Overview

The Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) includes programs and services to assist Michigan’s most vulnerable families, including public assistance programs, protecting children and assisting families by administering foster care, adoption, and family preservation programs and by enforcing child support laws, and funding for behavioral health (mental health and substance use disorder), public health, aging, crime victim, and medical services programs, including Medicaid and the Healthy Michigan Plan.

Major Boilerplate Changes from FY 2025-26

GENERAL SECTIONS

Sec. 210- 217. Legislative Contingency Transfer Authorization – REVISED

Authorizes the legislative transfer process to increase federal authorization by up to \$100 million, state restricted authorization by up to \$50 million, local authorization by up to \$30 million, and private authorization by up to \$45 million; prohibits increasing TANF authorization through the legislative contingency transfer process. House, in Sec. 217, revises federal to \$20 million, state restricted to \$20 million, local to \$5 million, and private to \$2 million.

Sec. 215. Court Approved Judgments – NEW

House prohibits departmental funds from being used to pay a court-approved judgment more than \$200,000, unless authorized elsewhere.

Sec. 222. State Fiscal Recovery Fund Reappropriation – NOT INCLUDED

Executive allows for the automatic reappropriation of state fiscal recovery funds for the same, original appropriated purpose so funds are expended by December 31, 2026, and any subsequent financial close out period. House does not include.

Sec. 226. U.S. Citizenship Requirement – NEW

House prohibits DHHS from using state or federal funds to provide services to non-US citizens, except for qualified aliens under federal law. Excludes actions for the purpose of detaining non-U.S. citizens from this prohibition.

Sec. 227. Prohibition on DEI Programs – NEW

House prohibits DHHS from using state funds on diversity, equity, and inclusion initiatives as defined in various federal Executive Orders.

Sec. 233. ARPA Revenue Pre-Expiration Reallocation – NOT INCLUDED

Executive permits the state budget director to reallocate federal state fiscal recovery funds so they are expended by December 31, 2026 for payroll and benefits for public health and safety employees at the department of corrections and department of state police; and requires legislative notification within 10 business days of the reallocation. House does not include.

Major Boilerplate Changes from FY 2025-26

Sec. 250- 224. Legislatively Directed Spending Items – REVISED

Requires the legislature to provide the department and the state budget director with a list of legislatively directed spending items; provides requirements for the administration of grants; provides requirements for grant agreements; requires grant recipients to respond to reasonable information requests; provides deadline for grant expenditure; requires the department to post information about grant recipients on its website. Executive revises to require SFA and HFA to submit a jointly agreed upon list of legislatively directed spending items to SBO and requires DHHS to post a report by March 15 and updated June 15 and September 15. House, in Sec. 224, revises to require compliance with sections 364 and 364a of the Management and Budget Act, requires grant recipients to provide a spending plan, requires department to annually audit grants, requires Office of the Auditor General to have access to internal and external records, outlines conflict of interest provisions, and requires reports.

Sec. 254. Federal Receive and Expend Authority – NOT INCLUDED

Executive allows DHHS, upon approval from the state budget director, to receive and expend federal funds in addition to the federal funds appropriated in part 1; requires notification to the subcommittees and HFA and SFA 10 days after state budget director approval; and caps federal receive and expend at 1% of part 1 appropriations. House does not include.

COMMUNITY SERVICES AND OUTREACH

Sec. 450. School Success Partnership Program – DELETED

Allocates \$1.5 million to the Northeast Michigan Community Services Agency for the School Success Partnership Program; requires report. Executive and House delete.

Sec. 460. Kids' Food Basket – DELETED

Allocates \$525,000 to the Kids' Food Basket organization to deliver meals to low-income children; funding shall be used to expand services, cover employee costs, food, supplies, and equipment. House deletes.

Sec. 461. Children's Food Grants – NEW

House directs DHHS to distribute \$1.0 million as a grant to a nonprofit providing food distributions and educational programming to children from low-income families in not less than 3 counties; directs DHHS to distribute \$1.0 million as competitive grants to other food and nutrition nonprofits serving low-income youth.

Sec. 462. Senior University – DELETED

Allocates \$400,000 to Cody Rouge Community Action Agency's senior university to improve connectivity and computer skills to seniors. House deletes.

Sec. 464. Diaper Assistance Grants – REVISED

Allocates \$6.4 million as grants to diaper assistance programs, maternity homes, local county offices, and other nonprofit agencies that distribute diapers free of charge; states requirements of eligibility; states requirements of distribution; requires report; designates unexpended funds as work project appropriation. Executive modifies by increasing the cap on administrative spending from 10% to 15% and striking the work project designation. House modifies by requiring funds to be distributed to county, requiring reporting by county, and striking the work project designation.

CHILDREN'S SERVICES AGENCY – CHILD WELFARE/JUVENILE JUSTICE

Sec. 506. Wayne County Juvenile Justice Data Report – RETAINED

Requires a report containing juvenile justice data from Wayne County, including the number of youths referred for care or supervision, type of setting for referred youth, and staff-to-youth ratios. Executive deletes. House retains.

Sec. 527. Child Welfare Training Report – NEW

House requires DHHS to report on the materials being used to train providers on the use of seclusion and restraint practices.

Sec. 532. DHHS/Provider Meetings – RETAINED

Requires DHHS to hold semiannual meetings with private residential providers to receive feedback and discuss improvements to the residential system. (*Document from the State Budget Office dated November 7 noted this section is unenforceable.*) Executive deletes. House retains.

Sec. 546. Foster Care Agency Administrative Rates – RETAINED

Establishes foster care administrative rate of \$60.20 for private child placing agencies under contract with DHHS; requires payments for independent living plus services at the statewide per diem; requires providers to submit quarterly expenditure reports, if required by federal guidelines. Executive modifies by providing stipulations for agencies to receive per diem; updates Independent Living (IL) and Host-home housing rates. House retains current law.

Major Boilerplate Changes from FY 2025-26

Sec. 702. Shawono Center Report – REVISED

Requires DHHS to report on the location and placement type of youth that were placed in the Shawono Center as of January 24, 2025, the location of staff previously employed at the Shawono Center as of January 24, 2025, and the number of former staff that are still employed by DHHS. Executive modifies by requiring DHHS to provide information on youth placement and staffing for the two state run facilities. House concurs.

Sec. 703. Juvenile Justice Infrastructure Fund – NEW

House directs DHHS to distribute \$2.0 million GF/GP as grants to state run and privately run juvenile justice facilities following instances that result in damage caused by the youth housed at the facility. Prohibits payments from exceeding \$100,000 per incident and \$300,000 per facility.

Sec. 704. Juvenile Justice Treatment Centers – NEW

House directs DHHS to distribute \$16.3 million GF/GP equally between the Michigan Youth Treatment Center and juvenile justice bed expansion efforts.

PUBLIC ASSISTANCE/LOCAL OFFICE OPERATIONS

Sec. 603. Public Assistance Benefits Notification – RETAINED

Requires the department to provide timely notification to public assistance program beneficiaries if there will be a decrease in their benefits. (*Document from the State Budget Office dated November 7 noted this section is unenforceable.*) Executive deletes. House retains.

Sec. 613. Indigent Burial – REVISED

Provides reimbursements for final disposition of indigent persons; establishes maximum allowable reimbursements; accounts for religious preferences that prohibit cremation; establishes a time limit on applications for burial services; allows individuals to donate up to \$6,000.00 toward burial services; and requires a report. House revises by requiring DHHS to notify applicants of reason for benefit denial and provide information on how to appeal the decision.

Sec. 620. Medicaid Eligibility Determination Standards of Promptness – RETAINED

Requires DHHS to determine Medicaid eligibility within 90 days when disability is an eligibility factor and 45 days for other Medicaid applicants, including patients in nursing homes; and requires quarterly reports on Medicaid standards of promptness. Executive modifies by requiring semiannual reports. House retains current law.

Sec. 625. SSI Advocacy Grant – REVISED

Allocates \$975,000 to the Legal Services Association of Michigan (LSAM) to assist current or potential SDA recipients in applying for SSI or other federal disability benefits and requires LSAM to report to DHHS on services provided with grant funds. Executive modifies by directing the allocation to the State Bar of Michigan. House modifies by directing the allocation to a membership association for attorneys licensed to practice in Michigan.

Sec. 626. Food Stamps Work Requirements – NEW

House prohibits DHHS from seeking, applying for, accepting, or renewing any waiver of SNAP work requirements without specific legislative authorization; prohibits DHHS from exercising the state option to provide exemptions from the SNAP work requirement; allows for good-cause exemptions for temporary absence from employment.

Sec. 627. State Database Checks – NEW

House requires DHHS to conduct monthly data matches with other state agencies to determine households' ongoing eligibility for food stamps benefits.

Sec. 628. Out of State EBT Transactions – NEW

House requires DHHS to use Michigan Bridge card data to flag individuals making exclusively out of state purchases for 60 days and confirm their residency within 30 days; requires DHHS to determine non-residents and non-responders ineligible for food stamps benefits and to refer their case to the U.S. Attorney's Office.

Sec. 629. Federal Database Checks – NEW

House requires DHHS to conduct monthly reviews of multiple federal data sources to assess and act on ongoing eligibility for households receiving food stamps benefits.

Sec. 630. Data Sharing – NEW

House authorizes DHHS to execute memoranda of understanding with any department, agency, or division to share information required under the act; clarifies that DHHS is not prohibited from contracting with independent vendors to obtain additional data that may affect benefit eligibility.

Sec. 631. Income and Asset Verification – NEW

House prohibits DHHS from granting SNAP categorical eligibility (or exemptions from gross income/resource standards) based on noncash or in-kind benefits unless federal law expressly requires it; prohibits DHHS from using higher SNAP gross income or resource limits than those set in federal law unless expressly required.

Major Boilerplate Changes from FY 2025-26

Sec. 632. Eligibility Certification Periods – NEW

House requires DHHS to assign food stamps recertification periods of no more than four months for households with zero net income, households that include an able-bodied adult without dependents, and other households DHHS determines have unstable circumstances.

Sec. 633. Action on Changes – NEW

House requires the DHHS to review and take action on a food stamps case whenever it receives information indicating a change in circumstances that may affect eligibility.

Sec. 634. Restaurant Meal Program Eligibility – NEW

House prohibits the expansion of the restaurant meal program and limits eligible program recipients to individuals that are older than 60 years of age, disabled, homeless, and/or a spouse of an eligible program recipient.

Sec. 635. Soda and Candy Prohibition Waiver– NEW

House requires DHHS to request a waiver from the USDA to exclude soda and candy from the list of eligible foods within the food stamps program; if waiver is accepted, prohibits DHHS from allowing food stamps program funding to be used to purchase soda or candy; provides definitions of soda and candy.

Sec. 678. Annual FIP Young Child Supplement – RETAINED

Provides for annual supplemental payments to FIP cases that include young children; allocates additional funds by 2 age categories, 0 through 5 and 6 through 13; establishes distribution methodology; and requires an annual report. Executive modifies to allow DHHS to use less than the allocated amounts and to delay the deadline for distribution of payments from November 30 to January 31. House retains.

Sec. 689. Prenatal and Infant Support Program – DELETED

Allocates \$20 million for programs to improve the economic stability of families with very young children; requires DHHS to give preference to programs that demonstrate effectiveness in improving economic stability for households with pregnant women and young children, partnerships with local health care providers and nonprofit agencies that provide for improved maternal and infant health outcomes, and compliance with TANF requirements; requires report. House deletes.

Sec. 801. Food Assistance Program Error Rate – REVISED

Requires the department to provide a quarterly report containing monthly data on the active-case FAP payment error rate as provided to the U.S. Department of Agriculture – Food and Nutrition Services. House modifies by requiring a monthly report.

Sec. 851. Adult Services Field Staff Ratios – RETAINED

Requires the department to reduce the number of older adults who are victims of crime or fraud; establishes criteria for the service standard of promptness. (*Document from the State Budget Office dated November 7 noted this section is unenforceable.*) Executive deletes. House retains.
