# **Overview**

House Bill 5523 (H-4) contains supplemental appropriation adjustments to the Department of Education and Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) for FY 2021-22. The bill appropriates \$1,077.0 million Gross. Of that, \$395.3 million is from federal Coronavirus State Fiscal Recovery Funds that were authorized through the federal American Rescue Plan Act of 2021, Public Law No. 117-2, in an effort to support the economic recovery of individuals, families, and businesses struggling with effects of the COVID-19 pandemic. Expenditure of federal Coronavirus State Fiscal Recovery Funds would be subject to Coronavirus State Fiscal Recovery Fund rules and regulations, which generally limit expenditures to certain populations, purposes, and/or communities.

Appropriation and boilerplate priorities initiated by the legislature are identified following this overview.

# FY 2021-22 Supplemental Boilerplate Items

### **GENERAL SECTIONS**

## Sec. 201. State Spending and State Appropriations Paid to Local Units of Government

States amount of state spending from state sources in the bill and amount of state spending to be paid to local units of government.

# Sec. 202. Appropriations Subject to Management and Budget Act

Subjects appropriations to the Management and Budget Act, 1984 PA 431.

## Sec. 203. State Administrative Board Transfers

Authorizes the legislature, by a concurrent resolution adopted by a majority of the members elected to and serving in each house, to inter-transfer funds if the State Administrative Board transfers funds.

### Sec. 204. Appropriations Subject to Federal Audit and Reporting Requirements

Subjects appropriations to applicable federal audit and reporting requirements; requires prompt action if instances of noncompliance are identified; requires the state budget director to notify appropriations committees and fiscal agencies of instances of noncompliance.

### Sec. 205. Appropriations Subject to Public Law 117-2

Subjects Coronavirus State Fiscal Recovery Fund appropriations to federal rules and regulations included in the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021, Public Law 117-2, which generally limit expenditures to certain populations, purposes, and/or communities.

## Sec. 206. Report on Status of ARPA Appropriations

Requires the state budget director to report on the status of all funds appropriated related to the coronavirus relief effort on a monthly basis until all funds are exhausted.

## FY 2021-22 Supplemental Boilerplate Items

# EDUCATION

### Sec. 251. Work-Based Learning Health Services Academies

Requires Department of Education to allocate \$250,000 as a competitive grant program to school districts and intermediate school districts to expand opportunities for work-based learning health services academies through partnerships with a nation academy foundation; describes grant eligibility; and requires work project authorization.

# HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES

### Sec. 301. Cooperative Agreement for Emergency Response

Requires DHHS to allocate, to the greatest extent possible, funds to assist in administering monoclonal treatments; requires funds that cannot be used to assist in administering monoclonal treatments to lapse; and requires work project authorization.

### Sec. 302. COVID-19 Early Treatment Sites

Requires DHHS to allocate \$50.0 million to establish COVID-19 early treatment sites with at least \$10.0 million allocated to local health care providers; outlines eligibility criteria for COVID-19 early treatment sites; outlines eligible uses of the funds; and sets aside not more than 10% for COVID-19 early treatment costs for individuals without health insurance.

### Sec. 303. COVID-19 Early Treatments Procurements Reserve Fund

Requires DHHS to allocate \$10.0 million to purchase additional monoclonal treatments in addition to federally allocated supply to distribute to COVID-19 early treatment sites; and requires the remaining \$15.0 million not be expended until funds are approved through the legislative transfer process and DHHS notes the early COVID-19 treatments to be purchased.

### Sec. 304. Epidemiology and Lab Capacity

Requires DHHS to allocate \$100.0 million to assist private businesses with procuring COVID-19 tests for staff that have received an exemption from any government-mandated COVID-19 vaccine mandate; requires DHHS to allocate \$117.0 million to eligible COVID-19 early treatment sites for COVID-19 tests; and requires work project authorization.

### Sec. 305. Epidemiology and Lab Capacity School Safety

Requires DHHS to purchase COVID-19 tests and to distribute them to eligible schools; requires DHHS to provide the option for eligible schools opt out and instead purchase COVID-19 tests directly and request reimbursement from DHHS; requires DHHS to maintain an online list of all known acceptable coronavirus testing supplies and equipment; prohibits state and local government entities from confiscating COVID-19 tests from schools; and requires work project authorization.

## Sec. 306. Health Care Recruitment, Retention, and Training Reserve Fund

Requires DHHS to allocate \$150.0 million for federal Coronavirus State Fiscal Recovery Fund-eligible health care recruitment, retention, and training programming for new investments; requires 75% be allocated for acute care and behavioral health care providers, which would be administered by the Michigan Health and Hospital Association; requires 25% be allocated to post-acute care providers and FQHCs; requires health care providers to follow COVID-19 vaccine policies as outlined in this section; requires a report; and requires the remaining \$150.0 million not be expended until funds are approved through the legislative transfer process.

### Sec. 307. Nursing Facility Room Conversion

Requires DHHS to allocate \$10.0 million as a competitive grant program for nursing facilities to convert multi-resident rooms into single resident rooms. Grant awards would reimburse 50% of the cost, and DHHS would have to prioritize converting rooms with more than 2 residents into single resident rooms.

### Sec. 308. Nursing Home Respirators

Requires DHHS to allocate \$5.0 million to assist long-term care facilities in complying with OSHA respiratory protection standards.

### Sec. 309. Statewide Emergency Preparedness Platform

Requires DHHS to allocate \$5.0 million to purchase a 4-year contract with a technology company for integrations to the state's statewide emergency preparedness information technology and data platforms.

### Sec. 310. COVID-19 Vaccine Support

Requires DHHS to allocate federal vaccine support funds for logistics and distribution and not for marketing, education, outreach, and other community engagement strategies; requires recipients of vaccines administered to be provided with information regarding if and in what manner the development of the vaccine utilized aborted fetal tissue or human embryonic stem cell derivation lines; and requires work project authorization.

### Sec. 311. MI Choice Waiver Program Presumptive Eligibility Risk Pool

Requires DHHS to allocate \$5.0 million to develop and implement a statewide risk pool to cover 90% of MI Choice agents' financial exposure for up to 6 weeks of costs associated with incorrect presumptive eligibility determinations, and prohibits eligibility for MI Choice agents that incorrectly presume eligibility for 20% or more of their enrollees.

### Sec. 312. Program of All-Inclusive Care for the Elderly (PACE) Startup Costs

Requires DHHS to allocate \$9.0 million to assist with facility, equipment, and other startup costs to establish PACE locations in rural, underserved communities.
