FAMILY PLANNING AND PREGNANCY PREVENTION

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Summary

The state allocates funds to assist women and expectant mothers with family planning and pregnancy prevention services. This fiscal snapshot provides a brief summary of funding sources and expenditure history.

Family Planning and Pregnancy Prevention Funding Sources


The state appropriated a combined gross of \$10.1 million for family planning and pregnancy prevention services in [2022 PA 166](#). The funds are from federal, state restricted, and general fund/general purpose (GF/GP) sources.

Approximately 90% of funds appropriated come from two federal funds. **Title X** are federal funds that can be used for family planning, contraceptive services, sexually transmitted disease education, and other reproductive services. Funds cannot be used to fund abortion services, but can be used for information regarding termination upon request. Most of the federal funding for the state’s family planning and pregnancy prevention programs comes from Title X. **Title V Maternal and Child Health Services Block Grant** funds are also used, in part, for family planning services, and to remove other barriers of access to health care services.

The **Healthy Michigan Fund** is a state restricted fund established in 1996 that receives funding from 6% of taxes on tobacco products. The funds primarily target areas within public health and Medicaid. The allocation of Healthy Michigan funds for family planning and pregnancy prevention services decreased and eventually ended after FY 2010-11. During FY 2019-20, a portion of the Healthy Michigan funds were redesignated for family planning and pregnancy prevention services.

Family Planning and Pregnancy Expenditure History

Expenditures have been steadily declining by nearly \$5.8 million gross since FY 2005-06. However, there was a slight increase in FY 2019-20 because of the additional Healthy Michigan funds.
