## Investing in Michigan's Safety

The Next Century of Policing in Michigan

FY 18 BUDGET INVESTMENTS

### Trooper Recruit Schools \$9.2m (\$6.2m one-time)

The MSP's mission cannot be accomplished without its enlisted members. As the public safety net for Michigan's 83 counties it is critically important that adequate staffing be maintained. This investment is to fund a recruit school starting in June focused on graduating 100 new troopers. These additional troopers will enable the department to increase patrol hours and address emerging crime trends and public safety needs statewide.

### Forensic Science Services \$2.5m (\$730,000 one-time)

Over the last several years, the MSP Forensic Science Division has made progress in reducing case turnaround time by streamlining internal workflows, limiting incoming casework with submission policies, and implementing new technologies to increase efficiency; but these measures are not keeping pace with the continually increasing caseload. At FY16 staffing and production levels, case backlogs are climbing steadily in the disciplines of firearms/toolmarks and controlled substances. This investment will fund 14 additional Laboratory Scientist positions and provide one-time funding to offset a reduction in federal funds for biology.

### Equipment Sustainment \$1.5m (\$1.0m one-time)

Today the lack of dedicated funding for the lifecycle replacement of critical police equipment items results in higher repair costs, extended equipment out-of-service time, and costly bulk purchases to replace old, outdated equipment. This investment will fund the lifecycle replacement of ballistic body armor and Tasers, as well as provide one-time funding to replace outdated in-car camera systems and other equipment.

### Cyber Intelligence \$1.5m

The Michigan Intelligence Operations Center (MIOC) is the state's designated fusion center and the statewide leader in intelligence support to law enforcement and criminal justice agencies. With cybercrime caseloads increasing exponentially each year, additional analysts are needed to support investigators statewide. This investment will support seven detective troopers and fund seven digital forensic analysts, as well as one dedicated IT specialist from the DTMB.

### Campus Sexual Assault Grant Program \$600,000

This investment includes \$600,000 in grant funding to help prevent sexual assaults on higher education campuses. This initiative will support new and innovative education, awareness, prevention, reporting, and bystander intervention programs to combat sexual assault in campus environments.



### All-Hazards Readiness \$978,900

Over the last few years, Michigan has experienced numerous disasters, including large-scale incidents like the Metro Detroit flooding in August 2014 and Flint water crisis in January 2016, that have required long-duration activations of the State Emergency Operations Center. The extensive work that is required for state and federally declared disasters and emergencies, which often continues for several years after an incident concludes, exceeds the personnel resources of the EMHSD. As a result, critical tasks such as training and exercise development and delivery, state and local planning support, and implementation of statewide preparedness programs are often set aside. This investment will strengthen the state's disaster readiness and response capabilities by funding seven additional positions to help ensure the resources and programs are in place statewide before the next disaster strikes.

### Law Enforcement Training \$1.2m one-time


This investment will strengthen law enforcement training and education efforts in the state by ensuring the validity of law enforcement standards, and providing training designed to enhance relationships between the community and the police and to build public trust. This one-time funding will support a Job Task Analysis (JTA) of law enforcement positions to serve as the framework for law enforcement standards and support grants to law enforcement agencies to conduct Fair and Impartial Policing training.

## Disaster and Emergency Contingency Fund \$10.0m

This investment provides the General Funds necessary to replenish the Disaster and Emergency Contingency Fund (DECF). This fund is used to cover costs related to any disaster or emergency as defined in the Emergency Management Act, PA 390 of 1976.

## OK2SAY Student Safety Program \$608,300

This investment provides funding to support six FTEs in the continued operation of the OK2Say student safety program. OK2Say was established in 2014. Last school year over 3,100 reports of potential school violence, bullying, and other threats were received from students across the state.




## History of the MSP

The Michigan Department of State Police began as a temporary, wartime emergency force for the purpose of domestic security during World War I. On April 19, 1917, Governor Albert Sleeper created the Michigan State Troops Permanent Force, (also known as the Michigan State Constabulary). With Colonel Roy C. Vandercook as the first commanding officer, this new force consisted of five Troops of mounted, dismounted and motorized units, totaling 300 men. On March 26, 1919, Public Act 26 reorganized the Constabulary as the permanent, peace-time Michigan State Police.

Michigan adopted a new Constitution in 1963, authorizing up to 20 departments. Public Act 380 of 1965 reorganized the Michigan Department of State Police as one of these departments. The Director holds the rank of Colonel and is appointed by the Governor.

Today, the Michigan State Police consists of a modern-day force of law enforcement professionals, using the latest up-to-date training and technology to protect the citizens of Michigan. What was once a cavalry of 300 men now has evolved into one of the leading police agencies of the United States.






The pride and commitment that began in 1917 continue to play an important role in the department today, as evidenced by the MSP Value Statement: A PROUD tradition of SERVICE through EXCELLENCE, INTEGRITY, and COURTESY.

### Celebrating 100 Years of Service

This year, in honor of the department's 100th Anniversary, the MSP is marking the occasion with many special events and initiatives throughout the year. Most visibly, the MSP has added 50 black and gold patrol cars to its fleet. These fully equipped Dodge Charger patrol cars are painted to resemble the department's iconic 1937 Ford Model 74 patrol car. The MSP used black and gold patrol cars until 1954 when Commissioner Joseph A. Childs changed the department's patrol cars from black and gold to the bright shade of blue that remains the standard today.

Another celebratory throwback to our past is the switch from Garrison style to Campaign Style hats, which was the type of uniform hat worn by the original members of the MSP until the 1920s.






