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#### **GLOSSARY**

#### **APPROPRIATIONS AND FUND SOURCES**

#### **Appropriation**

Authority to expend funds. An appropriation is not a mandate to spend. Constitutionally, state funds cannot be expended without an appropriation by the Legislature.

#### **Gross Appropriations**

Total spending authority from all revenue sources.

#### Interdepartmental Grant (IDG) Revenue

Funds received by one state department from another state department—usually for service(s) provided.

#### **Adjusted Gross Appropriations**

Gross appropriations excluding IDGs; avoids double counting when adding appropriation amounts across budget areas.

#### **Federal Revenue**

Federal grant or match revenue; generally dedicated to specific programs or purposes.

#### **Local Revenue**

Revenue received from local units of government for state services.

#### **Private Revenue**

Revenue from individuals and private entities, including payments for services, grants, and other contributions.

#### State Restricted Revenue

State revenue restricted by the State Constitution, state statute, or outside restriction that is available only for specified purposes; includes most fee revenue.

#### General Fund/General Purpose (GF/GP) Revenue

Unrestricted general fund revenue available to fund basic state programs and other purposes determined by the Legislature.

#### **MAJOR STATE FUNDS**

#### **General Fund**

The state's primary operating fund; receives state revenue not dedicated to another state fund.

#### School Aid Fund (SAF)

A restricted fund that serves as the primary state funding source for K-12 schools and Intermediate School Districts. Constitutionally, SAF revenue may also be used for postsecondary education.

#### **Budget Stabilization Fund**

The Countercyclical Economic and Budget Stabilization Fund (also known as the "rainy day fund"); the Management and Budget Act provides guidelines for making deposits into and withdrawals from the fund.

#### STATE BUDGET TERMS

#### Fiscal Year

The state's fiscal year (FY) runs from October to September. FY 2016-17 is October 1, 2016 through September 30, 2017.

#### Line Item

Specific appropriation amount in a budget bill which establishes spending authorization for a particular program or function.

#### **Boilerplate**

Specific language sections in an appropriation bill which direct, limit, or restrict line-item expenditures, express legislative intent, and/or require reports.

## Lapse

Appropriated amounts that are unspent or unobligated at the end of a fiscal year. Appropriations are automatically terminated at the end of a fiscal year unless designated as a work project. Lapsed funds are available for expenditure in the subsequent fiscal year.

## **Work Project**

Account authorized through statutory process which allows appropriated spending authorization from one fiscal year to be utilized for expenditures in a succeeding fiscal year or years for a specific project or purpose.

### **SECTION 103: OFFICE OF THE GREAT LAKES**

The Office of the Great Lakes was created by the Great Lakes Protection Act in 1985 to be the lead state agency for the development of governmental policies, programs, and procedures that will protect, enhance, and guide the management of the Great Lakes. The Office serves as the chief information source on issues that involve or affect the Great Lakes, and also administers the Areas of Concern Program, the Coastal Zone Management Project, and the Coastal Management Grants Program.

#### **SECTION 104: GREAT LAKES RESTORATION INITIATIVE**

The Great Lakes Restoration Initiative (GLRI) is a federal competitive funding program administered by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to protect and clean up the Great Lakes through restoration efforts, invasive species control, nonpoint source pollution mitigation, and contaminated sediment programs. The GLRI is administered by the EPA and awards competitive grants in the Great Lakes region and coordinates state, tribal, local, and industry actions to protect, maintain, and restore the chemical, biological, and physical integrity of the Great Lakes.

# **SECTION 106: OFFICE OF ENVIRONMENTAL ASSISTANCE**

The Office of Environmental Assistance provides funding for publications, education programs, outreach, and pollution protection and environmental assistance to businesses, municipalities, and the public. The Office also administers the Pollution Prevention Local Grants program.

#### **SECTION 107: WATER RESOURCE DIVISION**

The Water Resource Division protects and enhances the water quality of the state's surface waters, establishes water quality standards, assesses water quality, provides regulatory oversight for all public water supplies, issues permits to regulate the discharge of industrial and municipal waste waters, inspects wastewater treatment facilities, monitors and permits large scale groundwater withdrawals, monitors compliance with state and federal laws, and protects coastal areas and habitats. The division also administers grant programs that provide protection and remediation funding for water sources.

The Resource Management Division is responsible for the regulation and disposal of hazardous and non-hazardous solid and liquid wastes, scrap tires, radioactive materials, and for the land application of processed solid waste. In addition, the division oversees several programs which establish water quality standards and assess water quality, as well as providing oversight and technical consultants for local water supply inspection programs. Allows unexpended funds appropriated for the underground storage tank cleanup program to be considered work project appropriations and carried forward into the succeeding fiscal year. The program will perform contaminated site cleanups estimated to cost \$20 million with a tentative completion date of September 30, 2021.

#### **ONE-TIME BASIS ONLY APPROPRIATIONS**

#### Sec. 801. Flint Declaration of Emergency

Allows the funds appropriated for the Flint declaration of emergency to be expended to keep Flint on the Detroit water system, to cover staff, lab and testing costs, and to cover contract costs.

#### Sec. 803. Flint Supplemental Funding Report

Requires a report on the use of the supplemental funds appropriated in FY 2015-16 for the Flint declaration of emergency.
