Requires fairs to publish rules and guidelines for exhibits eligible for state premiums; and establishes grievance procedures.

**Sec. 807. Purse Supplements**

Provides for overnight purse supplements.

**Sec. 808. Horse Show**

Allocates \$11,400 of the premiums line for a grant to the Michigan Horse Show Association's Fall Youth Show.

**Sec. 809. Youth in Agriculture**

Allocates \$120,000 from the premiums line for a grant to promote youth involvement in the animal agriculture industry and establishes guidelines for eligibility to receive grants.

**Sec. 811. Outstanding Unclaimed Tickets**

Prohibits the use of funds for distribution of outstanding winning tickets until they are deposited in the agriculture equine industry development fund.

**Sec. 812. Leasing and Grants**

Declares that individuals leasing land, buildings, or other property are not eligible for state subsidy relating to their leased items.

**Sec. 813. Estimates of Agriculture Equine Fund**

Requires the Department, HFA, SFA and DMB to estimate unreserved and unencumbered closing balance of the fund for FY 2002-03.

**Sec. 815. Building and Track Improvement**

Allocates and establishes \$50,000 to licensed race meet operators for promotions, capital improvements, or operations at race meets which are conducted on facilities leased from county fairs.

**Sec. 816. Promotion of Fairs and Festivals - VETOED**

Directs appropriation to be used for statewide volunteer staff education and promotion of commodities.

**Sec. 901. Criminal Activity Information Rewards**

Allows the racing commissioner to pay rewards up to \$5,800 to individuals who provide information on criminal activity involving the horse racing industry.
