

Jury Management Saves \$4 Million



- Rate of jurors responding rose 3.6 percent.
- Rate of jurors qualified & able to serve rose 5.2 percent.
- Trial courts summoned 20 percent fewer jurors.
- Nearly 5,000 fewer people had to report for jury duty, saving \$4 million in lost wages/productivity.






Treatment Courts Solve Problems, Save Lives



- As of January 1, 2019, there were 188 problemsolving courts statewide, including:
- · 128 drug treatment/DWI sobriety courts
 - 58 hybrid drug treatment/DWI sobriety courts
 - · 31 DWI sobrlety courts
 - · 9 adult and 13 juvenile drug treatment courts
 - 8 family dependency courts
 - 9 tribal drug treatment/DWI sobriety courts)
 - 1 adult and 1 family dependency court in planning stages
- 33 mental health courts (27 adult + 6 juvenile)
 - 2 adult mental health courts are in planning
- 27 veterans treatment courts



■ Drug Court Graduates ■ Comparison Members






SCAO Responsibilities



- Friend of the Court Bureau assists judges and staff who work with 750,000 families involved in custody, parenting, and child support.
- Michigan Judicial Institute provides critical training to judges and court staff to stay current with legislation and court rules. Most recently provided training on "civil treatment" for leaders to make sure all personnel are treated with dignity and respect.
- <u>Statistical Research Division</u> collects and analyzes data to assist in court administration and also oversees the Judicial Data Warehouse.




2018 Public Satisfaction Survey results:



- <u>84 percent</u> agreed or strongly agreed that <u>the way their case</u> was handled was fair. 10 percent were neutral. 6 percent disagreed.
- <u>86 percent</u> either agreed or strongly agreed that they were <u>able</u> to get their business done in a reasonable amount of time.
 8 percent were neutral, and 6 percent disagreed.
- <u>90 percent</u> said the judge/magistrate/referee <u>treated everyone</u> with courtesy and respect. On this question, 6 percent were neutral, and 4 percent disagreed.







Total Savings Since 2011







Preventing Hacks and Protecting Personal Information

- "One Court of Justice" website must be protected from hackers
 - o 9.5 million users in 2018 accessed case information, court forms, legal self-help tools, and other important data
 - Last updated in 2012
- Hackers must be prevented from accessing personal information about judges and court staff
- · Website lags in user experience
 - o Site navigation is complex and load times are slow
 - o Information difficult to find

Cybersecurity – Proposal and Results



PROPOSAL – Implement same security enhancements as Michigan.gov


- \$1.475 million one-time funding to:
 - Redesign and update courts.mi.gov
 - Purchase and deploy content management software
 - Replace customer relationship software
- \$454,100 ongoing funding to:
 - Provide for cloud-hosting and software licenses
 - Fund 2 FTE positions (web developer & content manager)

RESULTS

- ✓ Website secure from threats, protecting integrity of judicial data, and maintaining public access
- Public and court staff can find information more quickly and easily
- ✓ Mobile enhancements increase public access
- ✓ Virtually zero downtime for updates and upgrades



Pretrial Reform – Increasing Safety, Saving Money · Expensive, overcrowded local jails filled with nonviolent defendants held only because they can't pay money ball. · More than half of Michigan jail inmates are held pretrial. 30% · Nationwide, cost to detain pretrial defendants is nearly \$75 a day, costing taxpayers \$14 billion. · Nonviolent offenders take up jail space that could have been used to hold violent or high-risk offenders who are under sentence. 63% Detaining nonviolent defendants reduces public safety by increasing recidivism. Detention of nonviolent offenders puts them at risk of losing jobs, housing, and child care, and increases the burden on taxpayers. Nonviolent crimes, with an order to appear in court • 93 percent of Americans support pretrial release for nonviolent or misdemeanor offenses (Pew, 2018). Pretrial Reform - Proposal and Results



PROPOSAL – Continue improving pretrial practices

- \$325,700 in ongoing funding to:
 - Improve pretrial risk assessments
 - o Collect, analyze, and interpret court data
 - Conduct training on best practices and constitutional compliance
 - Establish pretrial metrics and performance measures
 - Improve resources such as text message reminders and automated pretrial risk assessments

- ✓ Enhanced public safety
- ✓ Jail costs reduced
- ✓ Rights of defendants better protected
- ✓ Stronger families and communities

Online Dispute Resolution



- Traditional court processes can be costly and inconvenient
 - At least one party is self-represented in 76 percent of civil cases
 - Average billing rate in Michigan is \$250/hour, making legal representation difficult for people filing or responding to claims, including domestic relations and evictions
 - In-person court appearances require participants to miss work and arrange child care
 - Mediation in small claims results in much higher payment rates





Online Dispute Resolution – Proposal and Results



PROPOSAL - Expand availability and scope of online dispute resolution

- \$450,000 in ongoing funding to:
 - Expand availability of online dispute resolution for small claims and landlord/tenant cases statewide
 - Pilot online dispute resolution to resolve certain domestic relations cases, prevent evictions, and resolve youth-related issues
 - Collect and analyze ODR data to improve services

RESULTS

- ✓ Increase access to efficient and cost effective dispute resolution statewide
- ✓ Reduce case disposition time
- ✓ Increase affordability of resolving a dispute
- ✓ Decrease rental evictions
- ✓ Increase collectability of judgments
- ✓ Reduce number of youth in criminal justice system
